

STATE NEWSPAPERS FOR SCHOOL TAXES

Measure to be Voted on May 21 Heartily Approved.

NEEDS ARE POINTED OUT

Editorial Opinion in All Parts of State is Strongly Favorable to Increased Revenues.

SALEM, Or., April 27.—(Special.)—Reports reaching the offices of the state superintendent of public instruction here indicate that practically every newspaper in Oregon favors the passage of the so-called two-mill tax measure for the support and maintenance of the elementary schools of the state, as well as the bills providing more money for the higher educational institutions.

E. F. Carleton, assistant state superintendent of schools, has charge of the campaign for the elementary school tax, and organizations for the support of the bill have been formed in practically every district in the state. In only a few instances have reports been received indicating opposition to the measure.

The following clippings from the state press indicate the popularity of the movement to improve the condition of the schools, which is impossible unless more money is provided to meet the steadily increasing costs of operation:

Astoria Budget—The millage tax measure to provide for the levying of two mills for the maintenance of the grade schools of the state was unanimously endorsed by the convention of district directors held on Saturday afternoon.

Burns News—Parents should be made to understand that the elementary schools, especially the high schools, are being hopelessly crippled for the next few years if this bill fails.

Small Schools Helped.—Turner Tribune—The two-mill tax for school purposes would not increase direct taxation in the least. The measure merely calls for a readjustment, for the establishment of a new form of school would be beneficial to the taxpayers, rather than harmful. It could mean that every school in the country would be assisted, that schools like those of Turner would be allowed to continue, and no greater expense to the taxpayer.

Town Independent—Every man and woman in the state of Oregon who is a loyal American citizen should support the two-mill tax for the elementary schools at the May primaries.

Happen Times—A dangerous crisis faces the schools at the present time. Many of our teachers are securing various kinds of work for the summer at salaries of \$100 per month or more. Therefore it behooves us to support the measure which will provide additional funds for every public school in the state.

Vale Enterprise—The women of the county have worked hard in the matter of organizing and perfecting parent-teacher associations and they are looking forward to the final organization meeting with much interest. They are showing considerable interest in the millage tax and the campaign of education in the state.

Willamette Headlight—The proposed two-mill tax upon all property of the state for common school purposes will materially aid and should receive the active support of every one.

Cottage Grove Sentinel—Mr. Stewart also made an appeal for the two-mill rural school's amendment. He explained that the object of the amendment is to collect school tax from vast areas of property in the state which now pay no school tax. The tax upon this property is not collected, but very few of the owners will object to doing their part to help to educate the children of the state. The money collected from these properties will be divided among all the school districts of the county. You have nothing to lose and a possibility of gaining something.

Halfway Herald—While voters should scrutinize closely all measures for a larger tax, this one will stand examination. The two-mill tax does not necessarily mean that the school tax will be increased. It will be larger. The districts which already have a good school tax may be able to reduce this special tax by the same two mills, but the state tax will equalize things.

Rainier Review—The millage tax will place all the property of the county back of the education of every child. Educational taxes are an investment and insurance. The ignorant and untrained are a liability through poverty and crime while the educated in mind and character are an asset.

Hubbard Enterprise—The main purpose of this tax is to equalize the burden of taxation so that all parts of the county will pay as nearly as possible their just share of the school tax. It will eliminate the inequalities in present taxation. The two-mill tax will place all the property of the county back of the education of every child.

Baker City Democrat—There is a sound argument in behalf of the state school tax in that it assists the poorer districts in the state. Taxable wealth varies greatly among districts, and taxable wealth does not a controlling factor in the number of children requiring education. The districts have now reached the constitutional limit of taxation. The state tax will place as much as the taxpayers can afford to pay.

Salem Capital Journal—Taxpayers who have no better perspective than to have few dollars in taxes at the expense of the education of their children, or the education of citizens Marion or any other county can be proud of.

SALMON CAUGHT NEAR OREGON CITY WEIGHS 29 POUNDS.

Sturgeon Hooked in Willamette Requires Strength of Three Men to Pull From Water.

OREGON CITY, April 28.—(Special.) Mrs. Paul Praeger, who resides at Parkplace, about one mile from Oregon City, is so far this season the woman champion angler when it comes to "landing" the big ones.

Last Tuesday she caught her first salmon this year. It weighed 29 pounds. Last Friday she caught in the Clackamas one weighing more than 22 pounds and another more than 20 pounds.

One of the largest sturgeons ever caught in the Willamette river here was brought out near the falls Tuesday with hook and line by "Dub" Montgomery. It required the strength of the three men to bring the fish out of the water. The "movie" man who was taking pictures of the scene happened to be near at the time and the scene will be shown among his pictures of fishing on the Willamette.

RAILROAD MAN ARRESTED—Frank L. Tanner Charged With Attempt to Defraud.

Frank L. Tanner, railroad man, was arrested at Everett, Wash., yesterday morning on a telegraphic warrant from Chief of Police McCulloch of Everett. Tanner is said to have brought to Portland a phonograph and records which he had purchased in Everett and on which he had not completed payments.

Tanner told the inspectors here that he was on his vacation and had brought the phonograph along. He said he had no intention of defrauding the Everett music house.

TROLLEY RETURN ADVISED—Shipping Board Man Thinks Tacoma Should Give Up Operation.

TACOMA, Wash., April 28.—(Special.)—The city would do well to turn back the municipal line to the Tacoma Railway & Power company to operate, said the belief expressed today by R. H. Sloan, engineer, and J. W. McCloy, transportation representative of the United States shipping board.

They were in Tacoma studying the city's means of paying back the government the cost of the municipal line during the war.

The representatives of the shipping board said that they would await the street-car arbitration board attempt to arrive at a method of operating the Tacoma street-car system at a profit.

Salvador Minister Nominated.—WASHINGTON, April 28.—Peter Augustus Jay of Rhode Island, now counselor of the embassy at Rome, was nominated today by President Wilson to be minister to Salvador.

VOTERS MIX CHOICE IN STRAW BALLOT

Party Lines Disregarded in Preference for President.

HOOVER HIGH IN AD CLUB

Eighty-Five Republican and 10 Democratic Votes Cast at Luncheon; Wood Is Popular.

Men who voted in the informal poll of The Oregonian for presidential choice yesterday had queer combinations, for one at the luncheon of the Portland Ad club cast his ballot for Henry Cabot Lodge, republican, Mass., on a democratic sheet, while another in the Board of Trade building gave William Gibbs McAdoo as his first choice, thereby recording his democratic views, and then proceeded to put down Governor Frank O. Lowden, republican, as second choice.

Major-General Leonard Wood hooked up with Senator Hiram Johnson by one man, who voted for Wood first and gave Johnson as second choice. This also occurred in the Board of Trade building.

Army Attaches Favor Wood.—A feature of the day's poll was the vote of the attaches of the main recruiting office of the United States navy in the Dekum building, where General Wood received 11 votes and Johnson 3—all the ballots cast.

The Pacific Marine Iron Works was the other establishment canvassed, 17 votes being cast, those indicating their choice being sufficiently interested to go to the bulletin board, where the sheets were posted, and indicating their choice. The vote was: Hoover 6, Johnson 3, Lowden 1, Taft 3, Wood 5, Bryan 1, McAdoo 1.

One of the most representative votes yet taken was that polled at the luncheon of the Portland Ad club at noon yesterday. E. M. Strong, president of the organization, presided and enthusiastically announced to the 25 members present that the ballots would be found on tables. Eighty-five republican and 10 democratic votes were recorded.

Hoover Gets Most Votes.—Herbert Hoover was high man at the luncheon, but General Wood proved a strong second, with Johnson third and Lowden a good fourth. The democratic favorite was President Wilson, with McAdoo second and Bryan third. The Ad club detailed vote was: Hoover 23, Harding 1, Johnson 13, Lowden 12, Pershing 1, Poindexter 1, Taft 3, Wood 21, Bryan 2, Edwards 1, McAdoo 3, Wilson 4.

In the Board of Trade building, where are located the headquarters of the United States Grain Association, an organization connected with the Hoover food administration, Hoover led the republican candidates, General Wood was a fine second, with Johnson and Lowden following in the order named. Wilson was favorite choice on democratic ballots, with Bryan and McAdoo tied.

"Hoover will never run," prophesied one man in the Board of Trade building. "He is only holding space for a dark horse," as will be seen when the time comes."

Johnson Termed "Socialist."—Another man said, "Well, Hoover used to make pretty good doughnuts, so I guess I'll vote for him."

"Hiram Johnson is altogether too socialist to suit me," was the comment of one man.

"I don't know how I'll vote," said another, "but it's a cinch I will not vote for Wilson."

"We want a western man and Johnson seems to be the logical one for it," said one man as he indicated the Californian as his choice.

A tribute was paid William Howard Taft by another man, who said, "Taft is certain to be the 'dark horse,' because everybody knows now that we can trust him."

The Board of Trade building vote in detail follows: Hoover, 43; Harding, 2; Johnson, 24; Lowden, 13; Poindexter, 1; Taft, 4; Wood, 30; Bryan, 2; McAdoo, 3; Wilson, 5.

762 ORDERED DELIVERED—Post Reports That 263 Radicals Have Been Shipped Out.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Seven hundred and sixty-two deportation warrants have been issued by the department of labor as a result of the so-called radical raids by the department of justice, Assistant Secretary Post said today in a letter to Chairman Johnson of the house immigration committee. He wrote in reply to an inquiry by Post several days ago. A total of 6250 warrants of arrest were issued, Mr. Post said, and approximately 3000 of these were executed. Since November 1, 263 aliens have been deported, including 241 on the "soviet ark," Buford.

LATH MILL IS OPPOSED—Property Owners Protest Granting of Permit to Company.

The song of the saws and planers in lath mills conducted by McCulloch and sleep, according to C. B. Swan, who appeared before the city council yesterday with a large delegation of property owners opposing the granting of a permit to the M. C. & M. Lumber company to operate a lath mill at Fifth street and Powell valley road.

Mr. Swan explained that for three months the mill has been operated day and night, and that although the residents of the district feel that the mill is a nuisance in the neighborhood by its day operations, the situation is made doubly obnoxious by the night operations. The petition seeking the permit and the remonstrance was referred to Commissioner Barbur for report.
