

NEW JERSEY GIVES WOOD BIGGER LEAD

Pledge of "Big Four" to General Indicated.

MISCOUNT IS CORRECTED

Error of 111 Votes in Morris County Discovered—Charges by Senator Backer Rescued.

NEWARK, N. J., April 29.—Major-General Leonard Wood, Chief of the Senate Hiram W. Johnson of California, by 1220 votes in the New Jersey presidential preference primary in Morris county which has been tabulated late tonight.

The missing districts are in Hunterdon county which has given Wood a majority in the incomplete returns and the vote there will not be available until tomorrow. The vote now stands: Wood, 52,597; Johnson, 51,377. The vote for the republican "big four" with 35 districts missing is: Frelinghuysen, 61,472; Edger, 60,287 (both pledged to the choice of voters as expressed at the primary); Stoken (Wood), 53,277; Ransom (Wood), 46,630; Ballard (Johnson), 43,213; Layden (Johnson), 42,857; Raymond (Wood), 42,852; Griggs (Wood), 42,531; Nutter (unpledged), 9235; Corrothers (unpledged), 7673.

In Morris county, an error of 111 votes was discovered, cutting Wood's majority in that county from 837 to 726. The mistake was made in the check made at the county clerk's office after William P. Verdon of Hudson county, a Johnson worker, had charged his candidate had been "robbed" in Morris, Essex and Camden counties.

If the general maintains his lead to the end, he will have pledged to him at the republican convention in Chicago all members of the big four, for two members, Edward C. Stokes and William N. Runyan, are Wood advocates, and the other two, United States Senators Edgar and Frelinghuysen, have pledged themselves to support the candidate favored by the voters in the presidential contest.

Indications today pointed to election of 12 Wood district delegates and nine Johnson, with three unpledged. The discrepancy, it was said at the county clerk's office, was due to a clerical error in the tallying of votes.

McBride victory conceded. Returns in Alaska primary are 70 per cent complete.

JUNEAU, Alaska, April 29.—With returns from Tuesday's primary election 70 per cent complete, the election of John C. McBride, republican candidate for national committee, today was conceded, the vote standing: McBride 2185, Herron 1428, Chovin 428. With the exception of Haines and Tanana, the vote from all incorporated towns in all districts has been received.

For delegates to the republican national convention, the leading race for the first division. The leading democratic names are: For C. S. Edwards, W. W. Casey, Latimer, Gray and Henry Roden of Juneau, and N. R. Walker of Ketchikan.

Harding Gets 39 in Ohio. COLUMBUS, O., April 29.—Whether Senator Harding's national campaign manager, H. M. Daugherty, goes to the national convention at Chicago as a delegate-at-large from Ohio probably will depend on the official count of Tuesday's primary.

With complete unofficial returns from all but eight precincts in the state, Daugherty was running with votes behind William Boyd, Wood candidate.

The vote was: Boyd, 167,714; Daugherty, 167,415.

The three other Harding candidates for delegate-at-large were safely elected, according to the incomplete figures by majorities running from 12,000 to 25,000. On the face of available returns Harding probably will have 29 delegates to the Chicago convention. Wood apparently has won two delegates in each of three districts, and possibly the one delegate-at-large, a total of nine. The unofficial presidential preference vote with eight precincts missing was: Harding 125,460; Wood, 169,193.

LEADERS ASKED TO SPEAK

EDUCATORS WOULD HEAR PROMINENT MEN AND WOMEN.

Head of Educational Association Announces Campaign for Cabinet Member.

SPOKANE, Wash., April 29.—Several men and women prominent in the affairs of the nation, including Herbert Hoover, former national food administrator, and Frank A. Vandenberg, New York financier; Frank O. Lowden, governor of Illinois; Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, suffrage leader; and Franklin K. Lane, former secretary of the interior, will receive invitations within a few days to address the annual convention of the National Education association at Salt Lake City July 4 to 10.

The tentative programme was announced here today by Mrs. Josephine Corliss Preston, state superintendent of schools of Washington and president of the National Education association.

Others who will be invited to address the convention, Mrs. Preston said, include Dr. Guy P. Bentson, former state superintendent of schools of Vermont; Dr. Henry Suzzallo, president of the University of Washington; Payson Smith, commissioner of education of Massachusetts; Dr. E. O. Rees, president of the University of Montana; Will Wood, commissioner of education of California; and Dr. E. H. Lindley, president of the University of Idaho.

The general topic of the session, Mrs. Preston announced, will be "Public Education in the Making of a Greater America."

\$1,399,085,112 IS SAVED

SUNDRY CIVIL BILL REDUCED BY \$608,169,186.

Large Sum Intended to Be Used for Treatment or Rehabilitation of Former Service Men.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—The last of the 13 annual appropriation bills—sundry civil measure, carrying approximately \$500,000,000—was reported to the house today by the appropriations committee.

Representative Mondell, the republican leader, in a statement today said the total savings under final estimates on all appropriation bills amounted to \$1,399,085,112, while the total cut from the original and supplemental estimates was \$1,528,994,462.

"This saving," he declared, "is one and one-half times as great as the total amount carried by the sundry civil bill is \$428,198,945 or \$608,169,186 less than the original estimate. The committee thus cut more from the original estimate than it authorized. Officially two-thirds of the total appropriation in this bill are for the treatment or rehabilitation of former service men."

\$20.50. The latter is expected to raise its price within a few days. The Pacific coast sugar market is governed entirely by the price prevailing in New York on the day when cargoes arrive from the Hawaiian islands, say local wholesalers. And the New York price is dictated by the Cuban planters, who are taking advantage of the heavy demand and forcing the price up. Nor are the Hawaiian planters at all more than the Cuban planters, who are now charging.

Eastern sugar, by the time it reaches the wholesaler, it is alleged, passes through two or three middlemen—speculators who are out to take the advantage of the situation. Wholesalers in the east are unable to make the first purchases from the refineries, it is said, as the opportunity already has been contracted for a compelled profit. All the juggling and inefficiency demands on Hawaiian sugar when it reaches San Francisco.

And the heavy demand for sugar has not yet begun, said one wholesaler yesterday. When the canning season begins—I tremble to predict the price. To my mind but little fruit will be put up in American kitchens this year, and in the canneries, as well, for that matter. The price will be exorbitant and the crop is slightly short.

The board held the price down to \$9 per 100 pounds through war time, and it was not until that figure when the equalization body disintegrated in January. What happened when the safety valve was removed? Every one knows. In four months the price of sugar has risen from \$9 to \$22.75, or an increase of \$13.75. And prior to that time, if you want to look back that far, the price of sugar was around \$5 and \$6, the latter being considered a high price.

ABERDEEN, Wash., April 29.—(Special.)—James Eaton, 27 years old, an employee of the South Side Lumber mill at Montesano, died this afternoon from injuries received shortly before 10 o'clock while at work in the mill.

He was adjusting a belt in the mill when he was caught in the machinery. His right arm was cut off, both his legs crushed and internal injuries inflicted before he could be released.

RE-SALE OF SUGAR TO BE PROHIBITED

Refiners Agree to Aid Government in Move.

PRICES NOT AFFECTED

Plan Expected Merely to Cause Better Distribution of Stocks.

"Broker" Is Retained.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—Sugar refiners have entered into an agreement with the department of justice to cooperate with the government in preventing the re-sale of sugar to the trade, and to that extent to decrease supply and high prices, Mr. Palmer believed. The agreement, Mr. Palmer said, was a result of conferences between department officials and refiners' representatives held here early this week.

Better Distribution Expected. While this move was not expected to cure all the evils of the shortage and high prices, Mr. Palmer believed it would aid in obtaining better distribution of sugar stocks. The refiners, he said, will be asked to refuse to sell to any firm except where the commodity would take a direct course to the consumer. Objection was raised by the refiners, however, to the elimination of the "legitimate sugar broker," who, they said, served a useful purpose in the distributing system.

Acceptance of "fair" prices by the department of justice was defended today by Attorney-General Palmer before the house judiciary committee, which is investigating his agreement with Louisiana sugar growers that 17 and 18 cents would not be considered an unfair maximum price for their product.

Mr. Palmer declared that the acceptance of the "fair" prices was "not fixing a price, but the exercising of the lawful discretion in announcing what the government would regard as a violation of the law."

Law Held Not Violated. "For anyone to say such action was a violation of the law," said the attorney-general, "shows a lamentable ignorance of the law. If I am guilty in Louisiana then I am guilty everywhere throughout the country with respect to all necessities and there is plenty of room for the records of the department of justice to find me guilty."

"Fair" prices, he continued, "were determined by the fair price committee," organized last fall throughout the country. These committees he declared, "are the weapons of the public for fighting rising living costs."

The refiners have reapportioned the committee which functioned during the war, with a view of determination of "reasonable margins of profit." Officials were assured they would have the support of this committee in running down cases of profiteering, hoarding or market speculation, Mr. Palmer said.

Department officials have under consideration a renewal of the licensing system which was in effect during the war. Repetitive offers of the refiners said they would arrange a "clearing house" to obtain accurate information as to distribution of all sugar stocks in order that excessive purchases by favored buyers might be checked.

The department, however, does not expect the present sugar shortage to be relieved materially before July. The 1920 best crop will come on the market.

Chicago Sugar Highest.

CHICAGO, April 29.—Sugar reached the highest price on record in Chicago today, according to commission men. A 1000-pound lot sold for 31 cents a pound wholesale. Buyers attempted to buy more, offering 32 cents, but there was none for sale.

STRIKE ORDERED IN FRANCE

General Federation of Labor Supports Walkout for May 1.

PARIS, April 29.—The General Federation of Labor of France today decided to support the railwaymen's federation by ordering a general strike to begin at midnight of May 1.

The strike is in protest for the purpose of obtaining a salary increase, it is announced, but has for its object the nationalization of all the transport services.

In the words of prominent labor leaders, the general strike order means a "fight to a finish" for the realization of the general political aims of French labor, with the nationalization of public utilities and labor representation on all boards and commissions dealing with transportation and the postal and telegraphic services.

The walls of Paris are plastered with appeals and manifestos. One appeal concluded with a list of unconscious humor. "Do not work on May 1," it said, "so that the maximum. He who will eat must produce," may be applied."

SEARCH BEGUN FOR RADICALS

Walls of Mining Town Plastered With Anarchistic Literature.

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., April 29.—Federal and state officials today were searching the mining communities of this section for the persons who for the past several nights have plastered the dead walls of Marion county with radical literature issued by what purported to be the "American anarchist federated commune soviet," and entitled "the anarchist soviet bulletin."

The handbill, which calls upon workers to rise and seize all factories and food supplies, made its appearance in Mannington, Homewood, Sycamore and other towns the same night and the next night another poster appeared in a number of other towns.

Large numbers of foreign-born miners are employed in this part of

West Virginia, where last winter the federal authorities carried on a systematic search for radicals.

DISCONTENT IS MANIFEST

United Kingdom Faces Prospect of Stoppage of Work May 1.

LONDON, April 29.—A labor development which may result in a more general stoppage of work throughout the United Kingdom May day than had been considered likely manifested itself today in an announcement that the London county council has decided that, beginning Saturday, its members would work on a strict "work to the rules" policy and will refuse to exercise any initiative beyond that point.

The Liverpool and London unions declare they will maintain their new order until their demand for an advance of 11 weekly is granted.

AMERICAN PAINTERS WIN

ACHIEVEMENTS MADE AT INTERNATIONAL EXHIBITIONS.

Display Formally Opened in Pittsburgh, First Since Outbreak of War.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., April 29.—American painters ranked high in the international art exhibition, which was formally opened in the galleries of the Carnegie institute here today, the first since the outbreak of the world war.

Announcement of honors was made at the Founders' day exercises as follows: First—Abbott H. Thayer, Monadnock, N. C. "Young Woman in Olive Plush." Gold medal and \$1500.

Second—Algeron Talmage, London, England. "By the Cornish Sea." Silver medal and \$1000.

Third—Walter Fier, Chicago, Ill. "First—Her Sisters." Bronze medal and \$500.

Honorable mention—Robert Spencer, New Hope, Pa. "The White Mill"; Frederick Booley, Boston, Mass. "Looking at Prints"; George J. Coates, London, England. "The Spanish Dance."

The exhibition contains 373 paintings. Of this number America contributed 138, while England sent 83 and France 54. The remainder came from studios of Sweden, Denmark, Italy, Spain, Norway, Russia, Belgium, Switzerland and a few from Canada.

NEW AGREEMENT SOUGHT

United Mineworkers of Alberta Propose Holding Convention.

CALGARY, Alberta, April 29.—Members of Alberta district, United Mine Workers, will hold a convention here May 17. It was today announced by Morgan Lewis, chairman of the special committee appointed some time ago to deal with wage matters in this district.

The chief business of the convention will be to elect a committee to enter into negotiations with the operators for a new wage contract.

ARCTIC FOOD PLENTIFUL

Unlimited Quantities Found; Stefansson Reaches New York.

NEW YORK, April 29.—Vilhjalmur Stefansson, Arctic explorer, arrived here today on the steamer St. Paul. While in England he urged a plan to tap the Arctic food reserves, to relieve the world shortage, and endeavor to organize an expedition to further that project.

He said plentiful food in unlimited quantities was available in the Arctic.

Danish Commission Arrives.

NEW YORK, April 29.—Five members of a Danish commission to investigate the possibilities of establishing a direct wireless communication between Denmark and the United States arrived today on the steamer Manchuria.

MAY DAY RALLY INDORSED

PATRIOTIC MEETING TO BE HELD AT AUDITORIUM.

Celebration of Particular Importance as Counter to Radicals, Asserts Mayor Baker.

Particular importance is attached to the patriotic rally planned in honor of American the tomorrow night at the public auditorium in the opinion of Mayor Baker, who has placed the meeting at the hands of the newly organized Portland service league.

"The first day of May always has been looked upon as a day when radicals throughout the country would express themselves. Serious riots and outbreaks usually have accompanied May day demonstrations. It is worthy to note that the May day outbreaks originated in European countries and are not of American origin."

"Throughout the United States a movement has been born to transform the riots and outbreaks of May day into a day when the citizens of every city, town and hamlet may give expression to true American sentiments."

In Portland I have turned the celebration over to the officers and members of the Portland Service league, by the act of the city council, the new organization.

The Portland Service league, in my opinion, offers a more widespread civic activity which is one of the highest duties of American citizenship. It is a democratic organization through which every citizen, be he rich or poor, weak or strong, influential or without influence, may give expression to sentiments which will result in the constructive upbuilding of Portland."

Dr. Edward H. Pence, pastor of the Westminster Presbyterian church, will be the principal speaker at the Saturday night meeting. Judge Kessler will preside, and Mayor Baker will introduce the speaker.

Of interest in connection with the meeting will be the appearance of the Monday Musical club chorus, 30 trained voices under the direction of Mrs. E. L. Knight. Walter Jenkins has been secured to conduct an old-fashioned "sing-a-long" with vocal soloists, Lucien E. Becker will play a short pipe organ recital.

Foreign consuls stationed in Portland, and the colonels of the Portland Service league will be seated on the stage tomorrow night. The meeting will be open to the public without charge.
