

R. D. INMAN, OREGON LUMBERMAN, IS DEAD

Career of 40 Years in Portland Industry Ends.

MILL ERECTED HERE

President of Company Succumbs After Operation for Ear Trouble; Funeral Not Yet Set.

Robert D. Inman, Portland lumberman and president of the Inman-Poulsen Lumber company, and whose life had been identified with the industrial development of this city for the last 40 years, died at St. Vincent's hospital yesterday at 9:30, following a major operation for ear trouble last Friday.

Mr. Inman had been reported out of danger following the operation and consequently it was a shock to his relatives and friends when the turn for the worse came Monday night.

Mr. Inman was known throughout the country for his mill, the Inman-Poulsen plant, which is considered one of the largest and most up-to-date plants of the kind in the west.

His life was one in which the romance of the west was woven from the beginning. He knew the dangers of the long trail westward, the thrill of the Indian attack, the toil of a tie cutter and an engineer. With the adventurous spirit of the typically western man, he hewed his own successful career, making himself known as one of the leaders of industry of the northwest.

Mr. Inman Born in Ohio. A native of Ohio, Mr. Inman began his career as a tow-boy on the old Ohio canal. He was bound out by his mother to W. H. Davidson, a pioneer who came west in 1865 with a large train of immigrants to the Pacific coast. The trip lasted seven months, and at Rock creek the members of the party were attacked by Indians and six persons were killed.

On his arrival in Oregon, Mr. Inman worked for a time on a farm in Washington county. Later, in June, 1889, he located in Portland, where he was employed by the "west side road" cutting ties. He next obtained a position with the Oregon & California railroad, serving his time from brakeman to fireman. After severing his connection with the railroad he became identified with the John Wilson circus, remaining with the exhibition for two years. A year thereafter was spent in the employ of G. W. Shaver, and in 1895 Mr. Inman entered the employ of the Willamette Steam mills. He soon was promoted to a position in the machinery department, where he remained for seven years.

Mechanical Ability Developed. During this time he developed a remarkable mechanical ability, which was probably inherited from his father, and later, when he became associated with the Northwest Pacific Lumber company as one-quarter owner and director, he was well qualified for the responsibility of the construction of the new mill and the placing of the machinery. In 1899 he resigned his directorship and sold his interest in the company, having been identified with the concern for seven years.

Mr. Inman's next venture in the lumber industry, of which he was a thorough master, occurred in 1899, when, in partnership with Johan Poulsen, the Inman-Poulsen Lumber company was incorporated with Mr. Inman as president and Mr. Poulsen as secretary and treasurer. The mills were constructed in 1899 and in 1899 the lumber business was inaugurated which has since developed into one of the largest on the Pacific coast.

To Mr. Inman is due the credit for a number of important patents among them being a power set works for setting out the log on the carriage.

Aside from his connection with milling matters, Mr. Inman was variously associated with business, political and social affairs of the city and state. In 1892 he was elected to the state legislature and so well did he serve his constituents that he was elected to the state senate on the citizens' ticket in 1900.

In addition to his other interests Mr. Inman was a director in the Merchants' National bank when this institution was in existence, a member of the Chamber of Commerce, and for six years he served as water commissioner. He was a member of the Masons, holding membership with Harmony lodge and Al Kader Temple. He was also a member of the Hoo Hoo, of which organization he served as state snark for two terms and one term was on the supreme nine. He was also identified with the Portland Rowing club and the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club.

While he was in the political field Mr. Inman was a candidate for mayor of the city against Judge George H. Williams. He was defeated by a small margin in one of the most bitterly contested elections in the history of the city. His last public activity was as a member of the Port of Portland commission.

His widow, two daughters and a stepdaughter are the only surviving relatives. The daughters, Miss Minnie Myrtle and Miss Ivy Frances Inman, make their home in Boston. The stepdaughter is Miss Alta Mansfield-Inman.

The body is at Finley & Son's chapel. Definite arrangements for the funeral have not yet been made. The two daughters were notified of their father's death yesterday and started for Portland.

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ROGUE ARCH COMPLETED

SPAN AND APPROACHES MAKE TOTAL LENGTH OF 450 FEET.

Structure to Be Known as "Rocky Point Bridge" as Typifying Vicinity Where Located.

SALEM, Or., April 27.—(Special.)—The Rogue river arch, spanning the Rogue river at a point about one mile north of Gold Hill, has been completed and is now open to traffic, according to C. B. McCullough, bridge engineer for the state highway commission.

The main span of the bridge is 113 feet, flanked on either side by approaches which increase the length of the structure to 450 feet. The bridge was built by Parker & Bassfield of Portland and cost approximately \$50,000. Of this sum half was paid by the state and the other half by Jackson county. Plans and specifications for the structure were prepared by Mr. McCullough and it was one of the largest undertakings included in the present good roads campaign now being carried on in Oregon.

Because of its location on the Pacific highway and the fact that it is one of the first bridges to confront northbound automobile tourists special attention was paid to the structural features of the span.

The bridge is to be known as the Rocky Point bridge, the name being typical of the vicinity in which it is located.

CEMETERY SITE SOUGHT

Boardman Feels Need of Providing Local Burying Ground.

BOARDMAN, Or., April 27.—(Special.)—The Boardman community club at its annual meeting elected officers, as follows: A. W. Cobb, president, and M. E. Signs, secretary, re-elected; S. H. Boardman, vice-president, and W. A. Goodwin, O. H. Warner, E. Miles and Nick Falder, members of the executive committee.

Committees were appointed to represent the club in arranging for the John Day barbecue at Boardman in June, to locate an aviation field and community park, and to find a plot of ground suitable for cemetery purposes.

The sudden death of W. E. Harper from acute indigestion Friday night and the necessity of removing the body to Irrigon for burial emphasizes the necessity of a local burying ground. Mr. Harper's death was the first in Boardman this year.

BOISE EDUCATOR RESIGNS

School Superintendent to Get \$6000 a Year at Tucson, Arizona.

BOISE, Idaho, April 27.—(Special.)—C. E. Rose, for 16 years superintendent of schools in Boise, who resigned several weeks ago, has been elected superintendent of schools at Tucson, Ariz., at a salary of \$6000 per annum. He will take up his duties in the new school year in the fall.

Plans are being made in Boise now to hold a bond election to raise \$400,000 for the erection of a mechanic arts building for the high school and the central portion of the high school building. Both are badly needed, as the school is crowded. Recommendations have been made by the school board to add a number of supervisors to assist in the inspection work.

Work on Bridge Resumed.

ALBANY, Or., April 27.—(Special.)—The construction of a new railroad bridge at Albany to carry trains of the Albany-Yaquina branch of the Southern Pacific across the Willamette river has been resumed. This work was begun last summer but was not completed before high water. It is expected that the bridge will be finished successfully this summer.

Chinese Boycott Japanese Goods.

NEW YORK, April 27.—Six hundred Chinese merchants from all sections of the United States, members of the On Leon tong, went on record at a meeting Monday against the boycotting of Japanese goods. They expressed resentment at the attitude of Japan toward China and voted neither to import nor deal in Japanese merchandise.

Linn Grand Jury in Session.

ALBANY, Or., April 27.—(Special.)—The Linn county grand jury met in Albany yesterday and began probing into criminal matters the last two months. The jury probably will be in session three or four days.

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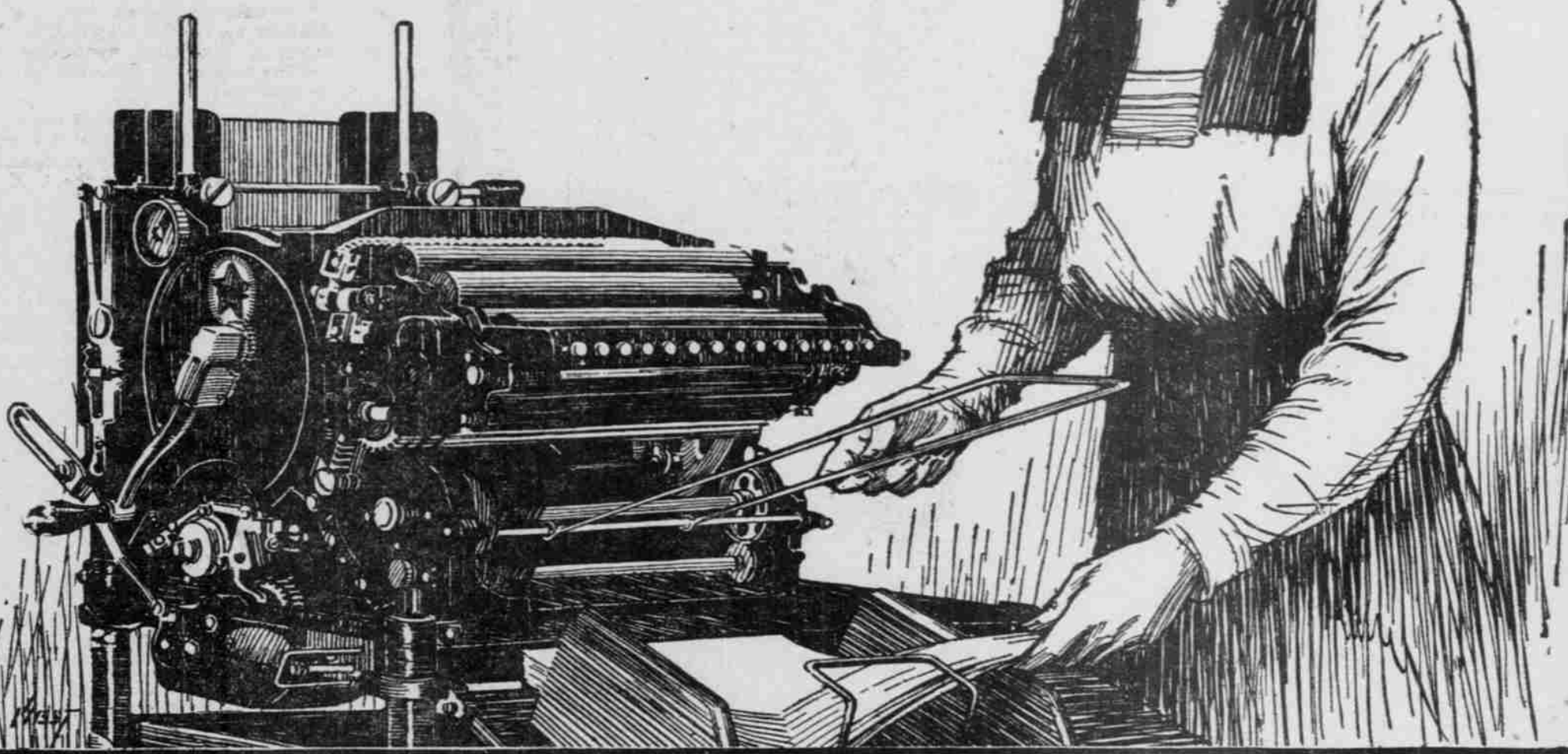

3 AUTO CAMPS PLANNED

CITY TO PROVIDE PARKING SPACE FOR TOURISTS.

Locations Not Fixed but Will Be Announced in Few Days.

Is Expectation.

Automobile parking space for tourists, equipped with camping facilities, will be in readiness by June 1, according to City Commissioner Pier, in charge of the park bureau.

The city will provide at least three automobile park sites, the location of which probably will be announced next week.

One site of 10 acres will be established on Eighty-second street and

Sandy boulevard. Lease has not been signed, but Commissioner Pier is certain that the city can secure this tract.

It is possible that the city will convert a portion of the old poor farm tract on the Canyon road into an automobile park site, at least during the convention month of June.

This tract is equipped with water and a comfort station can be erected without difficulty. It is probable that about 10 or 15 acres of the 200 available will be designated for automobile park purposes.

Another contemplated site is on property between the Laurelhurst park and East Stark street. Negotiations are now pending for the lease of this ground.

Grand Foreman Banqueted.

EUGENE, Or., April 27.—George N. Frink, grand foreman of the Brotherhood of American Yeomen, visited the local lodge of that order last night

and was tendered a banquet. During the evening 40 candidates were initiated and Mr. Frink and his wife, who is accompanying him on his western tour, exemplified the work.

Power Plant Sold.

ABERDEEN, Wash., April 27.—(Special.)—The Oakville Light & Power plant has been sold by Frank Liesner of Centralia, formerly of Oakville, to C. A. Martin of Puyallup.

Several improvements on the system are in prospect. It is stated that another Oakville enterprise will be carried on by Mr. Martin, but its nature has not yet been announced.
