DR. PARRISH IS HURT—Dr. George Parrish, city health officer, sustained a partial fracture of bones of the right ankle Thursday night when he slipped on the stairway at the armory. He was treated at the Police Emergency hospital following the accident and yesterday morning had his leg put in a plaster cast at the St. Vincent's hospital. He announced that he would be at his office today again in spite of the accident. Dr. Parrish was attending the fights at the armory when a number of seats gave way on the lower floor. He was going down stairs to see if anyone had been injured by the accident when he fell.

BIRDS CAUSE TROUBLE—Day after day mail brought to the state game warden's office contains complaints of depredations on wild pigeons in southern Oregon and robins in other sections of the state, which are said to be damaging crops seriously. Scarecrows and other devices seem to make no impression on the birds and requests have been made to kill a few. Game Warden Burghdoff said yesterday his office cannot be held responsible nor can it give such a mission, as the feathered pests come under the migratory bird law and only the department of agriculture is authorized to interfere with them.

ELECTRICIAN ACCUSED OF THEFT—Roy Cranwall, electrician, was arrested at Second and Columbia streets yesterday morning by Inspector Morak and Howell on a warrant charging him with the larceny of six electric lamps valued at \$20 from the Portland Electric Maintenance company. Charges against Cranwall were preferred by H. P. Hollenbrink, member of that concern, 252 Madison street. He was released on \$150 bail and will have hearing in the municipal court today.

SUICIDE THREATS REPORTED—W. E. Boggs, 571 Williams street, attempted to frighten his ex-wife, Mrs. Marie Boggs, into returning to him yesterday by threatening to commit suicide, according to a report to the police. He went into another room and turned on the gas for a few moments. Mrs. Boggs sent in a call for the police and Motorcycles Patrolmen Stiles and Wiles were dispatched to the scene. Boggs promised the policemen he would try no more "bluffs," they said.

WOMAN IN AUTO HURT—Mrs. Marie Kabath of the Venable hotel sustained bruises on the right arm and shoulder yesterday when the automobile driven by her husband, George Kabath, collided with another machine at East Thirty-seventh street and Sandy boulevard. Kabath reported to the police that the driver of the other machine was a deputy sheriff, but he failed to get the officer's name. He said his machine was damaged to the extent of about \$200.

FIREVIEW CLUB ELECTIONS—Officers were elected at the regular meeting of the Fairview Commercial club, which took place Thursday evening in the city hall of Fairview. C. A. Wadley was chosen president; R. R. Morrill, vice-president; O. F. Cady, secretary; J. Luchner Jr., treasurer, and Leslie St. Clair, sergeant-at-arms. Discussion at the session dealt principally on the proposed paving of the county road, which connects Sandy boulevard with the Base Line.

Packton, a junk dealer at 449 Third street, was killed and injured by his horse and wagon yesterday on Marquam hill road when the horse became frightened at a passing automobile truck. Motorcycle Patrolman Keegan of the auto theft bureau, reported that the man received cuts and bruises all over his body as a result of the experience. His injuries were not considered serious.

BUCKAROOS ARE COMING

36 SHRINER COWBOYS TO BE IN FLORAL PARADE.

Pendleton Member of Rose Festival Committee Promises to Outdo Elks' Meet Exhibit.

Thirty-six Shriner cowboys, mounted on the very pick of eastern Oregon horseflesh, will be a striking feature of the floral parade during the Rose festival, according to Walter E. Conklin, chairman of the outside participation committee who held a conference with F. W. Bond of Pendleton, member of the outside participation committee, yesterday.

Mr. Bond, although not in a position to make any definite promises, expects the Round-Up city to be represented by a wonderful float in the parade, in addition to the buckaroos. The matter of entering a float will be presented to Pendleton business men next week by Mr. Bond.

"Tom Boyland Jr., chairman of the Shriner committee in Pendleton, has arranged a wonderful show by the Round-up boys during the Shriner convention," said Mr. Bond. "Arrangements have been made to place the horses and riders in the floral parade and we plan to so decorate our horses that they will be a feature of the parade."

"In connection with the Shriner, we will outdo the activities of 1912 when we took part in the Elks' reunion in Portland. Anybody who remembers what the Pendleton boys did that week will realize that we will be on the map during the Shriner convention and Rose festival."

FOUR STAR ACTS COMING
ORPHEUM BILL TO HAVE EXCEPTIONAL FEATURES.

"Married" to Provide Many Laughs While Musical Numbers on Bill Will Be Varied.

The first four-feature show to be staged by the Orpheum for several weeks will be on the boards at the Hellig theater for three nights and four matinees commencing with the matinee tomorrow. The headliners are Homer B. Mason and Marguerite Keeler in their comedy gem, "Married," and Henri Scott, the famous American basso-baritone. The other artists in big type are Beth Berl, a western dancer discovered by an eastern impresario, and Ned Norworth who is assisted in a variety of fun-making by Evelyn Wells.

"Married," the comedy playlet presented by Mason & Keeler, is one of the most popular of big-time vaudeville. It has more than a laugh a minute. This act was one of the first bedroom farces staged in vaudeville and in the hands of the two comedians it is a refreshing and absolutely devoid of slapstick methods. Mr. Scott sings the immortal "Faint" song from Carmen, an aria from "Faust" and other equally enjoyable numbers. A newspaper reviewer in Seattle said briefly was the only defect in the famous singer's act. He is accompanied on the piano by A. Wynter Smith.

Beth Berl, the third feature, is a lithe danseuse from California, who wears a variety of costumes becomingly and knows how to weave an intricate pattern of graceful steps. She is assisted by Jay Vello and Paul McNeil. Ned Norworth, the fourth feature, is a comedian with method. He all his own and his act creates riotous laughter.

This show will close with the afternoon performance next Wednesday as the theater will be occupied by a vaudeville night by the benefit to be given by the combined theater managers in behalf of the entertainment fund for the Shriner's convention.

HOTEL STOCK SUBSCRIBED

Among those who spoke at yesterday's meeting was J. E. Gratke of Astoria, who stressed the need for hotel facilities at Gearhart and who

stated that the project was one of the most important in the city.
