

M'ARTHUR ATTACKS PLUMB PLAN AGAIN

Challenge Answered, Move Held Up as Socialistic.

DEBATE OFFER DECLINED

Champions of Radical Movement Are Invited to Go to Work and Help Relieve Labor Shortage.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, May 5.—Representative McArthur has looked horns with the Plumb plan league in his campaign for re-nomination. He recently inserted some advertising matter in several Portland newspapers in which he described the Plumb plan as a scheme to operate the railroads of the country for the benefit of the employees and at the expense of the traveling public, the shippers and the taxpayers.

The full text of the message from Portland is as follows:

In your position, you know all of the facts which should be made available to the public. We challenge you or any person you may designate to act for you to make an arrangement for a debate upon the Plumb plan. You may state the question. We will pay for advertising the debate. If you desire, write reply.

PLUMB PLAN LEAGUE

The following is a copy of Mr. McArthur's answer sent today:
"Your telegram of May 4 is at hand and answering the same, I beg to reiterate the statement in my recent advertisement to the effect that the Plumb plan is a scheme to seize and operate the railroads of the country for the benefit of the employees and at the expense of the traveling public, the shippers and taxpayers. It is simply a step toward socialism and soviet government."

"Furthermore, your league and its disreputable paper 'Labor', published here in Washington, are doing more than any other agency to create unrest and dissatisfaction throughout the country. Your paper continues to abuse and malign all who dare to disagree with your selfish programme and men of the present motives are maligned and abused in its columns."

"On August 7, 1919, Mr. Glen E. Plumb made a statement before the committee on interstate and foreign commerce indorsing the Plumb plan. It is a St. Louis man who said that there would be revolution in this country if the Plumb plan were adopted. The aim and purpose of Mr. Plumb and his organization is to brow-beat and intimidate weak-kneed congressmen into supporting the Plumb plan, but I wish to assure you that this plan will receive no support at my hands."

Debate Is Refused.
"I have no intention of engaging in a joint debate with you. If you wish to advertise your proposition why don't you find one of my opponents to indorse it? If there is any merit in it, surely one of them will come forward to support it."

"There is a great labor shortage in this country at present, and if the Plumb plan league would disband and those engaged in maintaining it would apply themselves to some useful occupation, they might help reduce the high cost of living. Under the present arrangement, they are gouging the honest railroad workers of the country out of their hard-earned money. The American people will never adopt the Plumb plan and some day the railroad workers will wake up and find out how they have been handed a gold brick by those who are now enjoying high salaries and living in luxury on their contributions."

IRRIGATION TOUR URGED

APPROPRIATION COMMITTEE MAY VISIT PACIFIC COAST.

Western Members of Congress Favor Trip as Means Toward Obtaining Money.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, May 5.—With prospect of the adjournment of congress about June 5, western members of congress are seeking to have members of the appropriation committee make a trip to the Pacific coast.

The purpose of the invitation is to get the members of this committee, which appropriates all the money for public works, to visit the west and go over particularly the reclamation projects. Western representatives are encountering more difficulty now than in former years in getting needed appropriations for irrigation, which they lay to lack of familiarity by many members of the present committee with what has been achieved by putting water on arid lands.

There are several new members on the committee who have but little, if any, knowledge of what reclamation means, but invitations extended in the last two or three days by Representative French and Smith of Idaho have brought a favorable response and they are hopeful that the committee will make the trip.

The house Indian committee will leave the latter part of this week to visit several of the western Indian reservations and schools but will not get into Oregon and Washington. The committee will go by the southern route to Los Angeles and will cover California reservations, returning by the central route. Fort Hall reservation in Idaho will be visited.

SEATTLE BAKERIES BUSY

Master Bakers Claim Decisive Victory Over Unions.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 5.—(Special.)—Baking of rye, graham, Irish and other special breads was resumed today in seven open shop bakeries operated by the Master

Bakers' association, in defiance of the bakers' and salesmen's strike.
For the first time since the strike Sunday, non-union bread was being wrapped today. Trade marking will not be resumed until all the non-union shops resume baking.

The master bakers now claim a decisive victory over the unions.
"We have reached the point," said Secretary Thornhill of the Master Bakers' association, "where we will no longer talk with representatives of the union. From now on our bakeries will be run as open shops."

Thornhill said the association now more help than can be taken on the part of recruits are put into the operating bakeries and given instruction by master bakers. As soon as the new men become proficient, they are to be placed in other shops, which are to be reopened as speedily as possible.

RESERVE BANKS PROSPER

EARNINGS FOR YEAR ESTIMATED AT \$100,000,000.

Increased Discount Rates Held Not Responsible for Present Price of Liberty Bonds.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Increased discount rates allowed by the federal reserve board to member banks are not responsible for present market prices of liberty bonds, Governor Harding of the board declared in a letter today to Senator Owen, democrat, Oklahoma.

The board's efforts to curb inflation, will do much to increase the market value of the bonds, Mr. Harding said.

Earnings of the federal reserve system this fiscal year were estimated at \$100,000,000 by Governor Harding, in testifying today at the house rules committee hearing on the resolution proposing an investigation of the administration of the federal reserve act. These earnings, he said, would exceed by \$10,000,000 those of last year, which he said were \$90,000,000.

Without explaining his statement, Governor Harding told the committee that serious problems confronted the country in the next six months. Complaints of country bankers against the universal par clearance order of the reserve fund, he said, were to the board "like flies to a dog, who must have flies to know he is a dog."

HEPPNER WANTS WATER

John Day Project Finances Have Bright Future.

HEPPNER, Or., May 5.—(Special.)—State Engineer Percy Cupper was in Heppner last evening attending a meeting of the board of directors of the John Day irrigation district. A number of problems were discussed with Mr. Cupper, and it is believed the preliminary work will soon make possible financing the district for development of the project.

ROAD TAX BILL INDORSED

Measure Favored by Tillamook Business Men's Association.

TILLAMOOK, Or., May 5.—(Special.)—The measures for higher education and elementary schools of the 4 per cent road amendment were unanimously indorsed Tuesday night at a business meeting and banquet of the Tillamook County Business Men's association, which was largely attended by merchants and dealers from all over the county.

James S. Stewart of Fossil and Corvallis, author of the road amendment, was present and explained the measures to the meeting.

Oregon Must Wait for Guns.

SALEM, Or., May 5.—(Special.)—Oregon will not get any captured German field guns or other confiscated war equipment until congress passes an act providing for the distribution of this class of material, according to a telegram received at the executive offices here today from P. C. Harris of the adjutant-general's office at Washington. One bill is now before congress, however, which, if passed, will allow Oregon a number of guns of 77 caliber and above.

Former Tacoma Editor Dies.

MEDFORD, Or., May 5.—T. E. Scantlin, 68 years old, former editor and publisher of the Tacoma Evening News, Tacoma, Wash., and the Lafayette Courier, Lafayette, Ind., died here last night. Mr. Scantlin was born in Evansville, Ind., and had lived in Medford for 10 years.

British Columbia Prospers.

VICTORIA, B. C., May 5.—Agricultural production of British Columbia is expected by the department of agriculture to approximate \$84,000,000 for the year of 1919, an increase of more than \$14,000,000 over the previous year.

ALIENATION TRIAL BEGUN

Women Fight in Bedroom After Overheard Conversation, Testifies Plaintiff.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., May 5.—(Special.)—What she heard as she crouched beneath a window at the home of Mrs. Freda Pollak, recently divorced wife of Henry Pollak, millionaire president of the American Hat Manufacturing company, was told by Mrs. Florence Valentine of Norwalk in the superior court yesterday. Mrs. Valentine's husband is chauffeur for Mrs. Pollak. Mrs. Valentine charges that she is working a decided hardship on the Norwalk hat man's divorced wife with alienation of chauffeur. When Mrs. Valentine could contain her emotions no longer as she crouched beneath the Pollaks' window, she hurled a brick through the glass and followed after, she testified in court.

One night in February, Mrs. Valentine testified, she went to the Pollak home on West Rock road, Norwalk. As she neared the home she heard the music from a phonograph coming from the house. She said she crouched beneath the window sill and listened. The first thing she said she heard was Mrs. Pollak's voice. "Don't get up, dearie, you are tired. I will change the record," she testified that Mrs. Pollak said.

Mrs. Pollak then put on the record, according to the testimony. "You're My Baby," Mrs. Pollak then whistled the song and at its conclusion sang, "You're My Baby, Frankie," according to Mrs. Valentine's testimony.

According to the story told on the witness stand by the chauffeur's wife, she then heard Mrs. Pollak say, "Drink more champagne. There's plenty of it."

The plaintiff then heard Mrs. Pollak say, according to the testimony, "Kiss me, Frankie; what's the matter with you? You act cross with me. Why don't you hug me tonight?"

"I love you, Frankie. Eighteen years I was in hell and God sent you to me when I needed you most. I love you."

After a little while Valentine said: "I must go home now, dearie," Mrs. Pollak said, "What for?"

He answered, "You know my wife always makes trouble for me if I stay out late." Then Mrs. Pollak is alleged to have answered, "Why should she make trouble? You are my chauffeur. You are working for me. I can call on you 24 hours a day. Why should she make trouble?"

SAWDUST SUGAR FOUND

PITTSBURG CHEMIST ALLEGES WONDERFUL DISCOVERY.

Robert Hyde Declares That Pound of Sweets Can Be Made From Excelsior at 3 Cents Cost.

PITTSBURG, Pa., May 5.—(Special.)—"High grade sugar can be made out of ordinary sawdust at a cost of about 3 cents a pound, according to Robert Hyde, a chemist of Colwell street, who has recently invented a process for effecting this wonderful transmutation. One pound of sawdust will make three-quarters of a pound of sugar."

The chemist displayed a sample of sugar which he said had been extracted from sawdust. In discussing his invention he said: "While I was studying chemistry in Germany, an old professor made a statement one day about the properties of sugar that left a lasting impression on me. I set out to apply his statement to the extraction of sugar from wood. Experiment after experiment failed."

BORROWERS MUST WAIT

FEDERAL FARM LOANS AWAIT ACTION OF COURT.

More Than \$70,000,000 in Applications Said to Have Accumulated in Few Months.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Federal farm loan officials, in conference here, have found no way to avoid a summing of inactivity in loaning operations. The sessions, which were practically concluded last night, brought convincing evidence, members said, that no further new business could be handled until the supreme court had passed on the validity of the farm loan act.

Despite the fact that the 12 land banks have borrowed approximately \$16,000,000 from private banks to loan, more than \$70,000,000 in applications for loans have accumulated. In going into the details of the situation, the officials said that the government rate being 5 1/2 per cent and the private rate 6 per cent.

To offset this loss, however, the net income of the 12 banks has averaged \$240,000 monthly since the first of the year.

The banks have assets of \$30,000,000 on which no liens have been placed, and Commissioner Lobdell said there was no reason for uneasiness as to the financial situation.

GOLD PRODUCERS TO MEET

Hearing on McFadden Bill to Be Held at Capital Tomorrow.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, May 5.—Congressional delegations from Oregon, Washington and Idaho will meet Friday with delegations from other western gold-producing states to discuss the McFadden bill to aid the gold mining industry.

The meeting was arranged today by Representatives Baker of California and Sinnott of Oregon, to be held in the offices of the public lands committee, of which Mr. Sinnott is chairman. The meeting will be addressed by Harold N. Lawrie, economist of the American mining congress, who will discuss the principles embodied in the McFadden bill, which proposes to levy a tax of \$10 an ounce on all gold used for manufacturing purposes.

The money so collected would go to the producers of gold as an extra stimulant to the gold mining industry, which is practically at a standstill as the result of after-war economic conditions.

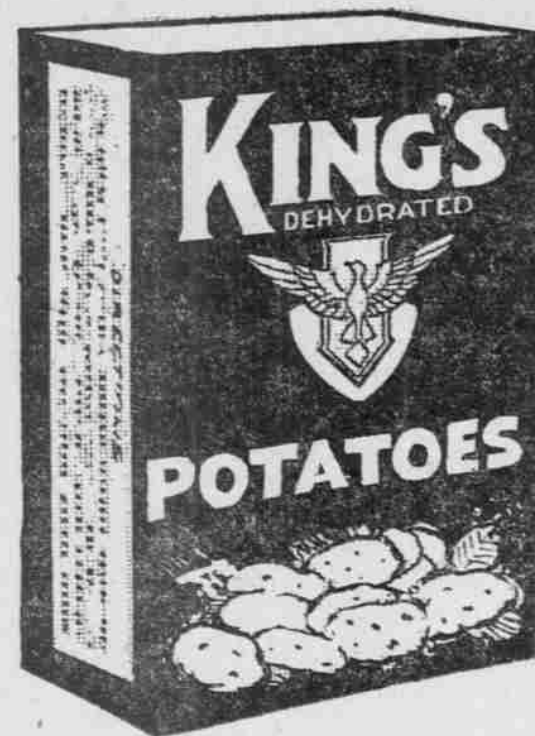
