

I. W. W. PLAN STRIKE AT HARVEST'S PEAK

Resolutions by Secret Convention Are Revealed.

MINUTES COPY IS SEIZED

General Walkout Throughout Country Also Proposed in Effort to Have Prisoners Freed.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 31.—(Special.)—A general strike throughout the country and an effort to influence all harvest hands in the United States to walk out of the fields at the height of the harvest season are two of the interesting items contained in resolutions adopted at the national convention of the I. W. W. in Chicago, May 10 to 15. The resolutions fell into the hands of federal agents here today.

A complete copy of the minutes of the national convention was seized by the police in a raid on an embryo district I. W. W. headquarters here last night. The convention was held behind locked doors and the delegates were asked to have entered and left Chicago secretly. Many names of delegates are in the hands of the federal officials, and a complete copy of the minutes of the convention has been received great impetus by the seizure.

Measure Viewed as Defense.

Resolution No. 42, pertaining to the general strike, reads: "Whereas, there is a constant demand on the I. W. W. for legal defense, some of our members being arrested almost daily, and whereas, there is a difference of opinion among some of our members about legal defense, therefore be it resolved that we, the resolutions committee of the I. W. W. convention, urge upon the membership of the I. W. W. to speed up the work of organization in order that we may be able to use the general strike to open the jail doors and give our fellow workers back their freedom."

The national convention appeared to be somewhat concerned on the high cost of legal defense and another resolution was adopted to obtain the "best legal talent" possible for the least expenditure. A resolution to increase the dues of the organization failed, but it was decided to submit it to a referendum of the different I. W. W. affiliations. The resolution urging more action in the harvest fields is the result of a report by a committee demanding action on the matter of class war prisoners.

Organization Read Cited.

The resolution urges all delegates to impress on their locals upon returning to their homes the need to organize thoroughly for the work of calling out the harvest hands, especially in the grain fields of the central and northwest states.

The minutes show that a press agent was engaged and that he was on hand to assemble data on the business of the convention for publication of certain parts of the convention's actions.

The assets of the organization were shown to be approximately \$3,000,000 with expenditures of \$247,000 during 1919. The assets consisted mainly of foreign-labor contracts.

It was proposed to establish a district headquarters and supply station in the southwest for the states of California, Arizona and Nevada. Mention was made of the dissatisfaction in the coal mining districts with the American Federation of Labor and concessions were granted the "wobblies" locals in order to bring these dissatisfied men within the fold. Fifty per cent of all dues collected will go to the general headquarters.

"Big Bill" Hayward, president of the organization, was marked absent at every meeting, but further down in the minutes he was entered as having just arrived. "Big Bill," the line below, was putting over the dramatic entry.

Big Cut Announced in Lumber Prices

New Scale Effective Today at Astoria.

LARGE SUPPLIES ON HAND

Situation Explained as Caused by Difficulty of Making Rail Shipments to East.

ASTORIA, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—Effective tomorrow morning there will be a big drop in the retail prices of lumber on the local market. The cut will range from \$7 a thousand feet on rough lumber to \$15 a thousand on the higher grades, while the reduction in the prices of shingles and lath will be between 20 and 50 per cent. One result of this reduction is expected to be an added impetus to building operations in Astoria, where residences and business houses are badly needed, but where building has been severely checked by the high prices of material and labor.

Scale Officially Announced.

In officially announcing the new scale of prices, R. K. Booth, manager of the City Lumber & Supply company, selling agent for the local mills, said: "The primary object of this cut in prices is to clear the millyards of their accumulated stocks and at the same time encourage building activities. The transportation system of the country is at the present time greatly overladen, owing to lack of sufficient equipment and the railroad yards of the east and middle west are badly congested on account of the recent strikes. Consequently our rail shipments have been curtailed and stocks are beginning to pile up in the mill yards. We are informed it will be some time before traffic conditions will permit the normal rail shipments eastward."

"This situation coming at the time of year best adapted for building on the coast, we are taking advantage of the temporary lull in lumber movements to put into effect a substantial reduction on all grades of lumber in the local markets."

Increase Likely in Future.

"These new prices we think can be maintained for about 60 days. We can only guess when the railroad situation will be clarified, but we are advised that emergency steps have been started to remove the congestion at the terminals and get cars moving west again. This in conjunction with the cargo business, which is fast increasing, is expected to bring lumber shipments back to normal in from 30 to 60 days. If these conditions work out and normal shipments are resumed, the heavy demand for all kinds of lumber products which are so badly needed in all quarters will have a tendency to quickly bring prices back to the high level which prevailed early in the spring."

BOCHE COUP IS RUMORED

REVOLT TO RESTORE THRONE IS COMMON TALK.

OFFICERS OF BERLIN GARRISON TAKE OATH TO SUPPORT GOVERNMENT AGAINST ANY UPRISING.

LONDON, May 31.—Rumors of an impending revolt are steadily growing in Berlin and there are indications the headquarters of the new revolutionary army are at Potsdam, where Prince August William, son of former Emperor William, is staying. The revolutionaries are the least of the military party, says a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company.

Advices from Doorn declare William Hohenzollern is in high hopes of a successful coup and believes he will once more become ruler of the German empire, the dispatch says.

BERLIN, May 31.—Commanders of the garrison of Greater Berlin visited the minister of defense today and took the oath that they and their corps were ready to protect the constitution by force against any attempted coup, whether the right or left.

IDAHO OFFERS TIMBER

Lot Valued at \$491,574 to Be Put Up at Auction on June 5.

SPOKANE, Wash. May 31.—(Special.)—State-owned timber in Idaho valued at \$491,574, will be sold at public auction at Sandpoint, Idaho, June 5. The sale will take place at 10 o'clock at the county courthouse. Timber dealers from every part of the northwest, including many from Spokane, are expected to bid for the timber.

Under the terms of auction all timber must go to one bidder. The land is located on parts of sections 1 to 28. All in Bonner county, 20 per cent of the purchase price must be paid in cash and the buyer must pay the remainder in 16 payments, with 6 per cent interest. At the end of 20 years the land on which the timber stands, and all timber remaining uncut at that time, will revert to the state. In addition to the purchase price the successful bidder must pay the costs of the sale, amounting to \$1440.50.

SHEEP WAR IS ON AGAIN

Idaho Range Trouble Starts Over State Lease Land.

BOISE, Idaho, May 31.—(Special.)—Cattle and sheepmen are at war again in Owyhee county. The auctioning of leases of state grazing lands set for June 28, is the cause of the trouble. The state land board recently selected by the land commission in various small bodies which control streams in proximity to cattle ranges used by Owyhee county settlers.

The settlers are up in arms. They say that to lease these lands means giving control of 388,000 acres of range to sheepmen. The sheepmen say this is an entirely incorrect version of the situation; that they desire to mortgage no one and only grazing lands where they can water their sheep. The land board has taken the matter under advisement.

CHRONOS LIKELY TO HANG

No Appeal Entered on Behalf of Convicted Murderer.

BUTTE, Mont., May 31.—Unless an appeal is taken in his behalf, Theodore Chronos, it is expected today will be hanged in the jail yard here Friday morning. Chronos was convicted of participation in the murder of Sylvester J. Prenatt, December 9 last.

A notice of appeal would serve as a stay of execution, but no step has been taken in that direction and Sheriff O'Rourke said today that he would begin to make preparations tomorrow for the execution.

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HIGHER PAPER PREDICTED

EDITORS URGING CONGRESS TO PROVIDE RELIEF.

Substantial Appropriations Asked for Effort to Find Substitute for Wood Pulp.

BOSTON, May 31.—The newspaper shortage was discussed today at the National Editorial association annual convention here. A resolution, unanimously adopted and forwarded to Chairman Porter of the house foreign relations committee, urged the passage of senate joint resolution No. 12, designed to afford immediate relief in the emergency and to benefit country newspapers.

Edwards Albright, Gallatin, Tenn., president declared that "the ubiquitous profiteer is abroad in the print-paper field just as in many other lines."

"My opinion is," he added, "that congress should restrict the issue of every newspaper to a maximum of so many pages per day and define a maximum page size. Large users of print paper, who own their own mills, should keep out of the spot market. Congress also should make a substantial appropriation to make a determined effort to find a substitute for wood pulp."

President P. T. Dodge of the International Paper company predicted higher prices for newsprint, due to threatened rise in freight rates and was denounced by laborers. He suggested some amendment to the postal law requiring an added rate on newspapers above a certain weight and size.

"Canada is permitted to keep raw materials from us," he said, "and so long as we are thus deprived the International Paper company will not put another dollar with my consent into American mills."

MANY WITNESSES CALLED

CAMPAIGN FINANCES INQUIRY WILL BE CONTINUED.

Committee Plans to Resume Work After Adjournment for Republican Convention.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—(By the Associated Press.)—Senate investigation into campaign-convention financing campaigns will be continued after the republican convention and before the democratic convention, under plans of the committee.

A score of witnesses have been summoned for tomorrow, and Chairman Kenyon said tonight it was proposed to drive through with their examination and temporarily to halt the investigation Thursday night, so members and others concerned might attend the republican national convention.

W. T. Neville, financial officer of the Plumb plan league, will be asked tomorrow by the chairman whether that organization—formed to bring about tri-partite control of the railroads—had backing of any kind. This is the only new phase of the investigation now planned.

Rev. R. A. Baker of Westerville, O., general superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of America, has been summoned for examination as to whether his organization had spent any money for any presidential candidate, but after he had telegraphed he could not come before Wednesday.

FARE HEARING RESUMES

PLEA FOR ADVANCE TO BE CONSIDERED TODAY.

Commission Takes Up Question Because of Failure of Voters to Adopt Relief Measures.

In a further effort to find relief for the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, which is pending to the many of the officials of the company, is being rapidly driven into bankruptcy from increasing costs of operation and stationary rates, the hearings upon the petition of the company for relief measures will be resumed today. The case will be taken up by the state public service commission beginning at 10 o'clock this morning in the commission's quarters at room 252 county courthouse.

The resumption of the hearings today comes as a result of the action of the voters of the city in voting down the three relief measures presented to them at the primary election on May 21.

At the time that the recent recommendation was made by the commission urging the relief measures which were rejected by the voters at the primary, H. H. Corey presented a minority report during the hearing in Washington at that time, and the case will be resumed this morning with Mr. Corey and Fred G. Buchtel, chairman of the commission, present.

SPINSTER TAX IS FAVORED

FRENCH WOMEN GLAD THAT THEY ARE NOT EXEMPT.

Government Congratulated on Its Stand and Warned That Issue of Vote Will Be Raised.

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PARIS, May 31.—(Special cable.)—The French Women's Suffrage union has sent the minister of finance the following message, congratulating the government for having caused the tax on spinster to be raised.

"The senate has just discussed the question whether or not spinsters should pay an income tax. It is a chivalrous way some senators asked that the tax only apply to men because only in few cases are women voluntary spinsters and it appeared unjust that they should pay a tax on their incomes."

"Following the government's request, with a big majority the senate turned down such an amendment. In the name of the association allow us to express our pleasure at such a decision."

"As soon as the senate passes the new law the question of women's man suffrage will be discussed there and with more authority we shall be able to demand that the principles of justice and democracy which have always been ours, be applied."

Women are equal to men before the law in the fulfillment of their duties; they should be equals when it is a question of their rights."

GERMAN EMPRESS IS ILL

Return of Heart Trouble Caused by Emotion of Moving.

DOORN, Holland, May 31.—There has been a recurrence of the former German empress' heart affection, due to the emotion of moving. Dr. Haene, who is in attendance, says there is no imminent danger, but has prescribed the utmost care.

CHILDREN NOT GREETED

AUSTRIAN YOUNGSTERS TAKEN TO ENGLAND.

No Cheer Sent Up for Little Guests Coming From Famine Stricken Areas.

LONDON, May 31.—(Special Cable.)—Five hundred Austrian children arrived in this country recently as guests of the Famine Area Children's Hospitality committee, but they had a frigid welcome. Not a cheer sounded as they streamed off the boat at Folkestone and passed in a long procession to the train. The mayor was not there. No member of the corporation was there. The church was not there. No welcome could have been colder. There was indeed no official welcome of any kind.

Apparently, says the Daily News, it had not even occurred to the committee that it would have been a kindly thing to send some English children down to the pier to make it easier for these little guests of England to feel that they had come to a friendly country. Not an English child was there to cheer the Austrian children as they struggled along, carrying their heavy kit bags to the train. Even when the Austrian children were driving in lorries to the Richborough camp there was no friendly demonstration. The people of Sandwich stood at their doors but no cheer was raised.
