

VISITORS ACCUSED BY WOMEN VOTERS

Attempt to Hurt Cause Is
Charged at Meeting.

MRS. HIDDEN PRESIDES

Session of Oregon League Indorses
Several Candidates—Out-
siders Cause Problem.

"Several women are present who came to block this meeting—not to help the cause of women candidates," declared Mrs. Mary L. T. Hidden yesterday while presiding at a gathering of 36 women held in library hall. The meeting was called as a "mass meeting" having been announced as such at the session of the City Federation of Women's organizations last Saturday. It was held under the auspices of the Oregon League for Women Voters, of which Mrs. Hidden is president.

Mrs. E. O. Northrup, republican candidate to the national convention, declined to allow her name to come up for vote of indorsement at this meeting. Names voted upon favorably were Mrs. Alice McNaught, Mrs. M. T. Hidden, Mrs. Harriet Hendee, Miss Gavin of The Dalles, all of whom had filed as candidates to national convention.

Miss McGregor indorsed. Miss Jessie McGregor was suggested and indorsed as a possible candidate for county school superintendent. A committee was appointed to choose possible candidates for the position of school director. None of these appointed were present. Suggested as possible nominees for the state legislature were Mrs. Millie Trumbull, Mrs. Alexander Thompson, Miss Viola Orthchild, Mrs. Mary Mallett and Mrs. A. C. Newell. Final choice went to Miss Viola Orthchild and Mrs. Thompson.

At the meeting of the federation last Saturday a resolution was adopted to the effect that the federation indorse women candidates who have the proper qualifications for office.

School Head Candidate Sought. It was at the time this resolution was up for discussion that Mrs. Hidden announced that she would call a meeting to propose backing a woman suitable for school director.

"The difference of opinion that resulted in the misunderstanding arose as to the right of some of those present to record their votes as part of the league of which they were not members. But when the name of Miss Orthchild was suggested, it was clear neither she nor Mrs. Thompson were present."

As an advance of humane week, cards were passed out bearing this message: "Be Kind to Animals. You Are One Yourself."

A TELEGRAM from Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt to Mrs. C. B. Simmons, regional director of the National League for Women Voters, announces that suffragists will concentrate their efforts now upon Congress. A conference of women voters from all the states that have ratified will be held in Connecticut, and Mrs. Simmons was asked to attend, but instead of going she delegated Dr. Esther Lovjoy, who is in New York, to attend as representative of Oregon and use every effort to get Connecticut to ratify the suffrage amendment.

Mrs. Charles H. Castner will speak today before the Hillsboro Commercial club. She will stress the necessity for the adoption of the millage measure for the university, agricultural college and state normal. The clubs of Oregon, as well as the parent-teachers, have indorsed the measure.

\$12,000 SUIT IS FILED

FRAUD IN TIMBER DEAL IS
CHARGED BY STOCKHOLDER.

J. R. Shaw, Mill City Manager for
Hammond Lumber Company,
Seeks to Recover Money.

Under threat of prosecution for a crime he never committed, J. R. Shaw, Mill City manager of the Hammond Lumber company, was covered in paying the timber concern \$12,000 in cash last February, which he now seeks to recover in the circuit court, according to the allegations of a complaint filed with County Clerk Beveridge yesterday afternoon.

Shaw brings the action against the Hammond Lumber company, George B. McLeod, president, and the two directors, J. R. Shaw and J. R. Shaw, who had been employed by the concern for 10 years at Mill City, asserts, and was a stockholder in the company.

Bids were called for by the government in the timber case, which is now being handled by the two bidders in the Hammond company and the Merrill Lumber & Shingle company bid. The latter got the timber with a bid of \$2 a thousand feet, compared with the former's bid of \$1.75.

Directly after this transaction, Shaw yesterday declared, the Hammond company accused him of violating his trust and betraying the concern for the benefit of the Merrill company, in which he also held stock. According to the complaint, he was told that he was criminally liable and that he was being abused and called vicious names.

The demand was made of him, he asserted, that he pay \$12,000 cash—or the difference between the two bids—to the Hammond company and compel the Merrill concern to transfer its preferential right of contract to the rival company.

Though Shaw insisted the charges made against him were wholly false, he said he paid over the money demanded on February 18, 1920, and was trying to induce the Merrill concern to transfer its rights when he received independent advice which convinced him he was being defrauded. He demands the return of the \$12,000 with interest.
