

MINE CHIEF, JAILED, ATTACKS GOVERNOR

A. M. Howat Talks to Miners
From Balcony.

ALLEN CALLED "SKUNK"

Kansas Industrial Court Criticized.
Crowd Assembled With Band
Playing Anthem.

GIRARD, Kan., April 12.—Alexander M. Howat, president of the Kansas Mine workers, addressing miners today from the balcony of the county jail, where he is confined for contempt of court for refusing to testify before the Kansas industrial relations court, attacked Governor Allen and the industrial court law.

Howat, permitted by the sheriff to address the crowd which had gathered as a protest against his incarceration, and three other district officials, referred to Governor Allen as "that skunk, that tyrant, that would-be destroyer of organized labor, that oppressor of human rights."

Acting on a decision made at a meeting Sunday at Franklin, a crowd of miners mobilized near Girard and marched into town. Led by a special committee flourishing American flags and banners, followed by a band, the procession circled the courthouse and finally congregated in front of the jail. The band was playing the "Star-Spangled Banner" when the procession halted.

Howat spoke for an hour. He was repeatedly cheered by the crowd. "We won't recognize this court," Howat said, referring to the court of industrial relations, before which he refused to appear as a witness. "It is composed of three corporation lawyers, appointed by that skunk of a governor, Allen."

PITTSBURG, Kan., April 12.—An injunction restraining officers of Kansas mine unions from fining members or officials who appear as witnesses before the new Kansas industrial relations court was issued today by District Judge Curry, who last Friday sentenced Alexander M. Howat, president of the Kansas miners, and three other union officials to jail for contempt of court.

At their convention here recently the miners voted to assess fines against any member who appeared before the tribunal.

A number of union members have testified in the court's investigation of the Kansas coal industry.

The number of idle miners was placed at 3,000 tonight by George Richardson, commissioner of the coal operators' association. Seventy-seven miners were reported idle and 13 as being able to keep running.

SOLDIERS MADE CITIZENS

FOREIGN SUBJECTS LOYAL TO
AMERICA'S CALL.

Bend Circuit Court Term Auspiciously
Opens With Unique
Naturalization Ceremony.

BEND, Or., April 12.—(Special.)—Because of their loyalty to the United States displayed during the world war, four ex-soldiers, residing in Deschutes county, nominally citizens of other countries, were made full-fledged Americans today at the opening session of the April term of circuit court. Examinations were conducted by Wilfred F. Smith of Portland, representative of the bureau of naturalization, before Circuit Judge T. E. Duffy, Frank R. Prince, Magnus Ehn, C. Kirtland and Martin G. Pooner were the four soldiers who took the oath this afternoon.

The Prince case is regarded as unique inasmuch as he held a commission as first lieutenant in a United States overseas regiment of engineers. Mr. Prince had, in the course of a long residence in Canada, declared his allegiance to the dominion.

Fifteen other applications, many of them from men born in lands with which the United States was recently at war, were considered this afternoon.

On the list were John Kernbach, Richard Herold, Gustav Hirsch, Joseph Oestreich, Franz Steinhilber and Phillip Schmidt, Germans; Sigmund Greller and William H. Presley, Canadians; Hans T. Mikkelsen and Jacob W. Petersen, Danes; Andrew M. Nelson, Swede, and John Knott, Gallician. The grand jury faces the novel experience of having no criminal matters to investigate. Members of the jury are Julius Janett, L. B. Baird, Frank Bogus, A. L. Maye, T. J. Murphy, G. H. Ehlers and P. A. Erickson.

MOONSHINERS ARE IN JAIL

Officers Seize Liquor Worth \$700
at Present Prices.

PENDLETON, Or., April 12.—(Special.)—Federal charges may be placed against Herschel Lewis and Al Goltz, arrested Saturday night on an allegation of making and selling "moonshine" liquor.

Lewis, who was caught delivering liquor, this morning pleaded guilty in the city court and was sent to jail for 30 days. Goltz, who was caught, officers say, in the act of working out a still in his home here, is in the county jail.

Liquor worth about \$700 at present prices, a large quantity of mash and the complete still are in the hands of the officers.

BALLOT TRANSFER BEGINS

Senate Committee Prepares Re-count in Newberry-Ford Case.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—David S. Barry, sergeant-at-arms of the senate, left today for Michigan to direct the transfer to Washington tomorrow of ballots cast in the Newberry-Ford senatorial election.

Delay was necessary, it was said, owing to failure of attorneys representing both contestants to have modified the federal court order for preserving the ballots. The ballots will be recounted under the direction of the senate elections subcommittee.

APPEAL BEING PREPARED

Attorney for I. W. W. Convicts
Seeks Affidavits in Montezano.

ARRESTED.—WASH., April 12.—(Special.)—George F. Vandervoort, I. W. W. attorney, was here today

taking preliminary steps toward carrying the Centralia armistice day murder case to the supreme court on appeal, with the hope of securing a new trial for the seven men convicted of second degree murder, and sentenced to from 15 to 40 years in state prison.

After securing affidavits in Montezano today, Vandervoort will go to Olympia, where he will ask the supreme court for an order for a transcript of all testimony taken in the murder trial. This transcript will be used by him in making up an appeal brief. Vandervoort said today that he would give as grounds for his appeal, alleged errors in the law and also insufficiency of the evidence.

Pending the decision by the supreme court upon the appeal of the case, the prisoners will remain in the county jail at Montezano.

LEGION TO PROBE REDS

IDAHO NAMES DELEGATE TO
NORTHWEST CONFERENCE.

I. W. W. and All Radical Organizations to Be Investigated
by ex-Service Men.

BOISE, Idaho, April 12.—(Special.)—The I. W. W. organization as it exists and operates in Idaho and the northwest will be thoroughly investigated together with other radical organizations, by the Idaho branch of the American Legion. Paul A. Davis, a member of the legion, director of the bureau of license in the law enforcement department, has been delegated as Idaho's representative to take charge of the probe. A similar appointment has been received by him from the National Historical society.

Frank H. Jeffery, state commander for Washington, in a telegram to E. C. Boom, former commander of the Idaho legion, says:

"The national commander requests me to call conference of one representative from each of states of Oregon, California, Utah, Nevada, Idaho, Montana and Washington to consider plan and make detailed report and recommendation to national executive committee. Will you send representative with full power on behalf of your state to conference to be held at Spokane within 10 to 14 days? Specific date to be set after replies to this telegram received."

ELLIS ISLAND CONGESTED

Switchmen's Strike Delays Passage
of Immigrants Inland.

NEW YORK, April 12.—Ellis Island steamship piers were congested with immigrants today as a result of the railroad strike. Inability of railroads to carry immigrants inland after they had been admitted to the country forced authorities to keep them on the island and prevented the transfer of 3,500 other aliens from piers to the island for examination.

Aliens at the island today numbered 2,500 of whom 650 had been admitted to the country. These, with aliens awaiting examination or deportation proceedings took up all the room. Arrival of 30 deportees from the Pacific coast, including a few who have been ordered sent out of the country because of anarchistic beliefs, complicated the situation.

PAPER PULP IS SCARCE

Manufacturers Have Difficulty in
Securing Supplies.

NEW YORK, April 12.—Delegates to the forty-third annual convention of the American Paper & Pulp association which opened today, were told that paper manufacturers were experiencing difficulty in obtaining pulp and other raw materials, and that the situation had been aggravated by recent freight embargoes.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 12.—Publishers of some of the leading newspapers of California, meeting today to discuss ways and means of conserving newsprint, decided to form an organization of publishers and editors to coordinate their efforts in securing a constitution and plan of operation.

GUARANTEE NOT FAVORED

Farmers' Delegates Said to Oppose
Request to Congress.

SPOKANE, Wash., April 12.—(Special.)—General sentiment expressed by farmers from eastern Washington and northern Idaho indicated that the delegates of the farmers' union, who met this afternoon, will not ask congress to continue a wheat guarantee. Some farmers favor allowing natural supply and demand to fix the price, others believe the price will go above the \$2.20-at-Portland base fixed by the government, and still others believe it would be useless to ask the government to continue the guarantee.

Perjury Case Jurors Accepted.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 12.—Eight jurors were temporarily accepted today in the trial of Mrs. Alice Woodcock for perjury in connection with her testimony at the trial of her husband, Edgar Woodcock. He was acquitted of the murder of William Kelly, a newspaper employer whom he shot and killed on a downtown street.

Irish Archbishop Dead.

ARMAGH, Ulster, Ireland, April 12.—The Most Rev. John Baptist Crosier, archbishop of Armagh and primate of all Ireland (Church of Ireland), died here last night.

CUT TAXES, SAYS LOWDEN

"LET US GET BACK TO SANITY,"
CANDIDATE'S PLEA.

Illinois Governor Inveighs Against
"Orgy of Spending" in Address
on Eve of Primary.

CHICAGO, April 12.—The question of the high cost of living will not be solved until taxes are reduced, Governor Lowden of Illinois, republican presidential candidate, said today in an address on the eve of the Illinois presidential primary.

"There is no genius, no statesman anywhere, who can devise any system of taxation by which one body pays those taxes," he said. "They diffuse themselves through all classes. They are passed on, and you cannot prevent it by law, from the manufacturer to the wholesale dealer, until when they reach the consumer, those taxes are paid over and over again by him."

"The high cost of living, in turn, relates itself to all the questions of unrest which so much vex us in these troublous times. There is but one place to begin readjustment and reconstruction, and that is in Washington."

"Let us get back to sanity, to economy, let us get away from this orgy of spending."

ROAD MAY COST \$300,000

Paved Highway From Walla Walla
to Portland Assured.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., April 12.—(Special.)—County commissioners today called for bids on eight and a half miles of pavement to connect the

city with the state line and directly with the end of the Columbia highway from Pendleton north. Bids will be opened April 26. Two roads are to be improved, the roads joining near the state line. The cost will be approximately \$300,000, as two concrete bridges are to be built.

The roads are to be built under the Donohue road plan. This is the largest road bid the county has ever called for and when the road is completed will give Walla Walla a paved road to Portland.

Company Installs New Engine.

HOOD RIVER, Or., April 12.—(Special.)—The Oak Grove Lumber company, managed by Nelson Emory, has completed the installation of a new engine and additional boiler and planing equipment at its plant in the Oak Grove fruit section. The plant is ready to start the season. Thirty men will be employed. The output, reaching 35,000 feet daily, will be hauled here on motor trucks.

CHEHALIS, Wash., April 12.—(Special.)—Evangellist B. J. Bulgin, State Horticulturist M. L. Dean and State Senator Coman were the principal speakers at the weekly luncheon of

the Citizens club. The addresses of all were optimistic.

Liquor Brings \$250 Fines.

CHEHALIS, Wash., April 12.—(Special.)—Fines of \$250 and costs each were today imposed on P. Rossi and his sister-in-law, J. I. Rossi, by Judge McCormick, by Justice Beaufort of Chehalis. Both pleaded guilty to having liquor in their possession.
