CANADA FILMS WAGES AMERICA HOCKEY

Last-Minute Scoring Nets Two Fast Goals.

SWEDEN TO PLAY FINAL

U. S. Outplayed, but Staves Off Defeat by Fast Play Until Defense Is Penetrated at Last.

ANTWERP, April 25.—(By the Associated Press.)—Canada defeated the United States 2 to 1 in a hard-fought hockey game tonight and tomorrow will meet Sweden in the final for the Olympic championship.

It was not until late in the second half that the Canadians were able to score against the Americans, who strove vainly to throw out the Swedes to penetrate Canada's defense.

American Defense Pierced. Frederickson penetrated the American defense after a long skate in the tenth minute of the second half and scored. In the 15th-minute Johannsen also scored to insure a decisive victory tomorrow.

Both the Canadian goals were shot from scrimmage and after hard fighting, Canada forwards, Hallerson, Frederickson and Goodwin, frequently took the puck from the Americans by lightning-like trips, only to lose it again a second later to Conroy, Drury or Goheen.
