

NORTHERN PACIFIC
OFFICIALS BE HEREPresident and Party Are on
Tour of Inspection.

J. M. HANNAFORD AT HEAD

Visit of James G. Woodworth, Vice-
President, Is Regarded as
Sort of Homecoming.

J. M. Hannaford, president of the Northern Pacific railroad, accompanied by the heads of the executive departments and traffic departments of the company, is scheduled to arrive in Portland this morning on a trip of inspection over the company's lines. James G. Woodworth, vice-president, in charge of traffic, is one of the accompanying members of the party, whose visits to the city are always regarded as a sort of homecoming. During the federal control Mr. Woodworth was traffic assistant to the director of the northwestern region. At the relinquishment of government control he became identified with the executive department of the Northern Pacific.

The coming of the officials at this time is regarded as of importance in the bearing it may have on the decision of the Great Northern company as to whether or not its trains will continue permanently to enter the Northern Pacific terminal yards at the union station.

Change Held Temporary.

It is understood that the return to the use of the depot after changing the service back to the North Bank station last month, was under a 40-day arrangement during which period the company would determine whether or not to become permanently identified with the union station. When the Northern Pacific Terminal company was formed the Great Northern was not operating trains into Portland, the service coming at a later date, after the ownership of the two northern lines had passed into control of the Hill interests. When the Spokane, Portland & Seattle was built, the road owned jointly by the Northern and Northern Pacific, the North Bank depot was established and became the terminus of the two roads and also of the Oregon Electric, built by the same interests.

Ultimate Outcome Doubtful.

The lack of larger yard facilities at the Union station was probably one reason why the terminal was not used by all of the lines, but in acquiring land for the North Bank station the holdings are adjacent to those of the terminal company. It is a matter of conjecture as to what will be the ultimate outcome, but it is regarded as probable that arrangements will be made whereby the Union station can be used for the Great Northern and the North Bank line trains, thereby making the depot a union station for all of the steam roads operating out of Portland.

If this is accomplished, it will probably lead to enlargements of trackage facilities at the east end of the city to allow the trains of the other lines to have their own tracks for spotting trains, at the end of the line, and the congestion of the train tracks in front of the Union station.

The Northern Pacific is one of the principal owners in the terminal company, holding 40 per cent of the stock, the same as the Oregon-Washington. It is probable that the appointment of a new manager to succeed Edward Lyons, whose resignation has been tendered, will be announced during the visit of the Northern Pacific officials.

COUNCIL TO VISIT SALEM

STUDY OF CAR FARE RULING
IS EXPECTED TODAY.City Officials and Engineers to
Confer With Public Service
Commission.

SALEM, Or., April 4.—(Special.)—Verification by exhibits and statistics of testimony introduced at the recent hearings involving the application of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company for an increase in fares on its traction lines, is believed by Fred G. Buchtel, chairman of the Oregon public service commission, to be the purpose here tomorrow of members of the Portland city council.

The council will be accompanied to Salem by a staff of engineers and it is expected that the conference will get under way shortly after 10 o'clock. In the absence of any definite information from Mayor Baker or other members of the council as to the exact nature of the conference, Mr. Buchtel is of the opinion that it will deal principally with verifying by official records the testimony before the commission. Some time also may be given to a discussion of the recommendations of the public service commission with relation to a solution of the street car difficulties, according to Mr. Buchtel.

Commissioners E. H. Corey and Fred Williams, who have been holding hearings at Redmond and other eastern Oregon points for several days, are expected to return here early tomorrow and will be in attendance at the conference.

It was reported here today that Attorney-General Brown may be asked to submit a legal opinion as to whether the city of Portland has a right to purchase the rails of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company as recommended by the public service commission. City Attorney LaRoch of Portland holds that such a purchase would be a violation of the law, but it is understood that this ruling has not satisfied a number of persons in a speedy settlement of the railway question.

Should a formal request for such an opinion be made to the attorney-general it is not probable that he would be in a position to furnish the information for at least two weeks.

SCHOOL BONDS PROPOSED

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RING IS SUSPECTED
IN LIQUOR SEIZUREAccomplice of Man Here Is
Sought in South.

CONFESSION HELD SHIELD

Sensational Results Expected in
Investigation of Handling of
53 Cases of Intoxicants.

Sensational developments are expected today by federal officers as a result of the investigation started by Johnson S. Smith, federal prohibition director for Oregon, in connection with the discovery of 53 cases of champagne, Burgundy and Riesling wine seized in a raid Saturday, and the arrest and fine of Harold L. Jones, confessed owner of the wine.

After the discovery of the liquor on the second floor of the Brunswick-Balke-Collender building, 49 Fifth street, by deputy sheriffs, Jesse Plandera, enforcement officer, working in connection with Johnson S. Smith, detailed his men on a thorough investigation of the case. The officers last night said other arrests might be made.

Work of Ring Suspected.

Mr. Smith expressed the belief that Jones was merely the figurehead of a large and powerful ring engaged in the sale of liquor in Portland. Mr. Smith declared his intention of arresting other members of the ring. Mr. Smith declared that he believed Jones was shouldering the responsibility so as to shield higher-ups in the liquor ring.

He also expressed discontent at the way the Jones case had been rushed through the court.

The officers intend to apprehend the persons who shipped the liquor from San Francisco in cartons, labeled paper napkins.

Search Made in South.

Federal authorities in San Francisco are bending every effort to locate the source of the shipment. A. R. McKinley, manager of the Brunswick-Balke-Collender branch, was arrested with Jones Saturday, but was later released after it was established that he had not been connected with the case, the officers announced.

The original shipment of liquor was said to have contained 51 cases, 38 of which had been sold. Jones said that he paid \$75 a case for the shipment and sold it for \$100 a case.

EUGENE SERGEANT CITED

Leslie E. Hall Honored for Bravery
at Fort Omaha.

EUGENE, April 4.—(Special.)—Sergeant Leslie E. Hall, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Hall of Eugene, is one of six enlisted men who have been cited for bravery in battling hydrogen gas at Fort Omaha, according to information received here.

The hydrogen plant at the fort caught fire, each time threatening to destroy the entire plant and the adjoining buildings in which many men were at work and in which thousands of dollars worth of property was stored. The six soldiers stuck to their posts in spite of the danger and saved the plant.

GLEE CLUB ENTERTAINED

University of Oregon Singers Give
Concert at Hood River.

HOOD RIVER, Or., April 4.—(Special.)—The Men's Glee club of the University of Oregon gave a successful concert here last night. The club has not appeared in Hood River since 1918, and the coming last night was made a gala event.

On the arrival from eastern Oregon, the members of the club were taken for a motor tour of the valley. Numerous dinner parties were held, with the members as guests of honor, and following the concert a short informal dance was given in the high school auditorium.

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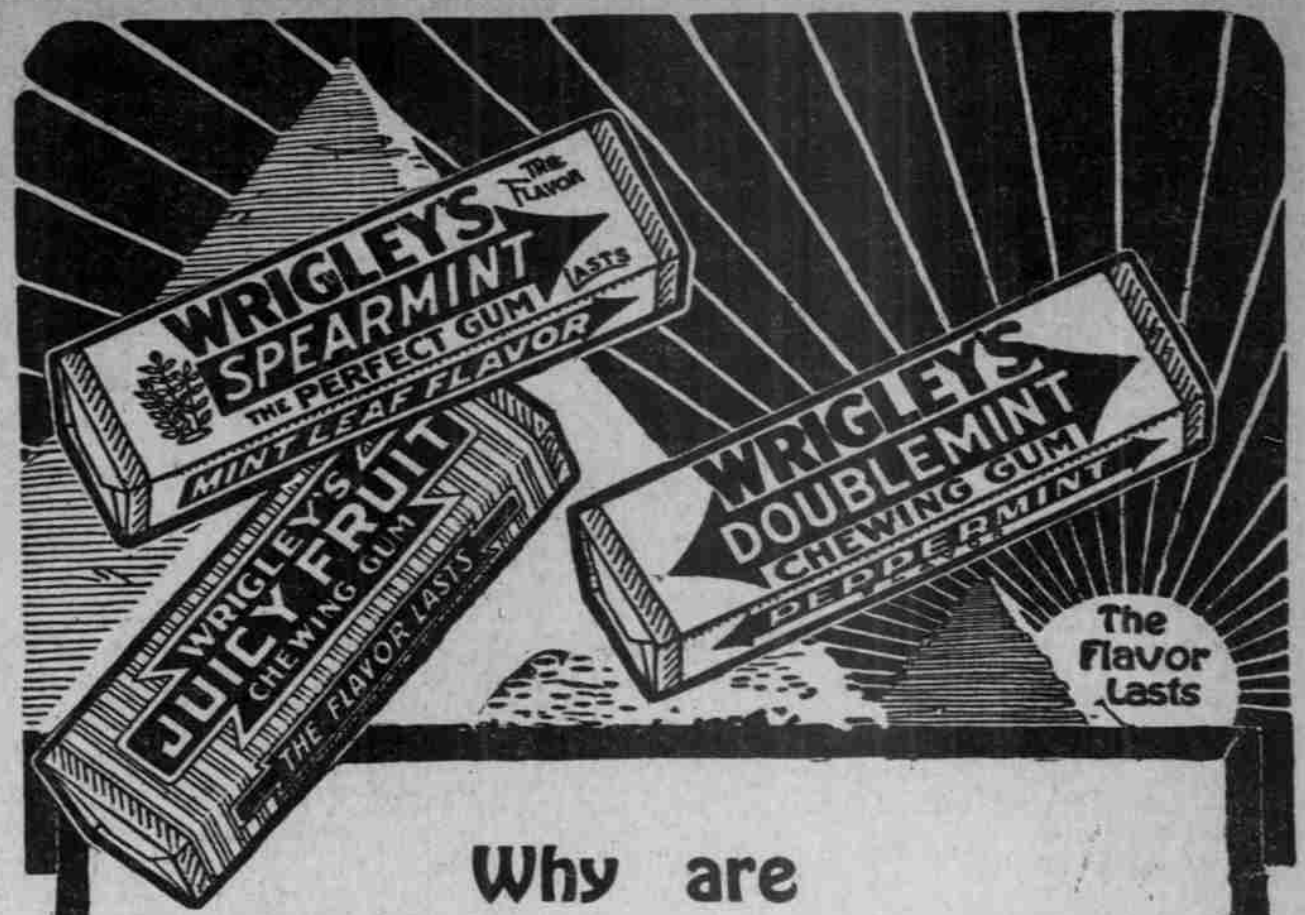
