Evil "Worse Plague Than Saloon Ever Was," Declares Advocate of Federal Divorce Law.

WASHINGTON, April 33.-More than 50 per cent of the divorce granted in this country are based on umped up charges" resulting from the fascination of the husband or wife for some one else, Francis Mino Moody, of Chicago, executive secre tary of the International Committ n Marriage and Divorce, declared esterday before the senate judiciary ommittee.

Appearing in support of a join resolution proposing a constitutions amendment providing for uniform ederal marriage and divorce laws, Mr. Moody charged that the newspapers NO DEMOCRAT IN RACE refused to print articles dealing with the seriousness of the divorce situation because many of the men con nected with the newspapers "are of that kind."

The witness declared that the divorce evil "was a worse plague than the saloon ever was," and that the remedy was in federal legislation.
