

RECKLESS DRIVERS PAY HEAVY FINES

\$250 Levied in One Case and
\$75 in Another.

DRIVER ADMITS SPEEDING

Defendant in Court Confesses Car
Going Faster Than Legal Limit
at Time of Collision.

With one fine of \$250 levied in a driving-while-drunk case and another of \$75 on a charge of reckless driving, the aggregate collected in the municipal court yesterday for various traffic violations reached nearly \$500.

It was R. C. Stepp, 2500 Irving street, who paid the \$250 for driving an automobile while intoxicated. Stepp was arrested by Patrolman Burri after he is said to have driven his machine off the Linton road. Judge Rossman also gave him 30 days, but this portion of the sentence was suspended.

A. Edmonds of Pacific City, who was arrested by Patrolmen Feigberg and Tully on a charge of reckless driving after he struck Mrs. Agnes Brown, 454 Broadway, with his automobile at Fourth and Washington, on May 1, was fined \$75.

Woman Dragged 32 Feet.
The car driven by Edmonds is said to have dragged Mrs. Brown 32 feet and she received fractured ribs and numerous bruises. The complaint was filed by Miss Rachel Brown, daughter of the injured woman, who was with her at the time.

George B. Lewis, 422 Tillamook street, proved to be a man after George Washington heart. Lewis was held for court by Patrolman Stanton, after his automobile struck one driven by J. P. White, 528 East Tenth street North, at the intersection of East Seventh and Sacramento streets.

Lewis admitted to the judge that he was driving between 20 and 25 miles an hour at the time of the collision. "I won't tell a lie to get out of paying a fine," he said. He was fined \$25.

Donnell Johnson, 664 Vancouver avenue, driver for the Fernwood dairy, who was held on a charge of violating the traffic ordinance by Patrolmen Freiberg, Tully and Stanton of the traffic bureau, was fined \$25. Johnson is said to have cut a corner at East Twenty-first and Knott streets and to have collided with a machine driven by Marguerite H. Richards, 550 East Twentieth street North.

CULLISON ISSUES REPLY

Candidate for Sheriff Denies
Charges of Mr. Hurlburt.

John E. Cullison, who is a candidate for sheriff, yesterday issued a statement in reply to a letter recently directed to him by Sheriff Hurlburt.

The statement follows:
It is with mingled feelings of profound pity for the author and considerable amusement that I have read the feeble reply of the parental candidate, Thomas M. Hurlburt, to my charge that he, while feeding at the public trough as has been his continuous performance for over 30 years, exacted his pound of flesh from the nation in time of taking from by taking the government \$150 per day for alleged services as chairman of the Multnomah county draft board, which he should have rendered in a patriotic spirit without compensation by reason of the fact that his salary of \$4500 a year as sheriff was ample for the support of himself and family without necessitating unwarranted demands on depleted federal resources.

Imitating the methods of a crafty dodger who, when in peril of apprehension following the theft of a purse on a crowded thoroughfare, cries "stop thief" in order to distract attention from himself, Mr. Hurlburt, caught with the goods, is seeking to turn public notice from his indefensible action in taking government funds for draft board services in violation of presidential proclamation by indulging in a silly and unbecomingly unbecoming record and reputation.

With characteristic venom Mr. Hurlburt indulges in a deliberate falsehood when he avers that I have refused to pay to the Nation home a debt due the estate of my mother, now deceased, and in this connection a reference to the books of said home will indicate that all of the amount had been liquidated long before his attack on me with the exception of the insignificant sum of \$28. As per agreement this latter sum was not due until May 10 and was paid on May 1. 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INMAN WILL IS FILED

VALUE OF ESTATE CONCEDED
TO BE ABOVE \$100,000.

Allowance of \$1000 Monthly Left
Widow, Who Also Is to Receive
Family Home.

The will of the late Robert David Inman was admitted to probate yesterday and John Poulsen, executor in the Inman-Poulsen Lumber company, George W. Thatcher, vice-president of the concern, and H. B. Van Duzer were named executors as required.

Though the petition for probate filed by William M. Cake and Robert H. Cake declares that the value of the estate will exceed \$100,000, it is conceded that the actual amount will be several times that estimate.

All the shares of stock owned by Mr. Inman in the mill, which amounted to one-third the capital stock, are left to Mr. Poulsen with full voting power as a life trust for the wife and two daughters of the deceased. The widow, Mrs. Clara A. Inman, is to receive the income from one-half the stock, the daughters, Minnie May Inman and Ivy Frances Inman, each one-fourth.

An allowance of \$1000 a month for the widow was given in an order signed by Judge Taxwell yesterday. The widow also receives the family home.

Mr. Inman left his new Winston roadster to Mr. Thatcher, \$100 a month for life to his sister, Mrs. Rachel Ann Rensberger, Walkerton, Ind., and 10 per cent of the dividends on the capital stock is to be paid during the next five years to John William Bevis of Portland.

PROJECT TOUR IS TODAY

Inspection to Be Made of Swan
Island by Port Bodies.

Persons who received invitations from the navigation committee of the Chamber of Commerce to make the trip for a reconnaissance of Swan island and trip through the harbor today are urged to be at the Alder street dock at 10 A. M. to board the steamer Undine. The party will include many engineers, the committee of 15, dock and port commissions and representatives of the Chamber of Commerce, including a number of the members of the board of directors who will officially represent that body.

The first stop will be made at municipal dock No. 4, where the party will land for an inspection of the docks and facilities installed there. After the stop the steamer will make a trip around Swan island and the plans for the improvement there will be outlined for the information of the excursionists. A buffet luncheon will be served on board and the steamer will land on the return trip at 4 P. M.

ESTATE INVENTORY FILED

Late Phil Metschan Leaves Prop-
erty Valued at \$265,343.17.

The estate of the late Phil Metschan, principal owner of the Imperial Hotel company, was valued at \$265,343.17, of which \$221,448.17 is personal property and \$43,895 in real estate, according to the inventory filed in the circuit court yesterday by the appraisers, Charles Burckhardt, A. A. Lindsey and George H. Kelly.

Included in the estate is \$35,322.31 in liberty bonds and war savings stamps, and 1250 shares of the Imperial Hotel company valued at \$150,560.10.

Executors of the will of Mr. Metschan are three sons, Philip, Otto W. and Henry Anton Metschan.

Printing Contract Awarded.

ATKINSON PRINCIPAL SUES FOR DIVORCE

Wife of C. J. Russell Alleges
Innuendo on Attire.

HABITS OF SPOUSE AIRED

Husband Declared to Have Insisted
in Lying in Bed Reading, Smoking
and Expecting on Floor.

In the presence of other men at formal dances, Clarence J. Russell, principal of the Atkinson grammar school, would tell his wife, Mary A. Russell, to retire from the room and put a handkerchief in the front of her dress, though she was not immodestly attired, complains Mrs. Russell in a divorce suit filed in the circuit court yesterday. Further, she asserts, her husband objected so strenuously to the nursing of one of their children in a street car that he forced his wife to get out and walk.

The Russells were married in Portland October 23, 1909, and separated April 19, 1920. It is asserted in the divorce papers. There are two children, aged 6 and 8 years. That the personal habits of her husband were disgusting is another complaint of Mrs. Russell. She declares he would insist on lying in bed, reading and smoking, until 2 o'clock in the morning, spilling ashes on the bed and expectorating on the floor while she tried to sleep. Alimony of \$100 a month is asked.

Bodily Harm Feared.
Though he did not like the arrangement first provided for him by his wife—that of a room to himself on the second floor back—Charles Bafford asserts in a divorce complaint against Margaret Bafford that during the last few weeks of his married life he has locked himself up in the room nightly for fear of bodily harm. The Baffords were married at The Dalles December 12, 1913, and came to Portland in March. The husband was surprised to find that his wife had provided him a room in the rear on the second floor of their new home, where he was told to stay, he declares. He was ordered out of the house April 29, he says.

The married life of Frank Sell and Estella Sell has been very brief, though the wedding ceremony was performed January 23, 1918, according to the divorce action filed by the husband. He declares that on March 10, 1919, less than two months after their marriage in Spokane, his wife left him, that she did not return to him until he was living in Portland and the date of the return was April 10, 1919. On April 28, 1919, 18 days later, she again left, and this was the final desertion, he avers.

CANADIAN CLAIMS FOUGHT

Water Distribution in Montana Subject
of Arbitration.

OTTAWA, Ont., May 5.—That irrigation work in northern Montana will be deprived of sufficient water to irrigate farm lands there, if the claims of Canadian counsel are sustained, was pointed out today by Judge W. R. King, counsel of the reclamation service, in the argument before the joint commissions on international waterways, now considering the distribution of waters of the St. Mary's and Milk rivers between Canada and the United States.

Canadian counsel claim that the treaty which apportions the rivers specifies that tributaries of the river should be apportioned equally between the two countries, and that certain tributaries which join the Milk river after it flows out of Canada into Montana should be shared equally.

As there is not enough water in the combined streams to feed irrigation projects in both countries, arbitration becomes necessary.

LAND AWARDED DAUGHTER

Court Decides Mother Half-Breed
and Therefore Legally Married.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 5.—Elizabeth Harkrader won title to a parcel of land in Juneau, Alaska, today by a decision of the United States circuit court of appeals that her mother, Lilly Clark, was a half-breed Indian and therefore legally married to George Harkrader, a full-blooded Indian. The decision sustained the United States district court for the territory of Alaska.

Under the territorial law, marriage of a white person to a full-blooded Indian is prohibited, and the contention of C. R. Reid, who acquired the land from George Harkrader, was that Lilly Clark was a white woman.

\$2.55 WHEAT ASSURED

Canadian Farmers to Get 40 Cents
on Participation Certificates.

WINNIPEG, Man., May 5.—Canadian farmers are getting not less than 40 cents a bushel on the participation certificate issued by the Canadian wheat board on wheat sold through that agency, according to an announcement today by James Stewart, chairman of the board.

With the \$2.15 a bushel already guaranteed, will bring the price to \$2.55.
