TWO INJURED IN MISHAP.—Leo Welch, 745 Hawthorne avenue, received painful injuries in the back yesterday when he fell from a light pole at Seventeenth and Fremont streets while working as a lineman for the Portland Railway, Light & Power company. He was taken to St. Vincent's hospital. Andrew Zajac, an employee of Albers Bros. Milling company, was taken to the same hospital with an injury to his back when several sacks of grain fell on him while at work in the company warehouse. His condition is not serious.

RISE ASKED FOR ROADMASTER'S OFFICE.—Increases in salaries in the county roadmaster's office are asked by the Oregon branch of the American Association of Engineers in a letter presented to the county commissioners yesterday. The commission, which was taken under advisement, asks for an increase from \$200 to \$275 for the three district engineers and one electrical engineer, and the following other raises: Draftsmen, \$145 to \$175; transit and rodmen, \$120 to \$150; and chainmen, \$115 to \$150.

RALPH C. ELY ADVOCATES HOOVER.—Ralph C. Ely, former chairman of the republican state committee of New Mexico and also former food administrator of New Mexico, will speak tonight at the central library on "Why Herbert Hoover Should Be Republican Nominee for President." Mr. Ely will visit Salem and Woodburn on Wednesday and in the evening he will speak at Oregon City, where a Hoover republican club will be organized. At noon today Mr. Ely will be the guest at an informal luncheon at the Portland hotel.

CONGREGATIONALISTS MEET TONIGHT.—Tonight the members of the congregational churches of the city will meet at the First Congregational church. The church is being prepared to be tendered Rev. Edward Lincoln Smith, D. D., one of the eastern leaders of Congregationalism. Delegates from Forest Grove, Jennings Lodge, Oregon City, Scappoose, Beaver Creek, Hillsboro and Beaverton will meet and mingle with the delegates of the congregational churches of Portland and vicinity.

EXTENSIVE LECTURE.—Much interest is being taken in the garden lecture to be given in the "Y" auditorium tonight at 8 o'clock by Howard Evans, Western horticultural college, at the Mississippi Agricultural college. At the lecture he will exhibit a collection of 740 plants and illustrate his talk. The lecture is given under the auspices of the "Y" service department and is free to the public.

FRIES TRIAL POSTPONED.—Trial of William J. Fries, treasurer of the Multnomah Lumber & Box company, who is charged with violating the prohibition law, was postponed yesterday by Municipal Judge Roseman until Thursday morning, on motion of attorneys for Mr. Fries. Police last week, it is said, confiscated a quantity of liquor in the basement of his home at 214 East Forty-fourth street north.

DAIRIES WILL BE INSPECTED.—Dr. C. W. Larson, acting chief of the dairy division of the United States department of agriculture, accompanied by J. D. Mickle, state dairy and food commissioner, will inspect the dairies in this district. Dr. Larson will return to Portland and later will go to San Francisco.

POWER MANAGER NAMED.—J. P. Lottridge, manager of the Eastern Light & Power company at Baker, was in Portland yesterday and while here announced that Roy P. Dean has been appointed as manager of the company at La Grande. A published statement to the effect that O. B. Frank of Roseburg had been named to the position, Mr. Lottridge said, was an error.

LARCENY CHARGE DROPPED.—A motion for the dismissal of the indictment against B. D. Birkholtz, charging larceny by bailment, was filed in the circuit court yesterday by Deputy District Attorney Dempsey, who asserted that evidence at hand would not sustain a prosecution. Birkholtz was accused of taking an automobile.

LAUNDRY ASKS NEW TRIAL.—A motion for a new trial in the case of Joe Laundry, convicted of larceny, was filed in the circuit court yesterday by his attorney, George F. Vanderveer. Grounds for the motion were alleged insufficiency of evidence to justify the verdict and errors in law during the course of the trial.

FORGERY IS LAID PARTLY TO DOCTORS

Jury Asks Leniency for Ross Cummings, Now Addict.

WAR RECORD IS DEFENSE

Mechanic Shows Surgeons Gave Him Injections of Drug to Ease Pain After Injury.

There was testimony to the effect that Cummings was a mechanical wizard before he came under the sway of the drug, and splendid recommendations were presented in his defense. In addition to his service with the spruce division, Cummings served as an airplane mechanic at Kelly field.

Back in 1917, there was an explosion of a gas container on which Cummings was working which injured his eyesight and gave him considerable pain. Army physicians, seeking to relieve his suffering, "fed" him morphine. Though it dulled the pain, the heavy quantities established a liking for the drug which Cummings said he has never been able to shake.

The check in question was for \$57.75, was signed by "George Perkins," was made out by "George Crawford" and was drawn on the Ashley & Rumelin bank. Cummings took it to the home of O. E. Schupp, a restaurant man from whom he had previously borrowed \$5, at night and got \$10 on it, the rest being promised in the morning.

Check Found to Be Bad. When Cummings went to Schupp the following day, Schupp told him he would go around to the bank to get the money for Crawford at once, saying that he did not know anything about the credit of "George Perkins." As soon as he started for the bank, Cummings ran away. The check was found to be forged, and Cummings was arrested at 10 o'clock that night, under the influence of morphine. Though he explained that the check was given him by "George Crawford" his tale did not ring with sincerity.

The jury was out only 45 minutes when it returned with the verdict of guilty, together with the recommendation for "utmost leniency." Judge Kavanaugh promised the jury he would take its recommendation under consideration in sentencing Cummings.
