

## DEAD ARE HONORED AT ALL CEMETERIES

Men Urged to Guard Nation  
From Present Perils.

## SAILORS NOT FORGOTTEN

Special Homage Accorded Veterans  
of Spanish War on Altar  
Built of Flowers.

Veterans of three wars—the civil strife, the Spanish-American conflict and the late war—who gathered at Lone Fir cemetery yesterday morning to pay tribute and honor to comrades who have given their all that this nation might live, were called upon to wage unrelenting warfare against the unrest and turmoil now rampant throughout the nation.

It was Major Cassius B. Peck, a veteran of the late war, who sounded the clarion call to arms, who urged the former fighters to stand and save the nation from what he declared to be a greater peril than has existed at any time during its history.

With perfect weather prevailing, more than 500 veterans, the majority silver-haired boys in faded blue, participated in the service. In fact, T. Brouillette, who served in the dual capacity of chairman and chaplain, opened the impressive service with an invocation.

The Oregon fife and drum corps was there, and no memorial service in this state could be complete without the martial music that these veteran musicians dispense. General John A. Logan's orders inaugurating Memorial day, issued on May 5, 1868, were read by Adjutant J. W. Ogilvie.

**Gettysburg Address Read.**  
For years Lincoln's Gettysburg address has been an important feature at every memorial exercise throughout the United States. But it is doubtful if ever this famous oration has been delivered with more effect than it was yesterday in Lone Fir by a 44-year-old lad, Roland Hansen. Serious was this youth, and forceful was his delivery. In fact, few orators with years of platform experience could be credited with a more impressive reading of the martyred president's famous address.

It was Cassius Peck who left the well-worn path of the usual Memorial day program, and by his attention to the former warriors problems of the present day.

"We are gathered here today for a two-fold purpose," explained Major Peck. "We are here to pay tribute to those who have given their lives for this nation might not perish. We are also here to re-dedicate our lives to a battle, or fight, if you please, which will insure that the death of our comrades might not have been in vain."

"We are confronted today with the same old problem which covers the stream of our civilization, a stream which is made up of damnable, un-patriotic profiteers. We are also brought face to face with the dregs in the streams made up of I. W. W. anarchists and members of other anti-government agencies."

"In the middle of this stream is the clear water mark of the middle class of people, through whose veins flows real American blood."

"Under-production and over-consumption is the cause of our evils of today. The man who would, under existing conditions, exact something to which he is not entitled is as bad as the I. W. W. And the laboring man who refuses to give a 100 per cent effort for a 100 per cent wage, is just the same class."

"The solution is to give each wage-earner a fair wage, sufficient to enable him to raise his family properly, to give capital a fair return on its investments and to make an equal division of the remainder of profits between capital and labor. Make every laborer a capitalist. Give him an interest in the profits and under-production will cease. Until we arrive at some basis of profit-sharing we will be faced with this battle between capital and wages."

**Services at Other Cemeteries.**  
In addition to the services at Lone Fir yesterday, veterans of American wars gathered at other cemeteries throughout the city, and assisted by school children and khaki-clad Boy Scouts, conducted services in sacred memory of the departed warriors.

At St. John's the services were held at the Memorial monument near Jersey street immediately following a parade conducted by the members of the Grand Army of the Republic.

In Montavilla members of McKinley post held services in their hall, and in Lents the veterans gathered at the Oddfellows hall.

The sailors and marines were not forgotten, for at 10:26 o'clock yesterday impressive ceremonies were conducted at the foot of Stark street. Flowers strewn over the waters in conformity to the time-worn traditions and customs of the navy, brought to mind the thousands of brave men who had met their death defending the nation at sea.

And while the services throughout the city were in the form of tribute to all warriors who laid down their lives beneath the stars and stripes, those who died in the Spanish-American war were accorded special homage by the Spanish war veterans in the plaza block opposite the courthouse. Here an altar constructed of flowers upon which large bouquets of flowers and ferns were deposited by the relatives of those who failed to return.

## HOQUIAM LAYS CORNERSTONE

Funds Already Raised for Erection of New Veterans Home.

HOQUIAM, Wash., May 31.—(Special.)—Hoquiam observed Memorial day on Sunday with elaborate exercises that included laying the cornerstone of the new Veterans' home, costing \$75,000, for which funds were raised by public efforts here one week recently. Colonel W. M. Inglis of Seattle, was principal guest. Professor Clark M. Bissett of the University of Washington was orator of the day. Senator Alexander Polson was another speaker. Hundreds of children were in the parade that included 400 former service men in uniform of America and the allies. Wild and domestic flowers strewn the path of the marchers and the scene of dedication. All the lodges and churches were represented.

## MEDFORD SERVICE TOUCHING

Flowers Strewn on Water in Memory of Sailors and Marines.

MEDFORD, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—The most touching feature of the Memorial day observance in Medford today came when the parade ended at the Bear creek bridge and the paraders threw flowers over the

water in memory of the dead sailors and marines while Company D, Fifth Oregon Infantry fired a salute. Then followed the Memorial day exercises in the Page theater, including the chief address by Rev. J. R. Sarnett and the reading of Lincoln's Gettysburg address by Commander George Codding of the Medford post of the American Legion.

The day's observance was under the joint auspices of the Grand Army of the Republic and American Legion posts, the Women's Relief Corps chapter and the parade was made up of members of these organizations, Company D, Fifth Oregon Infantry, the Women's American Legion post, auxiliary, Daughters of the American Revolution, Boy Scouts, school girls and civic organizations. The graves of the soldier dead were decorated by the patriotic organizations this forenoon.

## PATRIOTIC DEAD HONORED

Veterans of Past Wars Unite in Memorial Day Services.

BAKER, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—Memorial day was appropriately observed in Baker by members of the Grand Army of the Republic, the American War Veterans and Veterans of the World War as well as the Philippine expedition and the Philippine Insurrection, who gathered this afternoon at the court house and marched to the opera house. Following the programme at the opera house, the war heroes marched to Mount Hope cemetery, where memorial exercises were held. Invocation was given by Rev. C. E. Helman, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church, followed by the reading of General Logan's Memorial day order and Lincoln's Gettysburg address by Colonel O. M. Johnson. A vocal solo was rendered by Mrs. Leland S. Finch, after which A. A. Smith delivered the patriotic address of the day. J. A. Hoskins delighted her hearers with a vocal solo and another patriotic address was given by Frank C. McCulloch. The Baker Concert band played "America" and Rev. E. T. Starkey, of the Calvary Baptist church, pronounced the benediction. The remainder of the day was spent in decorating the resting places of beloved ones.

## HOOD RIVER VISITS GRAVES

Veterans Make Annual Pilgrimage; Concert and Address Follows.

HOOD RIVER, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—Memorial day was observed solemnly in Hood River. Citizens joined Canby post of the Grand Army of the Republic, in the annual pilgrimage of its members to Idle Wilds cemetery, where the graves of the fallen soldiers and sailors were visited. The parade was in uniform, followed by Boy Scouts and members of the Knights of Pythias and their band, marched behind automobiles carrying the Grand Army men and members of the Women's Relief Corps.

The old soldiers observed a ritualistic service at the grave of Judge A. C. Buck, who at the time of his recent death was commander of the Grand Army post.

Following a band concert at the courthouse lawn, Franklin Korrell of Portland, introduced by Captain Edward W. Vanhorn, commander of the local American Legion post, delivered a memorial address.

## MEMORIAL TREES PLANTED

Salem Observes Day With Parade and Visits to Graves.

SALEM, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—Salem, in common with other towns and cities throughout Marion county, observed Memorial day with appropriate ceremonies. In the morning there were individual visits to the cemeteries, while in the afternoon a parade was the feature attraction. In the parade marched several hundred young men who participated in the late war. Spanish War Veterans, Daughters of the American Revolution, Grand Army of the Republic and Women's Relief Corps. The parade was in charge of Colonel Carl Abraham, acting as marshal of the day.

The tree planting ceremonies in the courthouse square added interest to the ceremonies.

## Judge Watson Delivers Address.

GOLD HILL, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—Memorial services were observed by the Gold Hill Grand Army of the Republic and women's relief

corps, and the people generally today. Judge C. B. Watson delivered the memorial address and the two organizations in a body visited the local cemeteries.

## HOLIDAY OBSERVED QUIETLY

Flowers Cast Upon Waters in Honor of Sailors and Marines.

THE DALLES, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—In honor to the soldier dead, local stores closed their doors all day today. The city kept the holiday quietly. There was no public observance.

"Fitting ceremonies were held at Oddfellows' cemetery yesterday afternoon. An address was delivered by Dr. J. C. Chormley of Wasco post. A flag was presented the American Legion post by the Daughters of the American Revolution. A programme of music was rendered.

Upon the return from the cemetery flowers were cast upon the waters at the Ninth-street bridge in honor of sailors and marines who have died for democracy.

## LEGION LEADS IN SERVICES

Bend Townpeople Turn Out to Attend Memorial Day Exercises.

BEND, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—Under the auspices of Percy A. Stevens post, American Legion, Memorial day services were held here this morning in the presence of nearly a thousand townspeople. The preliminary programme given in the gymnasium of the Y. M. C. A. featured a patriotic address by Rev. Edgar Purdy of the Bend Methodist church in which he urged the perpetuation of the ideals for which the world war had been fought. Veterans of the Spanish American and civil wars were seated about the speaker.

Led by the Shevlin-Hixon mill band in khaki, more than 100 ex-soldiers, sailors and marines in uniform, marched to Pilot Butte cemetery, where the simple service authorized by the American Legion was observed.

## HOPS COME ALONG WELL

Company Completes Job of Planting 110 Acres of New Yard.

CHEHALIS, Wash., May 31.—(Special.)—Gus Anderson, manager of the big farm of the Klaber investment company, Klaber, 14 miles southwest of Chehalis, in the Chehalis valley, says that the work of planting the 110 acres of new hops has been completed and the plants are coming along nicely. The Klaber investment company, of which H. A. Kaufman of Tacoma is the business head, has in addition to the 110 acres of new yard, 30 acres that will be in full bearing this season. These are doing splendidly also. This 30-acre yard has not been contracted.

This spring the Klaber company also planted about five acres to Loganberries for the Chehalis cannery and would have set out more had the number of available plants not been very limited.
