Robert S. Farrell Comes Out for State Senator.

H. C. L. IS GIVEN KONCK

Fewer Laws, Lower Taxes, Consideration of Returned Soldiers, Policy Advocated.

SALEM, Or., April 15.—(Special).—“Fewer laws, lower taxes, consideration of returned American soldiers first” is the campaign slogan adopted by Robert S. Farrell, 705 Lovejoy street, Portland, who today filed with the secretary of state here his declaration of candidacy for state senator from the 13th senatorial district. Mr. Farrell is a republican, and asks that his name be placed on the ballot at the primary election.

“I will advocate such consistent legislation as will give special favors to our returned soldiers and sailors regarding employment, appointments and emoluments,” says Mr. Farrell in his platform. “I will advocate lower taxes, endeavoring to curtail lawmaking and to do all possible to knock out the infernal high cost of living. I believe in unqualified equal rights for women in every capacity. I believe in the equal distribution of profits of industry between capital and labor, each being necessary for the other's success.”

“I favor such legislation as will relieve the state's dependent, feeble-minded, insane, blind and other incapacitated citizens. I regard America for Americans first, and favor fostering home industries exclusively.”

CERTIORARI WRIT SOUGHT

Attorneys for Albers Make Last Attempt to Save Client.

As the last possible step in the defense of Henry Albers, sentenced in federal court here over a year ago to pay a fine of \$10,000 and serve three years at McNeil's island for alleged violation of espionage act, attorneys for Mr. Albers yesterday served upon District Attorney Humphrey a petition for a writ of certiorari, which if granted will take the case before the supreme court of the United States for review of the record. If the petition is denied by the supreme court, no rehearing will be possible and no other recourse lies open to Mr. Albers but to serve the sentence. The decision of the federal court here was recently upheld by the circuit court of appeals at San Francisco.

In the petition the attorneys, John McCourt, Charles H. Carey and J. B. Kerr, assert that certain evidence presented by the prosecution was inadmissible.

\$5000 AWARDED WIDOW

Court Says Negligence Proved if Car Exceeds 20 Miles an Hour.

Damages of \$5000 were allowed Mrs. Josephine Johnson, by a jury in the court of Circuit Judge Bingham yesterday. Her husband, Gustav Johnson, met death in an automobile collision on Powell Valley road and Eighty-second street November 31, 1919. The action was brought against John Ferguson, realty dealer, who was securing Johnson to view some property; C. J. Anderson, employee of Ferguson; Lloyd Anderson, driver of the automobile; and Nelsie Underwood, driver of the other automobile in the collision which occurred.

In his instructions to the jury, Judge Bingham said that negligence of defendants would be sufficiently proved if the evidence showed that they had approached the street intersection at a greater speed than 20 miles an hour, as provided by city ordinance.

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PLOT MAY BE IMPROVED

TRUSTEES TO TAKE ACTION ON HISTORIC SALEM CEMETERY.

Changes Deemed Necessary in View of Probable Interment of Late Bishop Hughes.

SALEM, Or., April 15.—(Special).—In view of the probable interment of the late Bishop Matthew Simpson Hughes, who died recently in Cincinnati and whose funeral was held in Portland a week ago, in the Lee Mission cemetery of this city, the matter of improving the burial plot is now before the trustees of the property, and definite action may be taken at a meeting to be held here Saturday. The cemetery was first founded years ago and included only three acres. More recently the plot was increased to eight acres. Although the cemetery is open to all church denominations, most of the more historic graves contain the bodies of former Methodist ministers, missionaries and their wives. Included among them are the bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Jason Lee, the former of whom was a pioneer missionary of the Methodist church. He died in 1841. Bishop E. O. Haven, who also gained fame as a missionary, is buried in the Lee Mission plot, having died in 1880. The present trustees include George P. Litchfield, A. A. Lee, Dr. Steeves, E. C. Boyer, E. Carrier, J. O. Goltra, W. T. Rigdon and H. H. Vandervort.

Although no definite plans have

been completed for the removal of Bishop Hughes' body from Portland to Salem, it is possible the interment may be made during the annual Oregon conference of the Methodist church, which will be held early in the summer. Lots in the historic cemetery have been in demand for many years. At present more than 70 former ministers, missionaries and their wives are buried here.

DEAN WILL VISIT EAST

Architects' Convention to Be Attended by Ellis F. Lawrence.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, April 15.—(Special).—Ellis F. Lawrence, dean of the school of architecture of the university, will leave late this month for Washington, D. C., to attend the annual convention of the

Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture, May 3 and 4, and also that of the American Institute of Architects, May 5, 6 and 7.

While in the east he will seek a successor to Louis C. Rosenberg, instructor in design, who is leaving the university at the end of the present term to study in Europe. During the three weeks of his absence, he will visit a number of the eastern schools of architecture.

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
