

NEW CONTEST BUDS BOURBON RANKS

J. D. Brown Declares Office of
Committeeman Vacant.

MORROW TO BE OPPOSED

Newton McCoy Understood to Be
Slated to Assist in Ousting
Doctor From Job.

In the hurry-burly of the last hours for filing declarations for state office, a brand new contest has budded forth in the democratic ranks. J. D. Brown, who is said to be the new state chairman, has written a letter to the effect that the democratic voters will have to elect a new national committeeman this year.

Dr. J. W. Morrow, present incumbent, has filed his declaration and it is understood, he will be opposed by Newton McCoy, who also opposed and questioned Dr. Morrow's election before the national committee in Chicago last year. The letter of Mr. Brown appeared so late that unless Dr. Morrow's means of gathering intelligence was in good working order he might have been left off the ballot and further complication arise.

Among some democrats there is a question as to how J. D. Brown became state chairman when Harvey G. Starkweather resigned to become a candidate for nomination of United States senator against George E. Chamberlain. Mr. Brown was selected by the executive committee, which consists of Colonel Robert Miller, Mrs. Alexander Thompson and one or two more. This is the committee which elected Mr. McCoy as national committeeman, an election which the national committee declined to recognize, inasmuch as Dr. Morrow was elected at a special meeting of the state committee.

Mr. Brown Held Disqualified.

Mr. Brown, according to one democratic faction, is no longer a democrat and is therefore not qualified to serve as state chairman, even if the executive committee instead of the state central committee had the right to elect a chairman, which they contend it hasn't. It is contended that Mr. Brown abandoned the democratic party when he took up with the Non-partisan league idea and that he was instrumental in bringing out a candidate in opposition to Joseph S. Smith when he ran for congress, and that Mr. Brown is now leaning toward, if he is not a member of, the newly formed land and labor party, which certainly isn't the democratic party.

Nothing may be done by the organization to oust Mr. Brown for the present, as there is nothing for the state chairman to do until the state committee meets after the primaries and prepares a campaign for the nominees. At that time Mr. Brown, it is predicted, will be gently but firmly lifted out of the chairmanship and dropped.

Ticket Filled Up.

Yesterday it looked as though the democratic presidential elector ticket would be short when Walter M. Pierce refused to run for that position and insisted on being a candidate once more for the state senate. Claude C. McCulloch, former state senator, was pressed into service and promised to file to complete the ticket. Those who have filed for presidential electors on the democratic ballot are Oscar Hayer of Polk county, A. E. Reames of Jackson county, Miss Celia Davin of Wasco county and Elton Watkins of Multnomah county.

Leslie J. Aker of Ontario is working fast to see if he can get a sufficient number of names on a petition to place William Jennings Bryan on the presidential ballot. The state for the signatures was slow in starting, and this is the last day for filing. Several hundred names will have to be obtained if the Bryan petition is to be successful. Mr. Aker has established his headquarters at the Imperial hotel.

A. H. Burton, for ten years a teacher at the Washington high school, is a candidate for the republican nomination for county school superintendent. Mr. Burton is a graduate of the state normal school of Illinois. He has served as a member of the Multnomah delegation in the house.

Apparently the woods were full of tentative legislative timber yesterday. The names of fully a score of men were being mentioned as preparing to file their declarations with the secretary of state today. It is said that the labor ticket will consist of one candidate for the senate and three for the house. The ticket probably will be composed of C. M. Ryerson, for the senate, and for the house, B. W. Steeman, Oscar W. Horne and W. E. Lynd.

Deputy to Run for Sheriff.

ABERDEEN, Wash., April 15.—(Special.)—Elmer Gibson, chief deputy sheriff, is the first candidate to announce himself for the office of sheriff before the republican primaries. He is 40 years old and a native of the county. Frank Glenn, Brady dairyman, has decided to run for county commissioner from the first commissioner's district.

CITIZENSHIP GIVEN MEN WHO

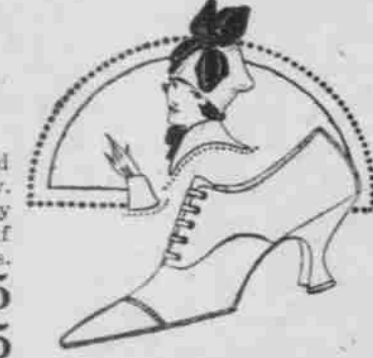

SHERWOOD MOVING AHEAD

UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT FOR ALL GRADES MOOTED.

Capable Physician Being Sought to Locate in Neighborhood, and Good Practice Awaits Right Man.

The Sherwood Business association, according to C. I. Calkins, president of the Bank of Sherwood, has started a movement for a union high school at Sherwood, and a union district to include the primary grades also may be formed. The idea is meeting with favor throughout the neighborhood.

At an election in Sherwood recently a proposition for the purchase of a tract for park purposes was carried by unanimous vote. The club is working for a hard-surface road between Hillsboro and Wilsonville, and is seeking co-operation with Portland in securing and maintaining community service grounds.

Water Applications Filed.

SALEM, Or., April 15.—(Special.)—James R. Atchison of San Francisco has filed application with the state engineer for permission to appropriate water from an unnamed spring for domestic use, and the irrigation of 49 acres near Barton, in Clackamas county. S. A. Hufford and Percy Crowley of Myrtle Point, would appropriate water from a spring for domestic use in Coos county.

Bond Issue Hoped For.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., April 15.—(Special.)—Don J. Zumwalt, engineer for the Klamath Irrigation district, is back from a trip of inspection of drainage systems employed on reclaimed tule lands in the Stockton, Cal., delta district, which he believes can be used successfully in draining the 20,000 acres of the Klamath district. The directors are planning to submit a \$50,000 bond issue to land owners of the district to finance the drainage project, which is expected to be under way this summer if the bonds carry.

Delayed Relief Drive Starts.

ROSEBURG, Or., April 15.—(Special.)—The near east relief drive, which was delayed in this county, was started off today with a gift of \$50 from the Looking Glass school district. The county campaign is under the direction of S. S. Bruce and a local committee.
