NOTE FORGERIES DENIED

Real Estate Firm to Retain Sales Manager Despite Charges Made in Tennessee.

That forgery and other charges against Everett Philpot, known to Portland friends for the past six years as E. M. Padden, real estate man, involve more than \$40,000, is the assertion of J. B. Kirkpatrick, atterney-general at Nashville, Tenn., in a telegram received by Sheriff Hurlburt yesterday, in which indigmant inquiry is made as to the reason for the release of Philpot on bond of

District Attorney Evans called a conference with Philpot's bondsmen fellowing the receipt of this informa-tion, but they were confident he would not run away and the amount

was not increased.

The arrival of Sheriff Wright of Nashville with extradition papers for Philpot is expected daily. Philpot has said that he will not fight the

proceedings.
In the attorney-general's message the local authorities are referred to the case of Horne against Nicholas, 201 Southwestern Reporter, page 756. for information concerning some of the activities of Philpot.

Holcomb and the Cumberland Valley National banks to recover by writ of replevin from the bank a \$2000 note executed by Holcomb to Nicholas on October 12, 1912, and due October 12, 1915. The \$5000 note ran for four months and was renewed several times. Prior to Jano 6, 1914, Holcomb paid one of his \$2000 notes, the money being received by Philpot, who is said to have paid \$1000 to the bank on his \$5000 note and renewed the note of \$4000, atill using the three \$2000 notes—one of which had been paid—as security.

Philpot Denies Forgeries.

On being shown the above quoted statements vesterday Philpot denied absolutely the allegations of forgery. He said the indorsements on the notes were genuine and that the notes were used by him with the payee's permission. This contention is borne out by the fact, which is admitted in the statement of the case by the court, that Nicholas, after examining the notes, gave the bank a certificate filat his signatures on the back thereof were genuine. Philpot asserts that advantage has been taken of the fact that he left under a cloud to set up claims of fraud in cases where none really existed and that the statement as to the amount and number of his alleged fraudulent transactions is a gross exaggeration.


