

RECALL OF HIGHWAY LOANS CONSIDERED

Commission May Have to Ask Counties for Money.

PREDICAMENT IS FACED

If Bond Measure Does Not Pass, Commission Will Be Without Funds to Prosecute Work.

Various counties in Oregon have borrowed from the state highway commission sums of money to enable them to perform work in connection with the highway programme. If the road measure on the ballot is rejected in the May election the commission may have to call in these loans in order to raise money to prosecute its work on the highways, but if the measure carries it will not be necessary to press the counties for early repayment. This policy became known at the highway commission meeting yesterday, when counties were asking for further assistance and when one or two counties said they could not very well repay loans due in 1920 and asked for an extension.

The one county which "touched" the commission for a loan was Crook. Judge Wallace explained that without a little more assistance from the commission the county could not proceed with its share of the improvement in the Ochoco canyon. The judge was promised \$5000. A Lane county delegation asked permission to put in some timber instead of concrete bridges on the Pacific highway, explaining that money was tight. Commissioner Kiddie declared that he doesn't like the idea of wooden bridges on the Pacific highway, but that it was possible for the commission to make a loan to Lane county of enough money to have concrete bridges. The bridges proposed are at Cow Creek, Camas, Swale and a bridge south of Creswell.

Another Section Dependent. Also dependent on the result of the election is the section of The Dallas-California highway, between Bend and the Jefferson county line. The commission ordered that contracts be let for surfacing such parts as are necessary, as soon as funds are available.

Whether the Pacific highway, on the east side, should go to Harrisburg to join the west side road, or continue on south through Coburg and thence to Eugene, was a matter to which the commission gave a couple of hours' consideration. Delegates were on hand advocating both plans. As Commissioner Kiddie is not familiar with that country, no decision will be made by the commission until after Mr. Kiddie has been over the ground. Both are acquainted with the territory.

Frank J. Miller of Albany pointed out that Linn county voted \$600,000 in bonds last year and designated \$100,000 of this sum for the Pacific highway between Albany and Harrisburg, the route designated in the original state road map approved by the people. This money is now in the east and west side branches of the Pacific highway together at Junction City. The County Commissioners want the road located directly between Coburg and Eugene, eliminating Harrisburg and Junction City entirely. Figures were presented showing that the change to the Coburg route would throw \$200,000 on the state owing to the paving involved.

Delay is Petitioned. Word was received that a petition was on the way from Lincoln county to ask that nothing be done on the Simpson creek route east of Toledo for the present. In explanation, it was said that there is a bond issue pending and that the people back of the bond issue want a new location which will take the road to Elk City. The suggested route is about two miles longer than the one the commission favors and would cost far more than the \$100,000 which the bonds call for. No action will be taken by the commission until after the election.

The Associated General Contractors of the Pacific Northwest presented to the commission a series of suggested changes for contracts. Many of the suggestions are mere matters of detail and others are of a character which require legislative action.

Only \$47,810 of contracts were awarded at the meeting. All bids received on surfacing 1.4 miles of the Pacific highway from Oregon to Baslow were rejected and the work will be done by force account. Bridge contracts were awarded as follows: Bridges at Birdsey creek and Miller's gulch, in Jackson county, to F. C. Carter for \$12,182.50. Overhead crossing, near Ashland, Jackson county, to D. M. Stevenson for \$35,437.50. J. Elmer Nelson was low bidder for the bridge across Gravo creek, Josephine county, for \$18,317.50. This bridge is to be a 30-50 proposition with the county and has been held in abeyance pending the decision of the county court. Thomas E. Young was low bidder for grading 3.3 miles of the Toledo-Newport road for \$15,537. The matter was referred to the engineer.

NEW COUNTY IS PROPOSED

PLAN TO DIVIDE JEFFERSON AND WASCO LAUNCHED.

Proposition Likely to Go Before Voters in November: Portland Lawyers Handle Case.

THE DALLAS, Or., April 27.—(Special.)—To create a new county out of territory in southern Wasco county and in northern Jefferson county is the definite plan of certain interests in that section, which came to light today. The proposition in all probability will be submitted to the voters at the November election.

The first indication of the plan came when an accountant, representing a auditing firm of Portland, arrived in The Dallas and began scrutinizing county records which had to do with the valuations of southern Wasco county lands. Residents of southern Wasco county today admitted that a division was contemplated to be followed by the creation of a new county. Some denounced the plan sweepingly while others sponsored it.
