Old County Poor Farm Tract Is Acquired.

GIFT HAS NO STRINGS

Only Condition Is That Certain Amount of Improvements Be Made Each Year.

Through the donation of the old county poor farm site by the county board of commissioners, the city of Portland yesterday acquired a new park. Although the actual-transfer of the property from county to city has not yet been made, the announce-ment of the donation was made public yesterday afternoon.

No strings were attached to the conation other than an agreement from the city that a portion of the park be improved each year. This agreement was accepted by the members of the city council

Parks Are Close Together. The north end of the tract can be connected with Washington as only 600 feet separate the north end of the newly acquired prop erty and the south end of Washing ton park. It has been decided by City Commissioner Pier, bowever, tha the new park will be operated as a separate unit, as is Macleay park situated directly north of Washington
