

W. H. Binns, Supervisor and Organizer of Technical Education,

Investigates Local Methods.

"After an inspection of Portland vocational schools," declared W. H. Binns yesterday, "Ive gained a prop-er appreciation of elective courses and I'm going to do everything in my power to introduce a similar plan in the Victoria schools."

Mr. Binns is supervisor and organlzer of technical education in the pub-lic schools of Victoria and has been here since Monday investigating local methods of operation. He will spend today at Oregon Agricultural college and will leave Saturday for Tacoma, after making a trip up the Columbia river highway.

"We have been very much opposed to letting the students follow their own inclinations in choosing courses," Mr. Binns explained. "One thing that surprises me here and that we do not have in British Columbia is the wonhave in British Columbia is the won-derful spirit of team work between pupils and teachers. Your exhibit downtown is a spiendid idea, for busy folks pay for the schools and should know what is carried on in them." 


