

I. W. W. FOR PEACE SAYS RED PRISONER

Sorlie Had Never Heard of Any Violence.

CENTRALIA TOUCH HURTS

Poet, With Illustrious Jail Record, Explains Methods of Court-Ing Muse.

Lawrence Sorlie, I. W. W. member, had testified that from the time he had joined the organization, September 20, 1919, until he was arrested he had never heard of any acts of violence committed by Industrial Workers of the World. This was during the last hours of the case of the defendant before Circuit Judge Morrow yesterday.

"When were you arrested?" demanded Earl F. Bernard, deputy district attorney, in opening the cross-examination.

"The night of November 11, 1919," "I may have."

"Did you see anything in those papers about an affair at Centralia?"

Centralia Affair Sore Spot. With a howl of anger, George F. Vanderveer, I. W. W. attorney, sprang to his feet in protest. A protracted argument ensued, which ended when Bernard withdrew the question, although he still maintained his right to ask it. The Centralia slaying of a service man by the I. W. W. on Armistice day, 1919, has proved a touchy point with the defense in local I. W. W. trials, particularly as Vanderveer insists that he represents an organization composed of "the pacifists of the world."

The defense concluded at 5 o'clock and arguments will open at 9:30 this morning. Judge Morrow indicated that he would require the arguments to be confined within five hours for each the prosecution and the defense. While on the witness stand yesterday, Sorlie admitted that he had joined the I. W. W. with some knowledge of its teachings and said that, rather than give up his membership in Oregon, where juries have held the organization to be unlawful, he would go to another state where the I. W. W. was in better standing under the law.

I. W. W. Pacifist Alleged.

Ralph Chaplin, I. W. W. poet, who was convicted in Chicago with William D. Haywood and sentenced to 34 years in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth for obstructing the draft, was a star witness for the defense yesterday. He testified to alleged pacifist aims of the I. W. W., and declared that no inflammatory literature or pamphlets on sabotage had been issued by general headquarters of the I. W. W. at 1001 West Madison street, Chicago, since September 5, 1917.

Under cross-examination Chaplin admitted that he had been in the Cook county jail for nine months, in court during the Haywood trial for 120 days, and 11 months in the penitentiary since September 5, 1917, and was not very accurate in his testimony with general headquarters. He is now out on bond, pending appeal. He explained the inspiration given him for the writing of several poems in evidence as part of the I. W. W. propaganda.

Judge Morrow permitted Vanderveer to put in evidence strike bulletins issued by a local I. W. W. organization in Spokane in 1917 to show that violence was opposed, but reversed his ruling when Vanderveer protested against allowing the state to introduce a notebook printed by the I. W. W. in Spokane in 1919.

YEGG SUSPECTS ARRESTED

STEEL DRILLS AND DYNAMITE CAPS ALSO SEIZED.

Men Released From Jail on Bail After State Charges of Vagrancy Are Lodged.

Safe-cracking operations of an extensive character are believed to have been forestalled by the arrest yesterday morning of John Roe, alias Johnny the Late, and Tom Shea, alias Tom Malone, two yegg suspects, who were taken into custody in Lents by United States Secret Service operative Joseph F. Walters and relieved of extensive crackmen's supplies.

The two were released from the county jail on bail last night after state charges of vagrancy had been placed against them.

When arrested by the federal agents they had a quantity of dynamite caps, fuses, burglar kits and modern steel drills.

The drills are similar to some which have been used in recent safe jobs in Portland. Following the arrest it was thought the two might be associates of Fred Peterson and Russell Shawham, taken into custody March 19 for the burglary of the Socio bank. The officers, however, were unable to secure any evidence of such a connection.

Roe is said to be an ex-convict and a former companion of the late Wisconsin Dick Troy, who was shot and killed in Portland recently by Ralph Bruno. According to officials, he did time at McNeil's island for the robbery of the postoffice at Fresno, Cal.

Arrangements have been made whereby those who do not have their own conveyances will be taken through the different orchards, free of charge, and open house will be the order of the day at the community hall by the women of Dundee.

WARDS TO GET SUPPLIES

GOVERNMENT BOOKING AFTER BEARING SEA ISLANDERS.

Order Will Include 10,000 Feet of Movie Film and Library of 400 Volumes.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 8.—(Special.)—Supplies, ranging from a Jersey cow to talcum powder and from farming implements to salad forks, are to be sent from Seattle to the villagers on the Prohibition islands, according to the government call for bids received today by J. L. McElpherson, manager of the Alaska bureau of the chamber of commerce.

These people, numbering 155, and descendants from a group of Alaskan islanders transplanted to the Bering sea islands by Russia more than a century ago to develop the seal fur industry, are wards of the government. Isolated though they are, they have caught the motion picture spirit, and 100,000 feet of film will go north, as will a library of 400 volumes.

Some of the villagers are so round and some so tall that the government in its call designates special-sized clothing for such fishermen as John Merculuff and Metronan Kruskoff. Hundreds of articles were wanted by the government, which must land the supplies between June and September. Bids are asked by the department of commerce, and the list may be seen at the chamber office.

Strike Hearing Postponed.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, April 28.—Although the hearing of the ten Salt Lake strike leaders, scheduled May 5, testimony of five government witnesses from Idaho, including P. E. Marnian, department of justice agent at Boise, was read into the record for use when the trial starts.

A strip of land extending from the Ford street bridge to the eastern border of Washington Park was yesterday offered as a donation to the city of Portland for park purposes.

The offer comes from the King estate, through Alex A. Rae, administrator. Mr. Rae appeared before the city council yesterday and explained that the strip assessed at \$8000 was covered with beautiful shrubbery, fir and other trees. When the properties of

the King estate were divided into town lots for sale purposes, this strip was set aside for donation to the city. Street assessments of about \$3000 are the only liabilities against the property and it is probable that the city will be asked to assume these charges if the land is accepted.

SENATE VOTES NAVAL APPROPRIATION BILL

Amendment to Develop Petroleum Reserves Approved.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—The naval appropriation bill, carrying approximately \$45,000,000 for 1921 expenditures, passed the senate today on a record vote and was sent to conference for adjustment of \$40,000,000 senate increase over the house bill.

An amendment designed to develop naval petroleum land reserves, chiefly in California, was approved by the senate.

OIL EMBARGO SUGGESTED

Dugan discussion of the oil embargo on American oil to conserve supplies for the American navy and merchant marine.

Creation of a federal corporation to secure oil lands for the government was suggested by Senator Phelan and Senator Jones.

Maintenance of the present naval force of about 137,000 men and 20,000 marines is provided for in the bill, which passed the senate in less than two days after it was taken up.

Also appropriated \$108,000,000 to complete the 1916 building programme of 135 vessels due to be finished in three more years at additional cost of \$261,725,000, but does not provide for any extension of that programme.

A provision for retention in active service of 20,000 naval reservists and 1200 reserve officers was adopted by the senate to maintain the present fleet. Because of disappointing enlistments and desertions—the latter said to have been around 5000 within the last year—the temporary forces the senate was told, are imperative for efficient operation of the ships.

Another amendment added by the senate provides for developing the naval oil reserves, through lease, sale or government operation.

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LAST AMERICAN TROOPS TO CONVOY GERMAN.

Few Red Cross Workers Left, According to Arrivals on Transport Great Northern.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28.—No American troops and but few Red Cross workers remain in Siberia, while the Stevens party of American engineers, known as the Russian railway service, expects to be out by May 1, according to arrivals today on the transport Great Northern from Vladivostok via Manila. The Great Northern brought 680 casual troops, who comprised almost the last detachment to leave Siberia.

The last American troops, composed of men from the 27th and 31st infantry, were expected to convoy German prisoners to Trieste on the Mount Vernon, according to Miss Margaret Weir of Seattle, who was one of the 31 Red Cross workers who reached here on the Great Northern. Six American consular officials from Siberia were aboard also. Thirty bodies of soldiers, most of whom died in Siberia, were on board.

Several of the Red Cross party wore the order of St. Anne, conferred by the Russian government, while Miss Margaret Mathew was decorated with the order of St. George. Only one other American woman had been so honored, she said, Mrs. St. John, chief Red Cross nurse, who is at present in Japan.

Although no consular work has been carried on in Siberia for some months past, the American government is now sending consuls to Chita, Kuznetsov, L. N. Shaw of New York stated.

TEACHERS TO TALK TAX

Association Will Discuss Minimum Salary and Elect Officers.

OREGON CITY, Or., April 28.—(Special.)—Clackamas County Teachers' association will hold its last annual meeting of the school year on Saturday, May 1, and there will be fully 2000 girls and trotting boats in the water on that day. As the Sunday closing period will begin at 6 o'clock Saturday night, there will be only six hours' fishing the first day.

With the increased number of buyers on the river and the great demand for the early spring Chinooks, high prices are expected to prevail. The Columbia River Fishermen's Protective union at its recent meeting set figures at 14 cents a pound for small or cannerly fish and 16 cents for large or cold storage fish, the dividing line between the two classes being fixed at 23 pounds. The packers are to meet this week to consider these demands.
