

Candid Estimate Asked.

"Least of all am I asking either the Lowden or the Hoover people to take an extreme view of the situa-tion here for mere purpose of augmenting General Wood's delegation at Chicago. Let them simply make a candid estimate of the situation; let them seek counsel among impartial observers anywhere in the state. They will always be told this: "The fight in Oregon is between Wood and Johnson.

"There is no dispute anywhere about what elements will constitute the opposing forces in a Wood-John-son fight here. The Michigan, Ne-braska and New Jersey primaries have all proved boyond all argument that pro-Germans Sime Febrare and that pro-Germans. Sinn Feiners and the adherents of Lenine are all pin-ning their faith to Johnson, hoping that his opposition to the treaty will add a powerful impulse to certain movements now on foot in various marts of Europe.

Extremists Back Johnson.

"In Indiana the same line-up was served. Johnson was strongly observed. backed by extremists of every descrip-tion. Wood had to depend on the American vote. His only tie with Europe so far has been the May-flower, which brought his ancestors to this country. But he proved that strictly American principles will suf-fice to win an election. He defeated Johnson, notwithstanding that Hoover and Lowden each took a considerable share of his strongth.

share of his strongth. "In Oregon the situation is the mame." I can quote Johnson's man-ager to prove it. A copy of the Min-neapolis Journal which has been sent to me contains a political article sent from Portland last February by Charles E. Cheney, a special corre-spondent of that publication. Re-ferring to Sanfield McDonald, in charge of Johnson headquarters at the time of his visit and with whom he had an interview, Mr. Cheney writes: "He admits that the German and Irish He admits that the German and Irish elements opposed to the league of na-tions are a factor in the Johnson strength.

"We are not turning away any votes, he said. 'But this sentiment on the treaty is growing and is in Johnson's favor.'
