DRIVER ACCUSED OF INTOXICATION.—A warrant for the arrest of William Christin, 340 Irving street, driver of an automobile which collided with an inbound Irving street car at East Irving and Irving streets, on a charge of driving an automobile while intoxicated, was issued yesterday out of the municipal court. Another charging Jack Collins of the same address, companion of Christin, with being intoxicated was also issued. Both men are in St. Vincent's hospital suffering from minor injuries. Christin's automobile was towed into a parked machine belonging to W. E. Rogers, 538 Gantenbein avenue, as a result of the collision.

18-YEAR SUIT IS ENDED

LAST OF H. D. WINTERS' PROPERTY SOLD FOR \$20,776.—Long litigation is closed with sale of Estate Parcels at Court-house by Referee. After 18 years of litigation over the estate of H. D. Winters, in which 176 persons at one time claimed a share, parcels of property remaining were sold for \$20,776 at the court house yesterday by Bradley A. Ewers, attorney and referee of the estate, which at first appraisal had been worth around \$60,000. Attempts of Will E. Purdy to establish a claim to the property through the means of an instrument declared by Circuit Judge McGinn to be a forgery directed against the future litigation involving the property. The contest of Purdy was carried to the supreme court without avail, the courts ruling that he had established no legal claim. The estate of Oregon attempted, without success to have the property escheat to the state. There were originally 128 contestants for the property, of whom 60 were adjudged possible heirs because of established relationship. In actions begun by these and other claimants there developed finally 176 defendants with claims. The final order of the court named 11 first cousins of Winters as heirs-at-law. Three of these cousins died during the litigation before their rights were determined. The only other item in yesterday's sale was at Grand avenue near East Davis street, sold to the Estates company for \$15,000.

WIFE IS CALLED PROFANE

ORDINARY EXPRESSIONS ARE RESENTED BY C. R. BREWER.—Nora Ridgeway Has Left to Make Home With Another Man, Says Husband in Divorce Suit. The "ordinary expressions" of Mrs. Grace L. Brewer about the home were decidedly profane, according to the divorce complaint of C. R. Brewer filed in the circuit court yesterday. The complaint was filed by the husband, who is a realtor, and she would make to their children, said the husband, who insisted that she should be removed. The divorce was granted in 1902 and had one son, 16, and two adopted sons, 11 and 12 years old. Nora Ridgeway, who was married to H. A. Ridgeway December 21, 1919, has left her husband to keep house for another man in Spokane, according to a divorce suit instituted yesterday. John David McCoy was only 21 when he married Florence May McCoy, aged 19, on May 11, 1919, and was unable to support her, she averred in a cross-complaint filed yesterday to his divorce suit. She declared they went to the home of her mother to live and that her husband was unable to pay rent or board. A. J. LeCuyer filed suit for divorce from Mabel M. LeCuyer yesterday, alleging desertion.

GRAIN EXPERT IS ASKED

Portland Notified to Make Choice to Sit on National Committee. Portland has been asked to furnish a grain expert to sit upon a national committee to consider present problems connected with the country's grain market. Notification was received yesterday at the chamber of commerce in a telegram from Frederick R. Wells, chairman of the chamber of commerce at Minneapolis. The message explains the situation, as follows: The conference of grain milling and allied interests held in Chicago on May 7 provided for the formation of a general committee to consider all problems having bearing upon grain markets other than those connected with future trading. You are requested immediately to serve on the committee. Prompt action is imperative, as early organization of the committee is essential in view of consideration of transportation problems connected with it. As men prominently connected with the grain corporation were out of the city yesterday, no indication was made as to the choice of a representative.
