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28 'JAGS' IN POLICE NET

Brisk Trade Evidently Piled by

Bootleggers were apparently doing a thriving business in Portland Saturday night and yesterday morning, judging from the large number of "drunks" which were taken in the police net. A total of 28 charged with imbibing everything from alcohol to bitters with a kick in it were taken to jail and will have hearings in the municipal court today.
