

WILSON ENTHUSIAST OUT WITH LEAFLET

Scripture Freely Quoted in
Urging Third Term.

ENEMES TO BE SWATTED

President Predicted to Use "New
Jaw-Bone of an Ass" on Op-
ponents of League.

John L. Schuylerman, candidate for delegate at large to the democratic convention, is scattering a leaflet over the city demanding that Woodrow Wilson be given a third term and that George Chamberlain be defeated in the primaries. Mr. Schuylerman quotes the scriptures freely and fluently in his advocacy of another term for Mr. Wilson and quotes the scriptures again in handing a wallop at Senator Chamberlain.

It will cost \$2000 to mail leaflets to the registered democrats of Oregon, says Mr. Schuylerman's statement, so help is needed. Mr. Wilson is put in very good company by Mr. Schuylerman, for in this appeal he says: "Then the people rejoiced, for that they offered willingly to the Lord." (1 Chron. xix:3).

"Give Woodrow Wilson a progressive democratic congress; defeat George E. Chamberlain at the primaries; nominate Harvey G. Starkweather, a Wilson democrat to the backbone, senator. Oregon democracy does not want to be represented in congress by a republican-at-heart in the sheep's clothing of a democrat," alleges Mr. Schuylerman.

Mr. Schuylerman, who says he is campaign manager of the Woodrow Wilson league, the Chamberlain of Commerce building, insists that a third term for Wilson is necessary to cure the evils now current. Wholesome democrats, he asserts, need not be concerned about Mr. Wilson's health, because St. Paul was bitterly maligned, persecuted and nearly killed for his faith in Jesus. Instead of voting for William G. McAdoo for the presidential choice in the democratic primaries, Mr. McAdoo's name being the only one on the ballot, Mr. Schuylerman urges the faithful to write the name of Wilson for president and at the same time vote for Mr. Schuylerman for delegate-at-large.

Thomas B. Handley, who is senator for Tillamook, Washington, Lincoln and Yamhill counties, was in Portland yesterday on his way to Salem. He is not a candidate and there are three aspirants for the old job. Mr. Handley explains that the reason he decided not to run was because it costs money to serve in the legislature, particularly when the session comes along about a time when he is likely to lose a term or two in court, and that is a serious matter for a lawyer. Mr. Handley says he received a petition signed by about 80 per cent of the voters of Lincoln county, urging him to be a candidate again.

H. V. Alley is candidate to succeed himself as commissioner of Tillamook county. He is in the city. Mr. Alley was originally appointed as a commissioner and then was elected and he is now finishing his elective term. A resident of Nehalem, Mr. Alley's main interest in the commission has been the development of a comprehensive road program in Tillamook county. He says that the commission has secured the right-of-way for a road from Seaview, near Rockaway, north almost to the Jetty. The commission plans opening a road quarry and paving in both directions from the quarry.

There would have been a shortage of candidates for precinct committees but for the activity of J. L. Day, county chairman. Mr. Day filed for more than 300 people and in very few instances will there be a contest, as there is no fight for control of the county organization, as is known. As a rule, anyone who wants to be a precinct committeeman can have the ambition gratified by voting for himself. More than half of the precinct committeemen are elected on one or two votes, as most electors never think of voting that far down on the ballot. An attempt was made to have women interested in the county committee by filing for precinct committeemen, but only a few responded.

ONLY THREE DEMOCRATS FILE

Republicans More Desirous Than

SOVIET TRADE IS SUBJECT OF NEGOTIATIONS FOR RUSSIAN BUSINESS PROGRESSING.

America and England Seek Agreement; Old License System May Be Abandoned.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—Negotiations between the state department and the British foreign office concerning the proposed reopening of trade relations with Soviet Russia are progressing cordially, Sir Auckland Geddes, new British ambassador, said yesterday. Question of recognition of the present government of Russia is entirely apart from these conferences, it was said.

It is the purpose of America and England to arrive at an agreement as to means of expanding the trade already being carried on with Russia through Scandinavian countries and by way of Finland and Latvia. While the plan to be adopted has not as yet been decided, it is regarded as probable that the old license system will be abandoned entirely, or so liberalized as to leave but little restraint on the channels of trade.

STRIKES NUMBERED 1413

Loss of Time in Great Britain Last
Year 34,430,000 Days.

LONDON, April 22.—Thomas J. McNamara, minister of labor, told the house of commons yesterday that the strikes and lockouts reported to the ministry of labor during 1919 aggregated 1413. The total number of persons directly or indirectly affected, said the minister, was 2,380,000.

The aggregate duration of the disputes was 34,430,000 working days, figuring on the basis of individual loss of time.

More Midshipmen Needed.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., April 22.—Be-

cause of the large number of vacancies existing in the regiment of midshipmen and estimates made by the naval authorities that a sufficient quota will not be filled as a result of the February and April examinations of candidates, a third examination will be held in June. This announcement was made today by naval academy officials. Between 1300 and 1400 vacancies will exist following the graduation of the first class in June.

Paving Petition Granted.

CENTRALIA, Wash., April 22.—(Special.)—Property owners between

Centralia and Bucoda have petitioned the Thurston county commissioners to pave approximately nine miles of the Centralia-Bucoda road, north from the Lewis county line. The petition was granted Tuesday by the Thurston county board and the county engineer was ordered to make a survey. The estimated cost of the improvement is \$234,000.

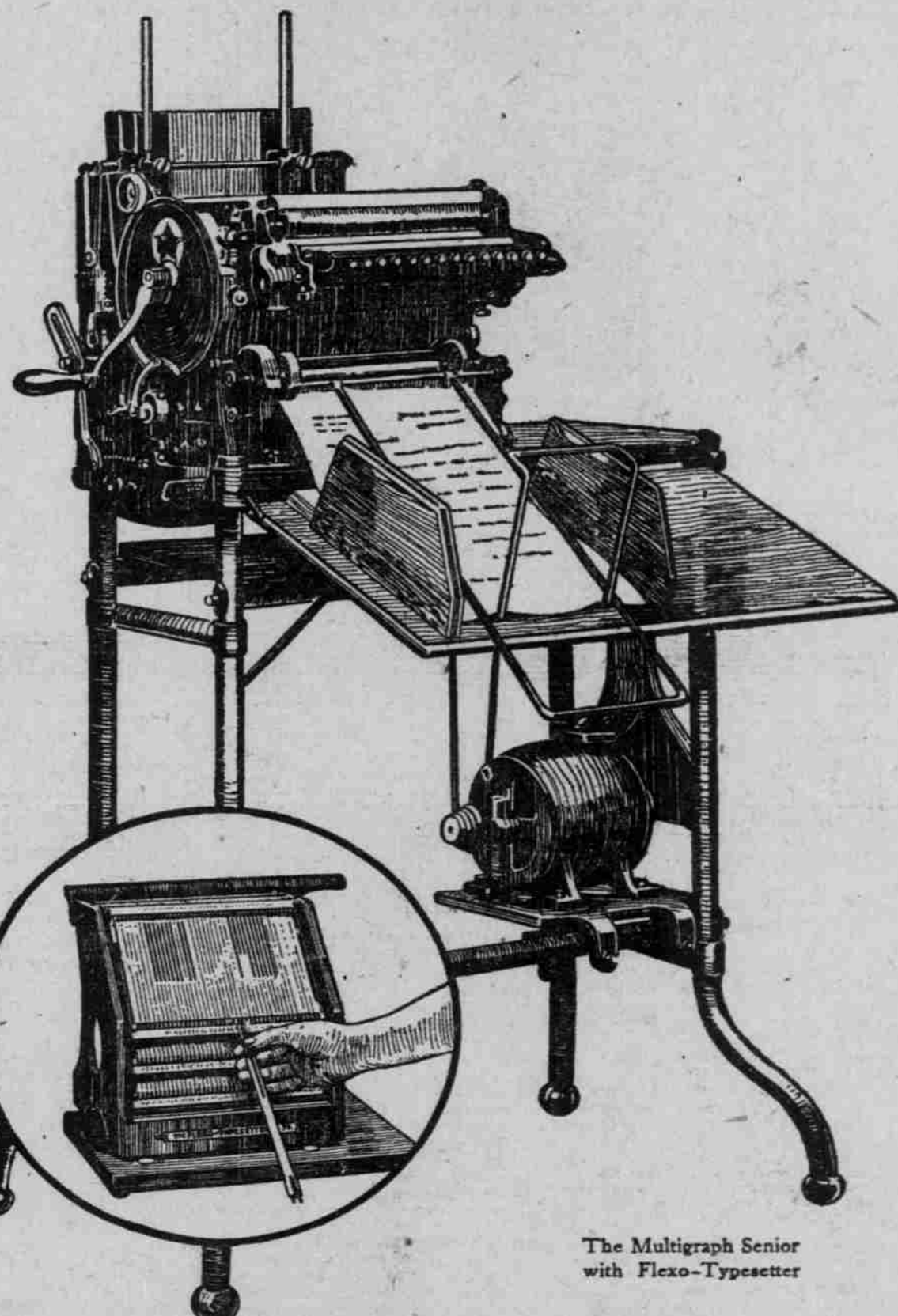
