HEARING OF DAMAGE SUIT BEGUN.—Trial of the \$50,000 personal injury suit of Charles Schulze against the United States railroad administration was started before a jury yesterday in Federal Judge Bean's court. BOARD SUSTAINS ACTION OF MAYOR BAKER.

Hearing in Case of Patrolman John A. Holden Postponed Until Date to Be Agreed Upon.

Suspension of John O'Halloran from the police bureau following the death of Wayne Cason, was sustained yesterday by the case service board following a hearing. Commissioners Logan and Thomas voted in the affirmative and Commissioner Mason in the negative.

Commissioners Logan and Thomas contended the discharge was for the good of the service and was made by Mayor Baker in good faith. The board did not hear the evidence in the appeal case of former Patrolman John A. Holden, who was discharged recently by Mayor Baker at the request of Chief of Police Jensen. The hearing will be set for a date to be agreed upon by Allen R. Joy, attorney for Holden, and Deputy City Attorney Tomlinson. Mr. Holden contends that his probationary period in the police bureau had expired prior to his discharge, and that therefore he is entitled to a hearing before the board.

METHODISTS BUY LAND

Site for Summer Camp on Lake Is Taken for Meetings.

LA GRANDE, Or., April 28.—(Special.)—The Methodist Camp Ground association of eastern Oregon has signed articles of incorporation, the incorporators being Ira L. Aldrick and E. N. Sherman, Hawk of this city, C. L. Walker, Joseph James, Leitch Island City, and H. E. Cullison of Enterprise. Mr. Aldrick was elected president and Mr. Walker secretary and treasurer.

The organization has an option on 110 acres of land at the head of Wal-lowa lake which it plans to make into a Methodist camp ground. The land will be platted and lots sold and families may camp there for the summer. All of the church conventions of this district will also be held at the grounds.

The first meeting to be held at the new grounds will be an Epworth league institute from July 22 to August 1.

AD MEN PLAN CARAVAN

PORTLAND CLUB TO JOIN BIG DELEGATION TO STOCKTON.

\$250 Appropriated to Better Business Bureau to Help Curb Profiteering During Shrine Week.

Plans for participation by the Portland Ad club in the annual Pacific coast convention of advertising clubs to be held in Stockton next month were considered at the regular weekly meeting and luncheon of the club yesterday noon at the Benson hotel. President Dave Matthews of the Pacific coast organization and his assistant, L. R. Easton, both of Stockton, were special guests of the occasion.

W. P. Strandberg, director of the "On to Stockton" committee, acted as chairman of the day, and after telling of plans for the advertising caravan to be undertaken by the northwest ad clubs jointly, he called upon Mr. Matthews for a brief talk relative to the forthcoming convention. Nothing will be spared to make the convention both pleasurable and profitable, Mr. Matthews declared. The sum of \$10,000 has been raised by the Stockton association to hold the convention, he said, and the largest number of delegates that have ever attended an ad club convention on the coast is expected to be present. The programme closed with the showing of a motion picture of Stockton and the Yosemite valley.

At the business session of the club resolutions favoring the passage of the higher education measure and the primary education bill and a measure urging that all clocks on the city streets be either made to run accurately or be ordered off the streets were adopted. The sum of \$250 was appropriated to the better business bureau to enable that organization to carry on the work which has been assigned to it for Shrine week, namely, the prevention of profiteering or raising of prices during the Shrine convention.

EUGENE, Or., April 25.—(Special.)—M. Vernon Parsons of this city, candidate for the nomination on the republican ticket for secretary of state, will soon open headquarters in Portland, having made arrangements for rooms there while on a trip during the latter part of last week. He says that prospects for a big vote in Multnomah county are bright.

A sensation was created at Reed college yesterday by the return of 15 graduation gowns which were stolen from the college chapel two years ago on the morning of commencement, June 1917. A large box with a Walla Walla postmark was delivered at Reed Tuesday, and it wasn't until yesterday afternoon that Miss Florence Read of the office investigated its contents. The gowns, valued at over \$300, among them being a doctor's robe belonging to Miss Susan A. Bacon, were found intact, except that all names had been removed. The name of J. H. White, thought to be fictitious, was found on the box.

The theft two years ago, at the time considered the result of a well-planned student prank, had dramatic results. The graduation ceremonies were just ready to commence when the disappearance of the gowns was discovered, and William Allan White noted speaker for the occasion, had to delay his address two hours while other regalia was rushed from the Pacific Dental college. To make matters worse, the student dispatched for the gowns was arrested for speeding.

The Reed student council and faculty spent days trying to apprehend both the robbers and the gowns, but neither could be located. Every inch of the Reed campus was combed, attics were ransacked and even the lake was dragged during the search. The police department aided by looking through pawnshops, but up until yesterday not a single trace had been found of the garments. The gowns will now be returned to their owners.
