RENT EVIDENCE GATHERED

SPECIAL COMMITTEE APPOINTED BY MAYOR BAKER.

Data to Be Compiled for Use of Body to Be Named Later to Probe Alleged Profiteering.

Although Mayor Baker has not received nominations for the committee to investigate rent profiteering in Portland, he has started the machinery gathering the evidence to be used by the committee.

Yesterday Mayor Baker appointed W. D. Whitcomb of Whitcomb, Whitfield company, public accountants; Lionel C. Mackay, deputy city attorney, and Nelson S. Pike as a committee to gather all evidence pertaining to the subject of rentals. The entire office force of Whitcomb, Whitfield company has been turned over to the city for this investigation without cost to the city, and it is expected that the necessary data will be compiled within a few days.

"This committee began operations yesterday, with a two-fold purpose," explained Mayor Baker. "In the first place, evidence will be gathered for the use of the committee of seven, to save the committee time and work. It also will have the effect of making the facts in the case and give me opportunity of publishing any flagrant cases that exist."

"I am told that we can obtain all the necessary evidence without passing an ordinance. I also am told that such an ordinance as has been temporarily set aside, would materially injure Portland. I am adopting the latest method of demonstrating what can be done. If the plan fails, I will recommend the passage of the anti-rent profiteering ordinance."

Deputy City Attorney Mackay has worked for several weeks on the subject of rent profiteering, and has gathered hundreds of complaints. The special committee will investigate all such complaints.

The mayor has complaints showing that many increases in rents in Portland are scheduled for May 1, and he believes that some of these increases are not justified.

MOUNTAIN TRAIL OPEN

New Route to Angel's Rest Used by Club Members.

Trail club members opened the new route from Angel's Rest to Little Mountain to a point 2000 feet above sea level last Sunday when a group spent the day on the trail. Lunch was eaten in a hemlock grove about 2500 feet up. Snow was encountered 500 feet beyond and it was necessary to call off work for the day. On the next trip, probably June 5 and 6, it is planned to reach the summit over the new trail.

A detour will be made for the present for about two miles and in this way 20 minutes is added to the time in making the climb and advantage is taken of existing trails and an old skid road. It will be straightened later. The new trail will offer an easier and quicker climb than the one up Multnomah creek and will have more scenic attractions.

AIRMAN PRAISES OREGON

State Declared to Have Done More for Aviation Than Any Other.

SALEM, Or., April 27.—(Special).—Major Albert Smith of the army air service has written Governor Olcott that Oregon has done more toward promoting aviation activities than any other state in the union.

Major Smith a few weeks ago made a record trip by airplane from Tacoma, Wash., to San Diego, covering the distance in a day. He now is incapacitated in the Letterman general hospital at San Francisco, but, regardless of this, states that he, in company with Colonel H. H. Arnold, commander of the western department for the air service, and Major Spauls have been planning to attend a circus at Eugene about May 10, and hopes also to participate in other activities in Oregon.

RAIL AGENTS MEET TODAY

COAST PASSENGER ASSOCIATION TO BE REORGANIZED.

Pre-War Plan for Handling Business to Be Revived at Conference at Seattle.

Passenger agents of railroads in the Pacific northwest will meet this afternoon at Seattle to reorganize the North Pacific Coast Passenger association along pre-war lines to handle passenger business in this territory. This association ceased to exist when the government railroad administration was formed, and the passenger matters came under the supervision of the north Pacific coast passenger committee, composed of general passenger agents, with A. D. Charlton as chairman. The call for the meeting today was sent out by Mr. Charlton, as passenger agent of the Northern Pacific, acting on request of the various interested lines. The meeting will be held in the Oregon-Washington depot.

This morning there will be a session of the passenger committee. Important subjects will be considered. The committee will remain officially in existence during the six months' period of partial federal control.

ACCUSED GANGSTER FINED

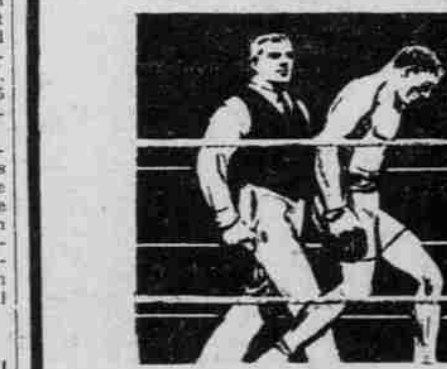
C. Krause Convicted on Charge of Resisting Patrolmen.

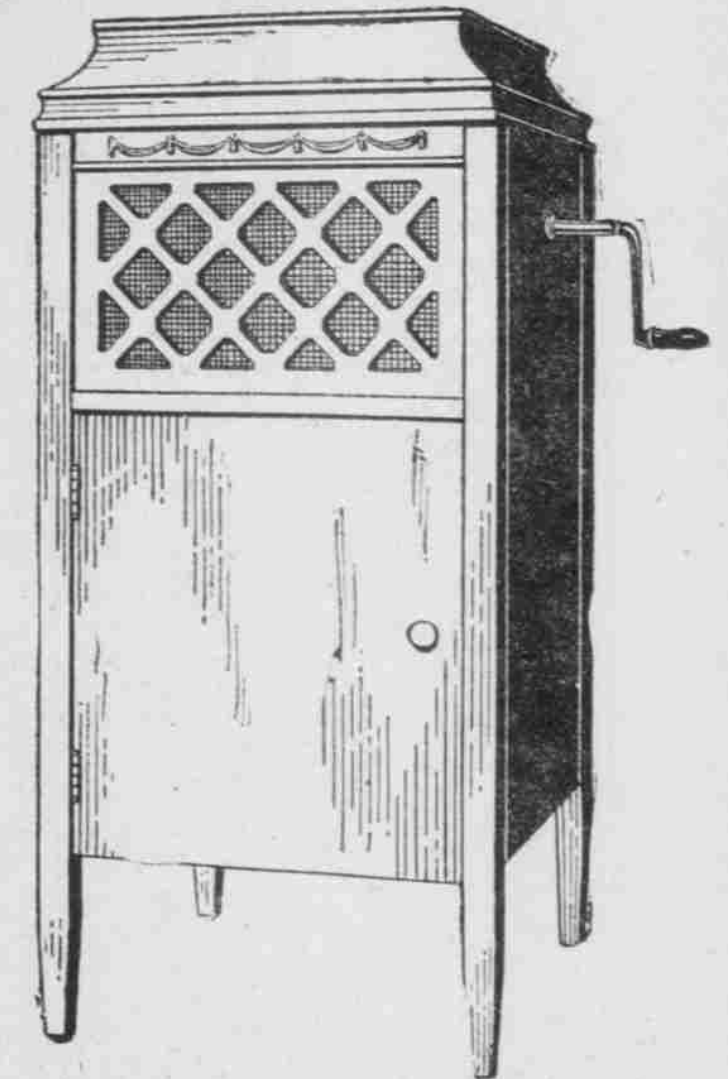

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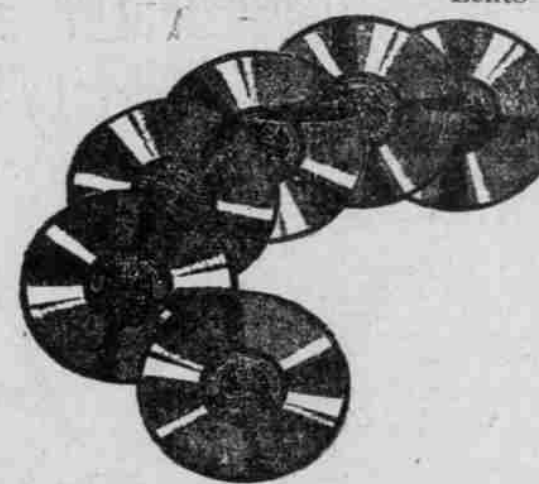

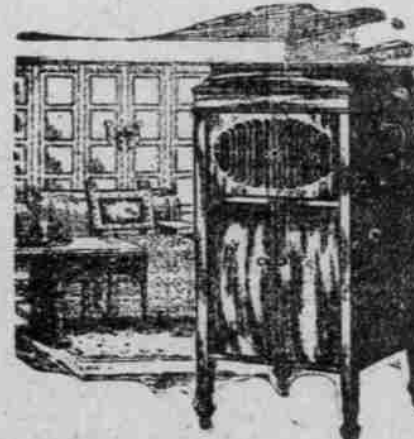
