LEGION ISSUES OLD PLEA

ALL OREGON POSTS ASKED TO BACK EDUCATIONAL BILL.

Measure on Ballot Declared in Need of Publicity—10,000 Claims Reported Unpaid.

Appeals for support for the soldiers' educational aid bill were telegraphed to 87 posts of the American Legion in Oregon Sunday night by William B. Pollett, department commander, following the endorsement by the state executive committee of the veterans' organization.

"Soldiers' educational aid bill, ballot title 317, must receive favorable publicity," read the telegram. "More than 4000 soldiers now receiving aid and appropriation exhausted with more than 10,000 unpaid claims. Unless the bill passes more than 2000 service men deprived of this aid. Act promptly along all legitimate lines of publicity."

A conference in Portland of vocational training officers of local posts will be called for the latter part of the month, the executive committee decided, at which time can be outlined a working programme to assist ex-service men who can avail themselves of vocational opportunities.

Four things will be undertaken by the legion: the instruction as to the benefits of vocational training and the methods of obtaining it, assistance in securing of the public schools, conditional follow-up and the location of employment for rehabilitated men. Plans were outlined Saturday night for the furnishing of information at

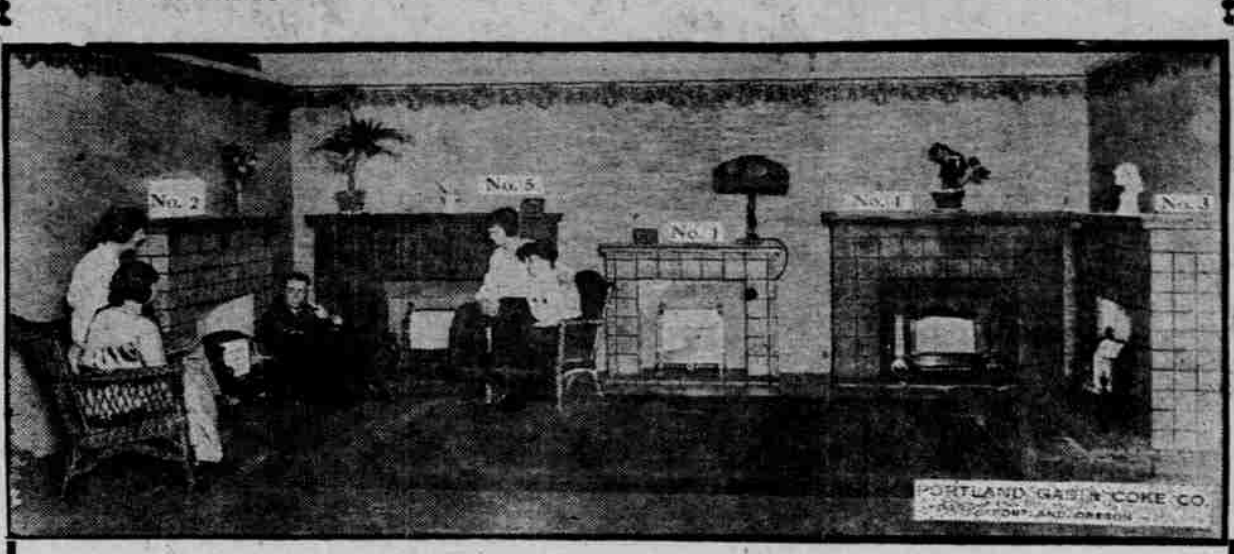

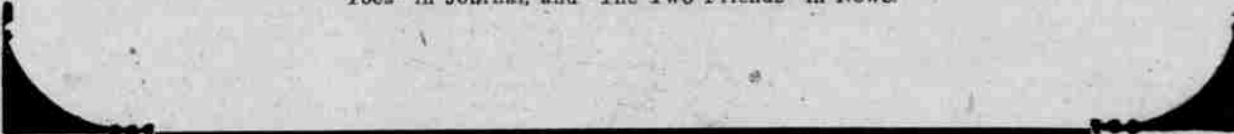
