

## FARMERS WARNED OF WHEAT CONCERN

Attempt to Control Distribution in Idaho Fails.

### EVIL LURKS IN CONTRACT

Spokane Company Pays \$10,000 to Lawyer and \$5000 to J. F. Langner for Publicity.

The efforts of the wheat growers' association, organized several months ago at Spokane under the name of Washington, Oregon and Idaho Wheat Growers' association of the Pacific northwest, to break into the Idaho field is meeting with the same opposition that it has encountered elsewhere in the northwest. Farmers of Idaho are being warned against the movement which is an apparent effort to control the distribution of Idaho wheat for at least the next six years, perhaps indefinitely.

**Farmer's Ass. Warned.**  
At the initiative of the Intermountain Farmers' Equity association the facts in the case have been brought to light and in every community a movement is on foot to warn the farmers to be on their guard against the Spokane concern. A. Y. Satterfield, general manager of the Farmers' Equity, points out in a letter which the equity is sending to all its members that "the farmer agrees to deliver his entire crop of wheat each succeeding year and gets for the same whatever this association pays him after deducting enormous expenses, holding up enough of his wheat to pay for the construction of elevators, warehouses, etc." Mr. Satterfield's letter says in part: "These people acknowledge to our president, M. J. Kerr, that they paid the state the state of Idaho, of San Francisco, \$10,000 to draw up the contract. They also paid \$5000 to one J. F. Langner for publicity and advertising work and \$5000 to one A. A. Elmore for organization work. These do not include other expenses which these people will be put to as a result of the contract. They will have to pay, especially the ones who sign this shrewd, iron-clad contract."

**Farmer Agrees to Pay for Suit.**  
One of the provisions in this contract provides that the farmer will pay 25c per bushel as liquidating damages for breach of the contract. He also agrees to pay all expenses in every description connected with any suit which will be brought against him for breach of contract. The letter concludes: "We will thank you to investigate this matter more fully, to advise your friends and associates to be aware of this new concern and thereby you will render them a great service."
