LEAD DIMES CIRCULATED.
MANUFACTURER OF SPIRIOUS COINS INDICTED.

Federal Officials Recover Several But Are Unable to Say How Many Are Accepted.

Operations of an embryonic and unsuccessful counterfeit operation specialized in the manufacture of lead dimes, were brought to light yesterday when the federal grand jury returned an indictment against Isaac Wirnala, who is accused in several separate counts of counterfeiting coins and of passing them on local merchants.

According to Assistant United States Attorney Veatch, who handled the case before the grand jury, Wirnala has made a complete confession. A home-made cement die in which the "quater" coins were manufactured, was located in the shack where he lived, near Oswego.

According to Wirnala's purported admissions to Mr. Veatch, he started his counterfeiting experience with a shilling new dime as his sole capital. He is said to have acknowledged using in the manufacture of the coins, ingredients from which his die was manufactured, and then to have stolen a quantity of lead which was used in the manufacture of the coins.

Just how many dimes Wirnala made before being caught, federal officials were unable to say, although they have recovered about a dozen which were passed on local business houses.

Wirnala told Veatch that if his counterfeiting of dimes had proved a successful venture, he had planned to go into the bigger money, in the form of dollars. His idea was to get enough to take him back to live in comfort in Finland, whence he came to these shores some five years ago. He is held in the county jail waiting trial, but indications are he will plead guilty, say federal officials.

STATE VETERANS UNITE.
Permanent Organization of Old Third Men Stated for Tonight.

A permanent organization of the veterans of the 162d infantry, known as the veterans of this state as the 3d Oregon, will be effected at a meeting to be held in the armory Thursday night at 8 o'clock.

The 3d Oregon regiment was composed of men from all parts of the state, and it is expected the representatives from various sections of Oregon will be in attendance at the meeting Thursday night.

A committee of former members of the unit has drafted a constitution and by-laws, which will be submitted at the meeting.

EX-CONVICTS ALTER STAMPS IS CHARGE

Federal Grand Jury Returns Many Indictments.

"DRY" ALLEGATIONS MANY

A. R. McKinley Absolved by Investigation From Accusation Involving Liquor.

Fred Peterson and Russell Shaw, both of whom have several penitentiary terms behind them and a long list of safe-cracking jobs charged against them, were indicted yesterday by the federal grand jury on allegations of altering government war savings stamps which were stolen from the Seio State bank.

They are accused of both altering the stamps and of having them in their possession. Prosecution of both ex-convicts for alleged robbery of the Seio State bank late last fall is now pending in the state courts.

A long list of true bills was reported out yesterday by the federal grand jury in their report to Judge Wolverson. A majority of the cases involve alleged violations of the Harrison drug act and the numerous federal prohibition statutes.

Delph Veitch is held to answer an indictment accusing him of sending an obscene letter through the United States mails. He is alleged to have written such an epistle to Audra Jackson of Oregon City.

Navy Warrant Theft Charged.
Indictment of three sacks of wool stored by the government in a local warehouse is charged against Lou Harris, George Geis is accused of stealing a letter addressed to Mrs. Elizabeth Miller and stealing a navy settlement warrant for \$49.20 from the envelope.

H. G. Summerlin was indicted for the alleged starting of a fire in the Umpqua national forest last September.

J. P. Minada is held on a true bill charging him with a violation of the white slavery statute. He is alleged to have transported Eva May Lee, a school girl, from Weed, Cal., to Portland, for immoral purposes. The offense is alleged to have occurred last February. E. F. Walters is accused of stealing a couple of automobile tires from a freight car at North Powder, in February 25, last, in another true bill reported by the grand jurors.

Ben Eburbannase and McKinley Davis are held in a joint indictment accusing them of introducing intoxicating liquors on the Klamath Indian reservation.

Indictments charging violations of the Harrison drug and narcotics act involve Harry Troy, Chin Fong, Jim Lee, Ho Hume, M. Maka, Lee Gleason.

A. R. McKinley Absolved.
A not-true bill was reported out in the investigation of A. R. McKinley, local manager of the Brunswick-Balke-Coller company, in whose place of business a large quantity of California wines was found several weeks ago, and for which two men have heretofore pleaded guilty in federal court. The grand jury was called upon to make a complete inquiry, with the result that McKinley was absolved from any connection with the importation or sale of the liquor.

She will be at liberty under \$1500 until her attorney determines whether or not an appeal shall be taken.

Mrs. Connet was found guilty of operating an illicit whisky still at her farm home near Bull Run. While out on bonds on this charge she was arrested by revenue agents on another federal bootlegging charge. This second charge is still pending.
