

TREASURY TO PAY HIGHEST INTEREST

Two New Issues to Bear
5 and 5 1/4 Per Cent.

RATE SETS NEW RECORD

Certificates Will Mature in Three
and Six Months From
April 15.

WASHINGTON, April 11.—A high record for interest rates on war or post-war government securities was disclosed tonight by Secretary Houston in announcing two new issues of treasury certificates of indebtedness, maturing in three and six months and bearing interest at 5 per cent and 5 1/4 per cent respectively.

The new rates exceed the interest paid on the last issue of certificates by one-fourth and one-half per cent respectively, and the treasury officials declared they were the highest paid on government obligations since the days of the civil war. While the \$200,000,000 bond issue to finance the Spanish-American war bore the circulation privilege and therefore theoretically paid a higher rate, the actual interest to be paid out by the treasury on those two issues sets a mark which probably will stand for several decades, it was said.

Mr. Houston laid the high rates on "recent changes in the situation," which have for some time caused treasury officials to consider changes in their financial programme. Necessities of the government were laid before the governors of the federal reserve banks who conferred all last week and on the information given by them, Mr. Houston determined to raise the rates on government short-term issues.

Both of the new issues of certificates will be dated April 15. The combined amount will be for \$250,000,000 or more, and the federal reserve banks are authorized to make allotments "in full" on all subscriptions. The certificates do not bear circulation privilege and will not be accepted in payment of taxes.

AIR MAIL CLERK KILLED

"STUNTS" CAUSE DEATH OF
CLARENCE STAPLETON.

Tragedy Occurs on First Flight
for Employee at Newark,
N. J., Field.

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 11.—(Special.)—Clarence Stapleton, 27, was killed shortly after he began his first day's work as an air mail clerk at Hollers Field, Newark, N. J., today, when a new Curtiss plane in which he was taking his first flight crashed on the Erie railroad embankment.

Frederick W. (Slim) Robinson, the pilot, known as one of the most skillful in the air mail service, was taken to the City Hospital where, it was said, he was suffering from fractures of the nose and right foot and possible fracture of the skull and internal injuries. His condition is critical.

Witnesses agreed that "stunt" flying, which is forbidden by air mail regulations, was responsible for the tragedy. Between 3000 and 4000 persons, who had gathered to see the arrival of the Washington mail, saw the death plunge, which began about 1000 feet up. Several of them said that pilots had been doing forbidden stunts all morning.

Stapleton lived at No. 38 Fulton street, Newark, and Robinson, who is 23, lives at No. 183 Broad street, that city. The accident occurred about 200 feet from the spot where Harry C. Sherlock, air mail pilot, met death a month ago, when his plane struck a factory chimney.

BOTULISM CLAIMS VICTIM

WIFE DIES AND HUSBAND ILL
WITH RARE DISEASE.

Injections of Serum Fail to Stem
Headway of Sickness of
Brooklyn Man.

NEW YORK, April 11.—(Special.)—Botulism, a rare disease, which first appeared in this city three months ago, caused the death yesterday of Mrs. Sarah Heck of Brooklyn. Her husband, Frank, is critically ill and is not expected to live, despite the injection this afternoon of an anti-botulism serum which has proved successful in several cases. New York physicians received first-hand knowledge of the disease in January, when it caused the deaths of five members of a Brooklyn family from eating canned ripe olives. With the Hecks, canned spinach is held responsible.

The serum was obtained from the Willard Parker hospital by Dr. Stanley Morton King, who said today the husband had failed to respond to the injections, it being apparent that the disease had gained too much headway. The Hecks went to a restaurant Wednesday night, where both ate the spinach. The following day Mrs. Heck was taken ill, but it was not until Friday morning that Dr. King was called. He diagnosed the case as botulism and when the husband was stricken he called Dr. F. B. Cross for consultation. The husband was in delirium tonight, it has been told of his wife's death.

objection to discontinuing came entirely from high ranking officers." Many of the war service publications, the report declared, were established largely for the self-glorification of certain interests and to provide comfortable and safe places for a large number of men who found such occupation "more congenial than active service in the front line trenches."

The law giving the printing committee control over government publications, the report declares, "nipped in the bud the greatest propaganda scheme the country has ever escaped." Doctrine by Clique Charged.

"There is no doubt," the report says, "that a certain clique both in and out of the army and navy, had their preparations well advanced to cover the country with an all-en-

meshing chain of newspapers and magazines for the purpose of spreading and fastening their military and international doctrine upon the United States.

Another extravagant publication issued by the Creel committee, the report said, "was the so-called national school service," which was distributed to teachers.

"Its underlying purposes," the report declares, "seem to have been to convert teachers to the idea of the league of nations and to urge them to teach that doctrine to their school children."

The government publications were used extensively by propagandists, the report charges, declaring articles favoring the league of nations appeared in many, with no articles in opposition.

Amaro News Affected.

"This propaganda extended as far as the Amaro News, printed at Coblenz, Germany," the report adds. "Even the wet propagandists," the report continues, "got a good start in army publications. Articles and editorials boosting the liquor interests appeared before the committee suggested that further discussion of the subject was not essential to army vocational training or operation of army hospitals."

RHODE ISLAND FOR WOOD

POLL TAKEN OF REPUBLICAN
COUNTY CHAIRMEN.

Senator Harding Second Choice,
With Governor Lowden Press-
ing Close Behind.

NEW YORK, April 11.—Rhode Island's first choice for the republican presidential nomination, according to the returns received in the poll of the county chairmen, is Major-General Leonard Wood.

United States Senator Harding of Ohio is the second choice, but he is closely followed by Governor Lowden of Illinois. Reports of special correspondents indicate that Lowden has been going ahead of Harding in popularity recently.

In the first choice column Wood led over Harding by about two to one. In the second choice column in addition to Harding and Lowden appeared Governor Coultidge of Massachusetts, Senator Poindexter and Charles E. Hughes.

Interest in the possible democratic nominee on the part of the residents of Rhode Island who in previous years gave their allegiance to the party simply does not exist at the present time, according to the reports of the republican leaders.

The tariff and our foreign relations appear as the paramount issues in the minds of Rhode Island republicans, while old high cost of living is receiving some attention. One chairman reported that the sentiment in his county was for a strong centralized government in Washington to handle the labor leaders, I. W. W. and the bolshevik problems.

Rhode Island's ten delegates to the national convention will go unpledged. The state has no primary election. Two delegates were chosen from each of the three congress districts and at the state convention held in Providence last Monday four delegates-at-large were elected. No attempt was made in any way to hamper them by instructions or suggestions.

Running through the replies from Rhode Island was the same strong sentiment for Americanism found in all the states, but no mention at all was made of the league of nations as a possible issue.

LaFollette victory may be judged from the record of the second man on the delegation at large. He is E. J. In other words, LaFollette's "victory" is on a par with the two elections secured by Victor Berger in a Milwaukee congressional district.

HIGH PRICES CAUSE DEATH

HABERDASHER KILLS SELF AS
HE BROODS OVER ARREST.

Agents Arrest Dealer on Profiteering
Charge and He Commits
Suicide in Own Home.

NEW YORK, April 11.—(Special.)—Joseph Nichthauser, 42 years old, one of the best known haberdashers in Brooklyn, sent a bullet through his brain this morning in his home and died almost instantly, while brooding over his arrest on a charge of profiteering.

Nichthauser was arrested yesterday by Edward Williams and Shelby Williams, agents of the department of justice, when they deciphered a cost-mark code on some raincoats he had displayed in the window of his store. The code used by Nichthauser was "God Help Us." As this contains only nine letters he used the letter "X" as the cipher in the code. When the agents entered his store they asked to see a raincoat. The one shown them bore the cost price of "X" which, when figured out, told the agents the coat had been purchased by Nichthauser for \$23. When they asked the price he demanded \$45 for the coat. He was placed under arrest on a charge of violating the Lever act.

Nichthauser was arraigned before United States Commissioner James McCabe and released in \$2000 bail for further hearing.

According to his wife, Regina, Nichthauser did not mention his arrest to her or to his three little daughters, and the first they knew of it was when one of the children brought in the evening papers containing the story of her father's arrest.

His wife says he brooded all last evening and that shortly after daybreak this morning she heard a shot. He was dead when she reached his side.

PHONES WILL AID WORK

REPUBLICAN CONVENTION TO
HAVE INSTRUMENTS HANDY.

Chicago Coliseum to Be Rear-
ranged for Session June 8; Com-
mittee to Spend \$47,000.

CHICAGO, April 11.—Delegates at the republican national convention opening here June 8, will be able to confer with representatives of other states without leaving their seats.

To eliminate a large part of the confusion incident to conferences between delegates on the floor, C. R. Hall, superintendent of the Coliseum, has arranged for the installation of telephones connecting all state, district and territorial delegations.

It was said that this will be the first time that such a system has been installed at any national convention. There will be 53 telephones in service, reaching the 48 state groups and the representatives of the District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawaii, the Philippines and Porto Rico.

The convention architects have completed plans for the Coliseum, including an extra balcony that adds approximately 1100 to the seating capacity. Work on the balcony and the convention offices in the Coliseum annex will start May 3. The Chicago convention committee is spending \$47,000 on changes to the building to accommodate the delegates and more than 10,000 spectators.

CLAIMS TO BE PRESSED

McNary Will Try to Prevent Re-
duction of Airplane Patrol.

Senator McNary has announced that he will press strongly before the war department the claims of his constituents as regards the reduction in the number of airplanes for the Oregon forest patrol this summer.

In a telegram to George Quayle, secretary of the Oregon chamber of commerce, he says: "I am in hearty accord with the desire to provide for adequate airplane fire patrol as evidenced by my amendment, which passed the senate, appropriating \$60,000 for that purpose. I am thoroughly disappointed by the ruling of the general staff of the army, who only recommend one air squadron for this purpose. I have again applied to the war department and will press this claim strongly."
