

GOVERNMENT PLANS TO SUE U. S. STEEL

Supreme Court Asked to Re-open Anti-Trust Action.

OLD QUESTION REVIVED

First Opinion Fails to Determine Whether Corporation Is Restraining Trade, Is Contention.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—The supreme court was asked today by the government to reopen the anti-trust suit against the United States Steel corporation, dismissed on March 1 by a four to three decision.

The government's argument was based largely on the court decision last Monday ordering the dissolution of the Reading company and its subsidiaries.

The government declared that the steel case would seem to fall within the Reading case and that "the holding of the steel corporation to be a corporation under the anti-trust act would appear to conflict with the conclusions expressed in this and other decisions."

According to the government, the court's opinion failed to determine the question whether the corporation was a combination in restraint of trade.

The government said, however, that apparently "the opinion did not concede that a crime was committed by the perpetrators of the steel corporation."

The criminal combination, the motion continued, "is permitted to continue, however, because mere size is not a violation of the law; it did not achieve a 100 per cent monopoly; it did not oppress competitors; several attorneys general failed to file suit; dissolution involves a risk of injury to the public interest."

"Notwithstanding these considerations we earnestly insist that a criminal combination should not be permitted to continue its suppression of competition between the constituent members of the combination. No criminal is exonerated from punishment because he makes a use of property so acquired; and no criminal combination should be exempted from the pains and penalties of the Sherman act because after having achieved its unlawful ends, it merely maintains the fruits of its illegal act without seeking daily to commit new ones."

According to the government, the steel corporation is a "combination of combinations," by which approximately 48 independent concerns were brought under one business control.

BRAIN-BORING ACHIEVED

PURIFIED AIR IS USED IN SURGERY DISCOVERY.

Johns Hopkins Doctor Declares Only Local Anaesthetic Is Administered for Operation.

BALTIMORE, Md., April 28.—(Special.)—Dr. Walter Dandy, of Johns Hopkins hospital, has discovered a process by which purified air is pumped into the channels of the human brain thus making possible a study of the living brain, something that has been the dream of scientists for generations.

The discovery is of tremendous importance in the study of the brain and the removal of tumors and other lesions of the brain by making possible the exact location of brain tumors and thus, after having been located, their removal.

The discovery of Dr. Dandy is the result of a long series of experiments on animals, whose lives have been sacrificed that human beings might be saved.

Prior to Dr. Dandy's discovery, efforts to locate such tumors by means of the X-ray were futile.

In every case where the method has been used, the method has been successful in locating tumors and other brain obstructions within a hairbreadth. One of the most remarkable features of the discovery is that it is most efficacious when only a local anesthetic is used.

Dr. Dandy used a complete anesthetic. Then he tried an anesthetic designed only to kill the pain of boring through the skull and into the ventricle. It was discovered that the patient felt no ill-effects and was able to give assistance to the surgeon.

means committee will report out a bill to be taken up in the house Monday. 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The stock, the complaint alleges, is the property of Mr. Nettleton, and is necessary to enable him to retain control of the Post-Intelligencer.

The complaint alleges that on about December 2, 1919, the plaintiff, Nettleton, delivered to the defendant, George Boole, a certain sum of money, and deposited said sum above described stock as collateral security for the payment of said note.

At the time of the execution of the note, the complaint continues, "the defendant, George Boole, and Kenneth Mackintosh, for the accommodation of the plaintiff, signed said note as joint makers with him."

It is alleged that before the note was due, on or about February 20, 1920, "the defendant wrongfully and without the knowledge or consent of the plaintiff, paid to the said bank the amount of said note and the bank wrongfully delivered said certificates of stock to the defendant."

Later, on March 4, 1920, the complaint recites that the plaintiff "tendered to George Boole in legal tender cash in the sum of \$5,000 and thereon from February 20 to the date of said tender and demanded a return of said certificates of stock."

The defendant is alleged to have refused to accept the offer and to have retained the stock without the consent of the plaintiff.

The complaint further alleges that "the defendant is threatening to sell the said stock to William Randolph Hearst and others and to deliver said stock to him and them in order to aid the said Hearst in procuring control of the management of the Post-Intelligencer company's newspaper, and will do so unless restrained and enjoined as sought herein."

Control is at stake, the complaint sets forth that Mr. Nettleton controls sufficient other stock of the Post-Intelligencer company which, in conjunction with the 700 shares enables him to control the management of the Post-Intelligencer, "but which is not sufficient without said 700 shares to enable the plaintiff to control said stock."

The plaintiff asks that a temporary restraining order be issued to prevent the defendant from disposing of the 700 shares of stock to Hearst or any persons other than the plaintiff during the pendency of the action; that the conclusion of the hearing a permanent injunction be issued, that the defendant be required to return the 700 shares of stock to Mr. Nettleton and that the court require the defendant to pay the costs of the action.

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
