150 OF HOQUIAM DAUGHTERS
APPEAR IN SCENES.Community Service Taking Large
Part in Affairs of Younger
Social Set.

HOQUIAM, Wash., May 28.—(Special.)—Nearly 150 of Hoquiam's fairest daughters, as members of the Girls' community service, tonight presented a beautiful allegorical and symbolical operetta in a local theater. Tickets for an overflow audience were sold. The title is "In a Flower Garden."

The curtain rose with the scene in darkness as the flowers slept. As the sun glowed brighter in morn, the flowers, one by one, awakened to the call of bird voices. With the brightening of a beautiful springtime morning, the scene passed into a radiant fairland of flowers and song. Garbed as flowers, the human blossoms sang in solo and chorus. The service is alike educational and recreational. Heading the organization is Miss Rosamond Parsons who specializes in community work at the University of Washington.

VOCATION TO BE TAUGHT

Plans for State Industrial Girls
Told by Matron.

CENTRALIA, Wash., May 28.—(Special.)—According to Mrs. Ida McQuestion, matron of the state industrial school for girls at Grand Mound, a music teacher will be employed at the school next year and domestic science will be taught.

In addressing a meeting of women in Centralia Wednesday afternoon Mrs. McQuestion said that each girl at the school will be taught a vocation, adding that the girls would make excellent welfare workers, in which subject they are interested.

Mrs. McQuestion assigned home environment as the chief cause of delinquency among girls.

The new building at the state school has been completed and has been named "Rainbow cottage."

Drainage Work Completed.

CENTRALIA, Wash., May 28.—(Special.)—A. B. Crane, drainage specialist, has returned to his Everett headquarters after ten days' work in

Lewis county under the auspices of the Lewis county farm bureau. During this period drainage systems on four farms in different sections of the county were laid out, each farm being the scene of a demonstration and lecture by Mr. Crane. In addition, the specialist assisted three Forde Prairie farmers with an irrigation project and another farmer at Toledo in drainage work.

SHRINE CLUB ORGANIZED

Dgiles Members Plan to Entertain
Convention Visitors.

THE DALLES, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—To provide entertainment for Shriners who on their way to the Portland convention will stop in this city for two-hour periods 30 local Shriners at an enthusiastic meeting last night organized a Shrine club of The Dalles. Carlton L. Pepper was elected president, Harlan Fancher vice-president and Robert L. Good secretary and treasurer.

Some 15 Shriners special trains are expected to pass through The Dalles carrying Shriners from all sections of the United States to the big convention. The local club proposes to entertain all Shriners stopping off in this city.

The club has engaged Elks' hall for the morning of June 21, when 200 Shriners coming through will be served breakfast.

COMPANY TO REORGANIZE

Oregon Dehydration Plants Have
Busy Season Ahead.

THE DALLES, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—Dehydration plants of the Kings Food Products company in The Dalles and at Salem will process \$2,000,000 worth of fruits and vegetables this season, declared E. A. Clark, general manager, today. "The product has all been sold on orders from jobbers in the east and west," he added.

The dehydration plant here is one of the city's important industries. Since its establishment in 1915 the plant has been enlarged to about three times its original size.

Further expansion now is necessary. To this end the company is to be reorganized. It will be capitalized at \$3,000,000. About 25 local capitalists are interested.

Indian Lands Sold.

YAKIMA, Wash., May 28.—(Special.)—Fifty-seven tracts of Indian lands on the Yakima reservation were offered for sale by Don M. Carr, superintendent of the reservation. The highest price an acre was paid for 40 acres bought by a Tappanish grower, who paid \$31,000. The total sum paid for all the tracts was close to \$400,000.

Slayer Gets 1 to 10 Years.

TWIN FALLS, Idaho, May 28.—(Special.)—A. W. Carver, recently convicted of the manslaughter of a basque sheepherder near Bliss, Idaho, in a quarrel, was sentenced to from one to ten years in the state penitentiary at Boise Wednesday by District Judge Babcock.

WILL E. PURDY OF SALEM
SPENDS \$159.90.Account Is Filed in Connection
With Campaign for Delegate to
Democratic Convention.

SALEM, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—Will E. Purdy of Salem expended a total of \$159.90 in making the campaign for delegate to the democratic national convention to be held in San Francisco next month, according to his expense account filed with the secretary of state here today.

Town Marshal, Not Film Hero, Nominated.

Hood River Peace Officer Peaved
Over Suggestion That Star Is
Selected.

HOOD RIVER, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—The deputy city marshal of Hood River, W. E. Hart, who keeps away burglars, automobile thieves and hooey men while his fellow citizens sleep, went home in a huff at daybreak this morning. It was all the result of a case of mistaken identity.

Although Hood River county democrats gave the republican candidate, Thomas P. Johnson, the nomination of the Bourbons, no small number of the democrats complimented Mr. Hart, familiarly known as "Bill," by writing in his name. When the official recount was being scanned at the sec-

retary of state's office, somebody jumped at the conclusion that Bill Hart, the movie hero, had received the vote. That is why Marshal Hart is sore.

Mr. Hart is a Kentuckian. So is the local sheriff. In fact, it seems a prerequisite to attaining a position as a local peace officer that the applicant be a native of Kentucky. Mr. Hart is known to be a "bad hombre" when he is peaved. He inquired today who The Oregonian correspondent at Salem might be. Mr. Hart at intervals escorts some of the convicted bad men, sent to the penitentiary from Hood River, down to Salem. He intimated that he might call on a newspaper man the next time he sallies down to the capital.

LUMBERMEN WIN TEST

Writ to Enjoin Driving Operations
Refused by Court.

ABERDEEN, Wash., May 28.—(Special.)—Spelshing and driving operations of a log-driving company cannot be enjoined, according to a decision by Judge Hewen of Pacific county in the case of the Walker Timber company and J. H. Price against the Humpulips Driving company. Judge Hewen stated that a log-driving company is a public service corporation and cannot be prohibited from carrying on its business by issuance of injunctions.

The Walker company and Price petitioned for an injunction on the ground that the splashing of the Humpulips company injured property on the river bank belonging to the petitioners by erosion and washing of the banks.

\$6 Paid for Corn.

PROSSER, Wash., May 28.—(Special.)—Three dollars and up to \$6 a bushel has been received by E. E. Starkey for carload lots of corn. Owing to the number of prizes won by Starkey in national contests his corn has been in great demand by seed companies, including the Lilly Company of Seattle. Mr. Starkey's corn has averaged more than 80 bushels an acre year after year.

Body Not That of I. W. W.

CHEHALIS, Wash., May 28.—(Special.)—Following an investigation by Sheriff Berry and Deputy Roberts of the body found near Oakville early in the week, the two officers believe that the dead man was not Hanson, the I. W. W. refugee, who made his escape last fall from the poses that were searching for the men implicated in the armistice day murders at Centralia.
