

POINDEXTER DRIVE TO OPEN HERE SOON

J. C. Herbsman, Manager for State, Is in Portland.

CLUBS TO BE FORMED

Entry of Wood, Johnson and Lowden Has No Discouraging Effect on Aspirations.

Without further delay the presidential campaign of Senator Miles Poindexter will be put under way in Oregon. J. C. Herbsman, newly-appointed state manager for Oregon of the Poindexter campaign, has arrived in Portland and will start the ball rolling. While Messrs. Wood, Johnson and Lowden have had managers in the field for several months, this has had no discouraging effect on the Poindexter headquarters and from now on the fight for Oregon's 16th vote in the Chicago convention will be aggressively waged by the United States senator from Washington.

Mr. Herbsman was assigned from Seattle to handle the political duties of Senator Poindexter in this state. He is registered at the Imperial and his headquarters are at 213 Morgan building. Mr. Herbsman has taken an active part in Washington politics for several years. He was acting chairman for the progressives when they were in their glory and four years ago he was back in the republican fold working to elect Charles Evans Hughes. Mr. Herbsman has been connected with the University of Washington and has been on the Chautauque circuit.

Candidate Is Lauded.

"I come to Oregon at the personal request of Senator Poindexter," explained Mr. Herbsman. "I am his friend and I believe he has the qualifications for the biggest job in the world—that of president of the United States. Just as soon as possible I intend organizing Poindexter clubs and will have them addressed by men from Washington who are interested in the senator's cause. Senator Poindexter will himself visit Oregon and make campaign speeches some time next month and he will cover as much of the state as he possibly can in the time permitted.

"The position of Senator Poindexter on international affairs is well known. He does not believe in the United States interfering with European affairs and he does not want Europe interfering with American affairs. Senator Poindexter thinks it is time for Europe to cease looking at the United States as a Santa Claus.

"Americanism" Is Advocated.

"His position regarding radicals is familiar to the public. Senator Poindexter is an advocate of Americanism and his record as prosecuting attorney at Spokane and his 12 years in the United States senate attest this. Senator Poindexter's attitude toward the presidency is different from others.

"He was the first man who openly announced that he wanted to be elected president and that he felt qualified to fill the job. Every school boy in America is taught that the highest position he can aspire to is president, and Senator Poindexter has been consistent in following this teaching."

Mr. Herbsman is losing no time in taking stock of the political situation in Oregon and expects soon to have a strong Poindexter sentiment fully developed.

DOG LAW FOUND BURDEN

GRANT COUNTY CLERK SENDS PROTEST TO SALEM.

In Reply Attorney-General Says Official Is Not Obligated to Make Dog Collars.

SALEM, Or., March 18.—(Special.)—The law does not impose upon county clerks of the state the duty of making dog collars, according to a legal opinion given by Attorney-General Brown yesterday at the request of Mabel McKern Hilbourn, clerk of Grant county, with headquarters at Canyon City.

In a letter to Governor Oest, later referred to the attorney-general, Mrs. Hilbourn said that when the recently enacted dog law went into effect a few months ago she conferred with the county clerk and district attorney with reference to her duties under the act. Finally, she said, she was curtly advised to comply with the law.

"At a later date," Mrs. Hilbourn said, "A. D. Leedy, district attorney, told me to order leather and buckle and make the collars myself. I did as ordered, as both the members of the court and the district attorney thought this procedure would be cheaper for the county. My deputy, who is paid out of my personal salary, made up about 150 of these collars.

"It was slow work and we could not begin to keep up the order when received. Finally I was obliged to

purchase collars from Portland. Upon receipt of these collars it was necessary to have the tags riveted on them and have the collars stamped with the Hiense numbers.

"My deputy worked for 22 days making these collars, and in addition I was compelled to employ outside help, which entailed an expense of about \$100. When I informed the county judge regarding the expense attached to making the collars I was told that this was one of the risks I assumed when I became county clerk and that any claim I might present would be disallowed."

Under the dog law, according to the attorney-general, county clerks must furnish the required collars to applicants for licenses, but there is

Boathands of Steamer J. N. Teal Tell Dell Gray He Was Shipped, but He Doesn't Remember It.

THE DALLES, Or., March 18.—(Special.)—With a story of being "shanghaied" in Portland, remembered unconsciously by some means which he does not know, Dell Gray, 17, son of A. J. Gray, mayor of Lafayette, Or., is stranded in The Dalles, where he says he intends to stay and work.

According to Dell, who is now employed at the Western Union telegraph office here, he was on his way from Sacramento to Lafayette to see his mother, whom he asserts is shortly to undergo an operation. While wandering last Saturday evening about the second-hand store district of Portland he was accosted by a man who asked him for a match. The latter says that after this he remembers nothing until he awakened on the river steamer J. N. Teal near St. Johns, where he was reclining on the top of some wheat sacks. The lad says he worked his way to The Dalles on the Teal and arrived here Sunday night. He was unable to gain any information as to how he came aboard the steamer that night he was shipped.

Dell says he lost no money or personal effects and suffered no bodily violence. He tells a straightforward story, which he insists is fact. He has written to his parents at Lafayette and telling them that now he is here he intends to stay.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, March 18.—The interest of the salmon packers of the Pacific coast will be taken into consideration in negotiating any new treaty arrangements with France, Senator McNary was advised yesterday by Frank Fox, acting secretary of state. He said that the state department had taken notice of the tariff policy of France in its relation to American commerce, and that the question had been under consideration for some time.

Pacific coast packers have been complaining of the French tariff, which practically bars American salmon packers from the markets of that country.
