

## OFFICES BEING VACATED

QUARTERS OF UNION PACIFIC  
TRANSFERRED ELSEWHERE.

Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul An-  
nounces Organization for Lo-  
cal Traffic Work.

Transfer of the executive office of the Union Pacific to the new quarters which J. D. Farrell, vice-president in charge of non-transportation properties, will occupy in the Oregonian building, was completed today. Mr. Farrell has been at Seattle a portion of the time the present month, after his return from California, and possession of a part of the rooms in the Oregonian building was turned over to the building management March 1. The rest of the offices will be vacated by the end of the month.

C. E. Cochran, assistant corporation counsel, is the last to remain in his old office and will remove to new quarters in the Wells-Fargo building about April 1, when the members of the legal department will be located in convenient proximity to each other.

The general agency of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul is located in two rooms of the suite just vacated. L. E. Ford, general agent, Wednesday announced the personnel of his completed organization for local traffic work. J. W. Casey, dean of the corps of local traffic solicitors, who for many years has been in charge of the city and most of those in western Oregon towns by their first name, is back as an outside man, after having spent 18 months in Seattle during the period of federal control. George R. Webster has been appointed traveling freight agent, having been in reality an outside sales work since he left the company when the Portland office was closed. George C. Thomas, formerly clerk of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle and more recently rate expert for the G. M. Standifer Construction corporation, will become chief clerk of the office April 1.

The North American Lumber company has arranged to open a new office in rooms vacated by the Union Pacific and expects to be installed by the first of the month. The George T. Mickie Lumber company is also opening an office on the same floor of the Oregonian building, and other offices are being made ready for the Northwest Steel company.

## SERVICES WELL ATTENDED

"Liberty" Is Noonday Topic of  
Rev. H. R. White.

Pre-Lenten noon-day services by the Brotherhood of St. Andrew in the Baker theater, today, were marked by larger audiences. The speaker yesterday was Rev. H. R. White of Roseburg, formerly a chaplain in France. Today this week's concluding sermon will be delivered by Rev. William B. Hamilton of Medford. Meetings will be resumed on Monday.

Rev. Mr. White chose yesterday to discuss "Liberty." He said: "Our hearts thrill to the words of the orator, or poet, or speaker, as he brings our minds to bear upon the privileges of liberty. Our children, and our children's children will hate the thought of slavery. We love instinctively the thought of liberty; but just exactly what do we mean by freedom? There is a need for a far greater knowledge and understanding of what really constitutes liberty than people have. It does not mean the taking away the rights of others; it does not mean the promoting of one's privileges to the disregard of another's privileges. Freedom is the unimpeded right to realize the full law of being and becoming our true selves. "Christian statesmanship is coming forward in this day and age. We must begin to think of our politics as only being built upon one of the real and vital basic principles of Christian principles as you and I understand them."

## W. G. FAULKNER DROWNS

Boat Man for Multnomah Lumber  
Company Falls in River.

W. G. Faulkner, 420 East Thirty-first avenue southeast, boom man for the Multnomah Lumber & Box company, was drowned Wednesday night when he slipped from one of the booms into the river at the foot of Bancroft street. Workmen for the company recovered the body early yesterday morning after several hours search.

Deputy Coroner Leo Goetsch, who made an investigation, reported it to be a case of accidental drowning. The body was turned over to F. S. Dunning.

No one saw the man fall into the river but when he was missed from the boom about 10:30 o'clock Wednesday night a search was instituted. Faulkner had been working for the lumber company for the past six months, being employed on the night shift. He was 22 years of age and a son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Faulkner.

## TWO GET FRENCH MEDALS

Portland ex-Servicemen Honored  
for Work in France.

Two former servicemen in the district forester's office this week were recipients of decorations from the French government for their work overseas. Captain Fred E. Ames, who directs the timber sales department, was awarded the medal of the Legion of Honor in recognition of his efficiency. He returned to this country in September, having spent his last five months overseas in Paris as American representative on the inter-allied timber commission. The other decoration went to Major John D. Guthrie, who recently came here from New Mexico to take charge of the publicity and educational work of the district office. He was given the "Merite Agricole" medal, presented in appreciation of forestry or agricultural service. Major Guthrie was in charge of one of the American sawmills in France during the war.

## AWARD ASSURES ARMORY

Building at Centralia to Be Built  
If Tank Company Is Granted.

CENTRALIA, Wash., March 25.—(Special.)—It was announced yesterday that as soon as the war department states definitely that a national guard tank company will be placed in Centralia, construction will begin on a \$25,000 armory, local business men to erect the structure. The armory will be used only for storing the six instruction tanks, the battle tanks to be housed at the fair grounds. Dr. David Livingstone will command the new tank company. A regular army officer will be assigned by the war department as instructor.

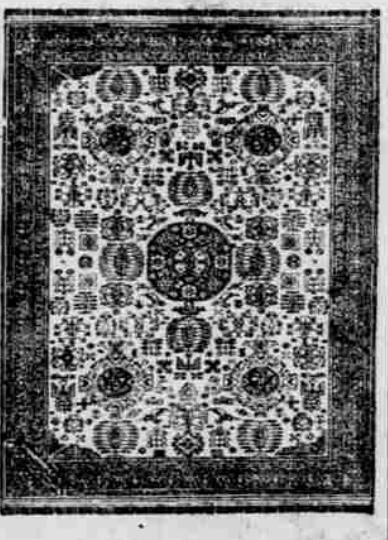

MERCHANT ACCUSED OF DRIV-  
ING WHILE INTOXICATED.

Notice of Appeal Filed From Fine  
of \$200 and 20-Day Term  
in Jail.

A. A. Closset, coffee merchant, was  
given a fine of \$200 and 20 days in  
jail yesterday by Municipal Judge  
Rosenman on a charge of driving an  
automobile while intoxicated. He  
gave notice of appeal and his bond  
was placed at \$500 which he gave.  
Closset was arrested last Friday at

East Thirty-first and Alder streets  
after his machine got stuck in the  
mud at that place. His actions while  
endeavoring to extricate the car re-  
sulted in residents in the vicinity  
sending in a call for the police and  
Motorcycle Officer Kelly and other  
officers made an investigation which  
resulted in the arrest.

Two girls who are employed in the  
Crescent laundry were in court and  
testified that they saw Closset driv-  
ing the machine.  
A fine of \$40 was levied against C.  
C. Wintermuth on a charge of violat-  
ing the traffic ordinance. Winter-  
muth was arrested by Patrolman J.  
A. Smythe after he is said to have had  
a collision at East Forty-first and  
Stark streets. At the time he is said  
to have been driving south of East  
Forty-first street at an excessive  
rate of speed and on the left hand  
side of the street.

## RATE EXAMINER RESIGNS

HENRY THURTELL LEAVES  
PUBLIC SERVICE BODY.

Man Who Wrote Recommendation  
in Portland Case Succeeded

by Wilber La Roe Jr.  
Henry Thurtell, chief examiner of  
the Interstate Commerce Commission  
and the man who made the study of  
testimony and data submitted in the  
Portland rate case last year and  
wrote the recommendation, has left  
the commission. He resigned, ef-  
fective March 1, to become commerce

counsel for the Southern railway. Mr.  
Thurtell was formerly public service  
commissioner of Nevada and attract-  
ed attention by reason of his ability  
as a traffic expert with unusual qual-  
ifications of value to the national  
body in handling traffic and trans-  
portation questions. Wilber La Roe,  
Jr., has been appointed chief exam-  
iner.  
The Portland Traffic and Trans-  
portation association has been ad-  
vised of the dates for hearings on  
the intermediate rate case. This is the  
inter-mountain case in which a hear-  
ing was held at Salt Lake city and  
in which the Pacific coast cities were  
represented. At the conclusion of  
the Salt Lake hearing the carriers  
were required to submit suggested  
changes, which they did. The recom-  
mendations were for a compre-  
hensive revision of transcontinental  
rates, and as no opportunity had been  
given shippers who would be affected

thereby, a number of whom asked to  
be heard, the hearings now set were  
arranged, and the carriers are asked  
to have the representatives present  
who made the report that they may  
be cross-examined.  
The hearings will be before Ex-  
aminer Disque of the Interstate com-  
merce commission and will be held  
at New York May 3, Chicago May 10,  
Spokane May 17 and San Francisco  
May 24.
