CHAMBER PLANS DRIVE
CAMPAIGN FOR MEMBERS OUTLINED BY COMMITTEE.

Personal Canvass to Be Made of Every Firm, Business and Professional Man in City.

Plans for an active campaign to obtain new members for the Portland Chamber of Commerce are being worked out by the new membership committee of the chamber, and within a short time a personal canvass will be made of every business firm, bureau and professional man in the city, according to the announcement of Frank E. Andrews, chairman of the committee.

At a meeting of the membership committee Friday noon, H. B. Van Duser and Max E. Hirsch of the Chamber of Commerce addressed the meeting on Portland's shipping programs and the part that the chamber has played in the recent shipping activities. President Van Duser declared that the coming year will be a peak year in the history of the port of Portland and Mr. Hirsch suggested that a movement be started to have the students of the various schools of the city visit the terminals in the lower harbor and witness the loading and unloading of vessels from all over the world.

The important work which the Chamber of Commerce has played in securing the services of various steamship lines for the city and in arranging cargoes for outgoing vessels was explained, and plans worked out for placing this information before prospective members.

There are many concerns as well as individuals in the business, commercial and professional life of the city who are not now, but should be, members of the Chamber of Commerce," said Chairman Andrews yesterday. "There are also many newcomers in the community not yet members who would be glad to become so upon a simple invitation."
