

AMERICAN KILLED IN MEXICAN CAMP

Renewal of Attacks on U. S. Citizens Reported.

ANOTHER MAN WOUNDED

Fellow Employees Declared Responsible—Military Attache Also Brunt of Natives' Ire.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—Two new incidents involving American citizens in Mexico were reported today to the state department.

One of the attacks resulted in the killing of H. A. Jafredon, an American, and the wounding, probably fatally, of Alexander Ober, whose nationality was not stated, at the Amatlan camp of the International Petroleum company, by whom both were employed.

The attack, which took place March 30, is stated in the dispatch to have been committed by Mexican soldiers, who were ordered by the military attache at Tampico to arrest the Mexicans involved.

The second incident was an attack on a train which Major Edgar W. Burr, military attache of the American embassy at Tampico, Mrs. Burr and two other Americans, Dr. Florence Hall and a Mr. Hurd, were traveling.

BOXING BOUTS STOPPED

San Francisco Forbids Army Contests in Auditorium.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 2.—(Special.)—Boxing contests will not be permitted at the San Francisco auditorium, this is the edict of Emmet Hayden, chairman of the auditorium committee.

Two programmes of four-round bouts were arranged by Mayor W. H. Mallett, in charge of the recruiting campaign. Hayden says they will not be held at the civic auditorium, and further, that Mayor Rolph, who is absent on a visit to the Hawaiian Islands, agrees with him that the city's big meeting place shall not be used for such purposes.

PARIS, April 2.—(Havas.)—The Temps says today it learns that deputations of Danish inhabitants of Flensburg have visited the international commission there, asking that central Schleswig be not handed over again to Prussian domination.

The delegates requested that Flensburg be internationalized under the league of nations, the newspaper adds.

TROOP MOVE AGAIN ASKED

SITUATION IN DUBLIN REPORTED NORMAL

No Signs Apparent of Any Easter Uprising.

LATER TROUBLE FEARED

Inquest Into Death of Lord Mayor Mac Curtain May Provoke Excitement, Is Rumor.

DUBLIN, April 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—The situation in Dublin today was normal. There was not the slightest sign of an Easter rising, rumors concerning the possibility of which recently became so general as to provoke question on the matter in parliament.

The resignation of James Ian Macpherson as chief secretary for Ireland did not cause a ripple of excitement here. Irishmen regard Field Marshal Viscount French, the viceroi, as solely responsible for the direction of affairs, and seem not to be interested in Mr. Macpherson's success.

Some fears are entertained there may be trouble in Cork when the result of the inquest into the death of Lord Mayor Mac Curtain is announced.

The new field marshal, Sir William Robertson, who, it has been rumored, is likely to succeed General Sir Frederick Shaw as commander of the troops in Ireland, is on a visit to Belfast with Lord Davenport.

The lord mayor of Dublin has received a letter from Premier Lloyd George dated March 31, alluding to the possibility of obtaining evidence in the ordinary way calculated to lead to the arrest and conviction of murderers, in the formidable campaign of terror menacing Ireland.

MURDER SUSPECT TAKEN

PRISONER BELIEVED TO BE OLE HANSON, FUGITIVE.

Man's Fear of Arrest and Interest in New Trial at Montecarlo Arouse Suspicion.

ELLENBURG, Wash., April 2.—(Special.)—An alleged I. W. W., believed to be Ole Hanson, wanted in connection with the murder of Warren G. Ginn, Centralia, Ariz., yesterday parade victim, was taken from Ellensburg to Chisholm tonight by Sheriff Berry of Lewis county.

The man registered at a local lodging house as A. C. Larson, but was arrested by Sheriff Joe Thomas gave the name of Charles Burg.

Evidently the fear of arrest has been prevailing on his mind. He had been working in the valley several days and went to a local lawyer and asked him to make arrangements to be safe, as people took him for Ole Hanson and drove him away.

(Continued From First Page.) practice sabotage more than we do."

"You have just listened to the best I. W. W. speech you have ever heard and the best you ever will hear unless by your verdict you say these teachings should be perpetuated," said District Attorney Evans in opening his argument at 4:30.

The attorney for the defense has not broken his promise to be avoided. He has said that his only regret is that more men have not adopted his religion and that of his clients. The industrial conditions in Colorado, Arizona or Butte are not being tried here. No man can justify himself by breaking the industrial code as depicted by all, but is the exigence of a few restering spots any reason for turning our industrial fabric over to the hands of a few who are without honesty, morality or justice?"

"Satire" Looks Serious. The district attorney read from I. W. W. poems, and song books lines which the defense had explained were satire.

"Do you think the lumberjack thinks the advice 'Pay your back taxes flat' is a parody on our warfare? Do you think his mind would carry him back to Belgium? Or do you think he wouldn't go back that far? I want to see this gun under cover." Is that satire, or does it mean from the hillside, from the lodge room or from the hotel?

The reference to the armistice day massacre at Centralia was obvious. "Vanderveer's proof by I. W. W. literature that the organization did not believe in "indiscriminate sabotage" was interpreted from the same book used by Vanderveer to mean special sabotage by "sab-cats," avoiding clumsy, stupid destruction by "boobs."

The challenge of Vanderveer that the state could not show where the profiteer had been prosecuted was answered by state records and a letter to State Food and Dairy Commissioner Mickie from Evans offering to introduce the criminal syndicalism act against merchants guilty of destruction of food stuffs for profit.

The district attorney referred to "bullying, building tactics" of counsel for the defense, particularly his insinuation that a member of the jury had expressed prejudice against the I. W. W. Evans scored the use of "stool-pigeons" in the guise of Union Record agents as an "insult to every man on the jury panel" showing the belief that they would not tell the truth under oath.

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MONROE DOCTRINE RAPPED

MEXICAN MINISTER DECLARES MEANING Muddled.

"Mexico Needs No Protection Other Than Own Forces," Is Assertion.

BUENOS AIRES, April 2.—Astor Saenz, Mexican minister to Brazil, declared today in an interview that the Monroe doctrine constituted a real danger to the nations of the American continent because its application by the United States has been made according to the interests of the administrators who have ruled the destinies of that country, according to a dispatch to La Prensa from Rio Janeiro.

"For Elihu Root the doctrine is the right the United States has of protecting itself as a sovereign independent nation," Senor Saenz declared. "President Wilson on his part declared two years ago that the doctrine did not exist, while Senator Lodge thinks it ought not to remain the exclusive charge of the United States."

"Mexico, which does not accept any doctrine contrary to its sovereignty, never needed other protection or aid than its own forces."
