FRESHMEN SECOND IN WILLAMETTE TRACK MEET.

Two Classes Now Tied in Interclass Rivalry Scores, With Sophomores Runnersup.

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY, Salem, April 28.—(Special.)—With an eight-point lead over their nearest opponents, the Junior class won first place in the annual interclass track and field meet yesterday afternoon, capturing a total of 53 points. The freshmen were second with a score of 45 and the sophomores third with 28. No team was entered in the meet by the seniors.

Although the meet was open to everyone in school, several members of the track team were prevented from entering their events due to lack of training, and no high marks were made. However, several promising men were discovered.

The juniors and freshmen are now tied in the interclass rivalry scores, with 19 points each. Only one more event is on the schedule, the tennis tournament being listed for this week. The sophomores have been picked as easy winners.
