

UNION ROOM RAIDED IN SEARCH OF REDS

Suspect Arrested and Held
for Grand Jury.

RADICAL LETTERS SEIZED

Four Men Taken to Station and
Closely Questioned but Sub-
sequently Turned Loose.

With information in their possession that industrial workers of the world and other radicals were planning a big demonstration on the Plaza block on May 1, in conjunction with similar demonstrations to take place all over the world on the same date, the police, under the leadership of Lieutenant Harvey Thatcher and Sergeant Epps, began a campaign of increased activity in the city yesterday for the curbing of the radical element.

The results of yesterday's work were that one alleged radical was held to answer to the grand jury on a charge of violating the state syndicalism act and a raid was conducted on the headquarters of the Shipyard Laborers & Risers union in room 316 of the Lumber Exchange building. Four men, taken to the police station and questioned, were subsequently released as the officers were unable to get evidence to justify holding them.

Arrest Followed by Raid.
The raid followed the arrest of Ernest Lehto, alleged radical, who was taken at Second and Couch streets by Patrolmen J. M. Miller and S. E. Miller. Lehto was said to have been peddling I. W. W. books, stamps and similar material. He was held to the grand jury yesterday afternoon by Judge Rossman after waiving preliminary hearing. His bail was placed at \$1000.

At the time his arrest Lehto was said to have had in his possession papers indicating that he had received some of the radical material from a J. Kennedy, whose address was given as 210 Lumber Exchange building. The raid followed, and Kennedy was not to be found. A search for him was being conducted last night, it was announced.

The four men who were questioned by the police were Pat McGovern, William Williams, E. Stephens and Charles Bennett. These men were in the office at the time of the raid, along with about a half dozen others. Williams was a candidate of the radical element for the chairmanship of the Central Labor council at the election not long ago. According to the police, three of the four formerly held cards in the I. W. W.

Special Agent Participates.
The raid was conducted by Lieutenant Thatcher, Sergeant Epps, Officers J. M. Miller, S. E. Miller, Russell and Huntington. Bill Bryon, special agent of the department of justice, participated and helped in questioning the men at the police station.

Lieutenant Thatcher said last night that any demonstration of a radical character in the city would result in wholesale arrests. "I am an automobile owner and in favor of good roads," he declared. "If the boys want to demonstrate it will merely mean that they will get a chance to crack the rocks for making our roads better."

He expressed the belief that the work now being carried on by the police would prevent any demonstration of formidable character. Police officers declared that the raid on the radical letters which announced the intention of a demonstration on May day, despite any resistance which might be met with from the police. Stickers announcing that "May day is supreme in soviet Russia. Follow suit," have also been circulated.

APPLE SHIPPING HALTED

Embargo on Cars Delays Delivery
of Hood River Newtowns.

HOOD RIVER, Or., April 29.—(Special.)—Shipments of apples which have amounted to cars since the embargo, laid as result of the switchmen's strike, was lifted two weeks ago, again were halted today by an embargo on all cars destined for delivery east of the Mississippi. As none of the apples are for western delivery the embargo is practically complete here.

About 80 cars of Newtowns, all said, remain here, the fruit will be in good condition, but the delay in shipment will retard final closing of settlements and preparation for the strawberry harvest.

FISHERMEN GET READY

Mid Columbia Anglers Prepare for
Season Opening.

HOOD RIVER, Or., April 29.—(Special.)—Mid Columbia commercial fishermen are ready for the open salmon season Saturday. Ed C. THE DALLES, Or., April 29.—(Special.)—Fish wheels will be practically useless, owing to the extremely low water in the Columbia river, when the salmon season opens Saturday at noon. This was the information given out today by the Seufert cannery near this city.

Many of the fish wheels are stranded high and dry, while those that will operate will dip so shallow into the river that no considerable catch is expected from them.

The low water will not interfere with the scow fishing. When the melting snows raise the river level the fish wheels will again become effective. By late June, it is believed by rivermen normal water level in the Columbia will be reached.

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PHILPOT IS OUT ON BAIL
NASHVILLE SHERIFF WILES MAN IS "BAD EGG."

Although Request Is Made Not to Release "E. M. Padden," Bond Already Furnished.

"Do not allow bail. He is a very bad egg," telegraphed Sheriff Wright of Nashville, Tenn., to Sheriff Hurlburt yesterday concerning Everett Philpot, a real estate man who has been known as E. M. Padden in Portland for the past six years. Philpot already was out on bail of \$1000 and unless his bondsmen become uneasy the present arrangements will stand, according to District Attorney Evans, who believes there is little danger of the fugitive fleeing from the city.

Sheriff Wright telegraphed that extradition papers were being prepared and that he was leaving at once for this city to get Philpot. "There are two indictments against Philpot and more will follow as soon as he is brought here," said the officer. Philpot has confessed to leaving Nashville under a cloud six years ago and establishing his home in Portland, saying that he has lived straight since coming here with the intention of repaying persons in Nashville whose money he had used wrongfully.

According to information in the hands of local officers, Philpot was engaged in several financial transactions in Nashville on which charges can be based. The complaint on which he was arrested charged obtaining money by false pretenses through the presentation of a forged note as collateral for a loan of \$350. In a letter from Sheriff Wright, it is stated that Philpot "took every cent of \$1500" from a young woman in Nashville.

Philpot, under the name of Padden, was sales manager for Metzger-Parker-Ferguson Realty company.

BAKER MECCA OF MASONS
HUNDREDS GATHERING TO ATTEND SHRINE MEMORIAL.

Three Days to Be Given Over to Conferring of Degrees in Different Chapters.

BAKER, Or., April 29.—(Special.)—Hundreds of Masons and their wives are expected to attend the second reunion of Scottish Rite bodies and the shrine ceremonial, the first occupying today and tomorrow and the latter Saturday.

Tonight the degrees of the Lodge of Perfection No. 3 will be conferred by Rev. Owen F. Jones, 32d degree, venerable master, and the officers, and this will be followed by the degrees of the Baker chapter Rose Croix, which will be exemplified by the Scottish Rite officers of Boise, Idaho.

The degrees from the 19th to 32d will be communicated and transferred by Sovereign Inspector-General P. S. Malcolm, 32d degree, who will be assisted by the officers of the supreme council of Portland Scottish Rite bodies on Saturday. Then the 32d will be conferred by Cal Wood of Boise, 32d degree, sovereign inspector-general of Idaho.

The conferring of these degrees will be followed by a banquet which will be served in the high school gymnasium for members and initiates of the local bodies and for visiting brothers.

The La Grande shriners have announced their intention of being in Baker in full force Saturday. A special train has been chartered by the shriners for themselves and their families, and they have promised to enliven their coming with a 30-piece band.

CASCARA BARK FOR SALE
New Source of Public Revenue Found in Product of State Lands.

OLYMPIA, Wash., April 29.—(Special.)—Land Commissioner Savidge announces that it has been decided that cascara bark may be sold from state lands, the previous ruling on this point having been changed.

Applications for the purchase of the bark will be received in the same manner as for the sale of timber, and the bark will be cruised and offered at public auction. This will probably be done at the July sale of state lands if any applications are received.

The price of cascara bark has advanced rapidly. There is now a great demand for it, whereas it was formerly considered of little or no value.
