**ROAD CLOSED FOR REPAIRS**—The Base Line road, from the end of the pavement to the Sandy river bridge was closed for repairs yesterday. The closed section is about a half mile in length and begins at the end of what is commonly known as the Base line extension.

**AMERICAN ASSOCIATION RECOGNIZES REED SCIENTIST**—An appropriation of \$200 has been awarded to Dr. A. A. Reed, professor of physics at Reed college, by the American Association for the Advancement of Science, for use in research work connected with magnetic alloys. Dr. Reed has been interested in this work for ten years and is the first appropriation he has received from the association, which annually distributes \$5000 among scientists in this country. According to Dr. Reed, the fund will be used this summer in making chemical analyses. Craig Elliot, a Reed sophomore, will assist Dr. Reed in the work, after the results of the research will be written for publication in scientific journals.

## \$18 COAT DENIED HER, SAYS EX-WIFE

Mother-in-Law Blamed in \$25,000 Alienation Suit.

## OTHER ABUSE RELATED

Mrs. Ida V. Roberts Declares ex-Husband, Isaac S. Labowitch, Was Ruled by Parent.

"Mother says you are too extravagant, you are going to break me up in business," said Isaac S. Labowitch when his wife purchased a \$18 coat, though Labowitch is reported to be worth from \$50,000 to \$75,000, according to the testimony of Mrs. Ida V. Roberts, ex-wife of Labowitch, in a \$25,000 alienation suit against her mother-in-law, on trial before Circuit Judge Stapleton.

The plaintiff went on to explain that her ex-husband had not bought her new clothes since her marriage in 1914, that she had her dresses made over until the dressmaker told her the garments were not fit to wear except under a coat. When she purchased the coat for \$18, she testified that her husband seemed highly pleased with it but after seeing his mother, Mrs. Cohen, told her she was ruining him and compelled her to take the garment back.

Mrs. Roberts said that her mother-in-law had insisted that they live next door, that she had monopolized the house and that she had continually criticized his wife.

"The Jew can make the money and the Gentile can spend it," said a remark the plaintiff said her mother-in-law had made. Religious differences played considerable part in the estrangement, from testimony thus far, though the plaintiff insists that her husband was very kind to her when not under the influence of his mother.

Mrs. Roberts said that her husband sent her on a trip to California in 1917 and refused to live with her when she returned, that he sued for divorce, but the suit was thrown out of court and that she sued and received a decree.

Witnesses for the defense late yesterday testified that Mrs. Cohen was not intolerant in affairs religious and had even attended the Methodist church.

"She often praised Ida and said she was the dearest woman in the world," said a witness who had testified she had known Mrs. Cohen intimately for 30 years. "I have been in her house when Ida was visiting her. She waited on Ida hand and foot. She always dressed up and Mrs. Cohen had to do all the dirty work."

One character witness, asked the question "Are you a Jew or a Gentile?" replied vehemently, "I am an American!"
