Assistant Superintendent Rice will go to the Dalles for the same purpose and the co-worker, Assistant Superintendent Whitney is scheduled to visit Astoria this week.

FUNERAL CHAPEL PROTEST.—Protest property owners in the vicinity of Eleventh and Market streets, against the establishment of an undertaking chapel on the Lambert property, will be heard by the city council this morning. This is the first protest registered by owners of residential property against the intrusion of a funeral chapel and will probably lead to the inclusion of such establishments in section 106 of the building code, which would provide that no such establishment could be conducted within a residential district without a hearing before the city council.

Ramsey, 1723 Phelps street, early Saturday morning, was reported yesterday by her physicians to have a good chance for recovery although she is nearly 80 years old. According to Mrs. Ramsey her mother fell as the result of a fit of dizziness when she got up in the night to turn on the lights. Her reports were that Mrs. Gibson had accidentally fallen from a window.

NIGHT FIREMAN INJURED

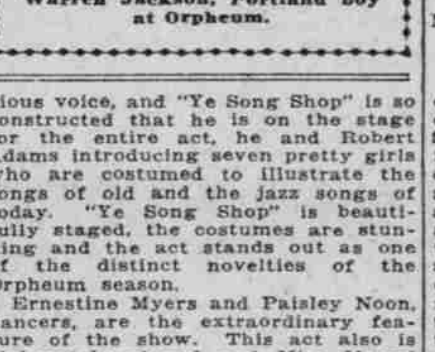

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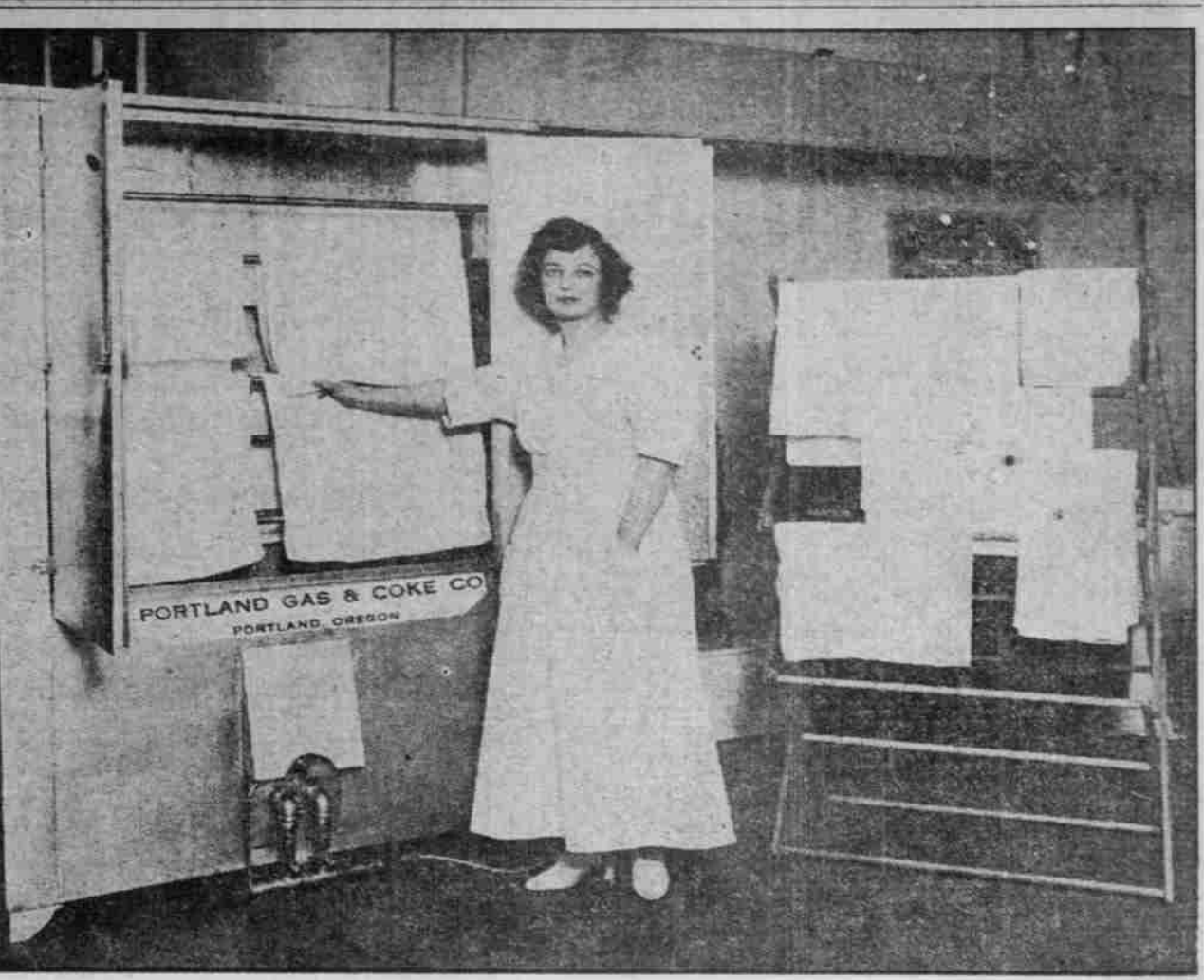
