

DISARMAMENT PAINS NOW UP TO COUNCIL

League Body to Consider Matter at Rome.

SERIOUS PROBLEM RAISED

Whether Proceedings Will Be Conducted by Military or Civilian Officials Is Question.

WASHINGTON, May 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—Necessity of deciding whether disarmament proceedings of the league of nations are to be conducted by military men directly or by civilians with the military officials of each member nation as technical advisers will face the council of the permanent armament commission this month at Rome.

Under articles of the permanent armament commission it is to be taken up at Rome, must be preceded in the view of league officials by announcement of policy on this point.
