Salaries Held Limited.

In the opinion, drafted by George pointed out that the salaries of depu-ties and assistants in most county offices are limited by Chapter 101 of the 1919 session laws, and that the commissioners in increasing wages have no right to go beyond the limit thus fixed by statute. thus fixed by statute.

The law provides that the sheriff may employ 11 deputies at not to exceed \$150 a month and 37 at salaries not to exceed \$125. It is not permissible to raise the 37 to the class in which only 11 deputies are allowed, in the opinion of the district attorney.

"If it is possible for the sheriff to get deputies at \$125 who can and will perform properly and expeditiously the duties hitherto performed by 37 deputies, it must be done," it is declared. "If the county commissioners are satisfied that this is not possible it has power to add, at the request and recommendation of the sheriff, to the class next above whatever deputies may actually be necessary. It might be 37 or less, dependance of actual needs."


