

REVERENT THRONGS REVIEW PROCESSION

Old Veterans and Young
Join in Parade.

WEATHER ACTS AS TONIC

"Hard Boiled" Top Sergeant
Knocks Off Hats of Careless
Viewers of Flag.

Portland's fairest spring day, with speckless skies, warm sun and lazy breezes, fired the blood of veterans of three wars as they swung through the main streets of the city yesterday to the plaudits of reverent thousands. There was a tonic in the air which brought to the aging limbs of the Grand Army of the Republic marchers the same carefree swing that characterized the walk of world war fighters in escort and in columns. Fast thinning though the ranks of the Grand Army of the Republic may be, the old veterans turned out 100 per cent, outnumbering both Spanish American and world war service men, to many of whom the full significance of Memorial day has not been brought home. Future war veterans marched by the side of experienced warriors in the ranks of the Oregon National Guard, while possible fighters of the next generation brought up the rear in columns of cadets from the Hill Military academy.

American Legion men in uniform marched by the side of automobiles conveying aged Grand Army of the Republic veterans, an escort of honor. Veterans of Foreign Wars marched as a body in the parade, trudging along beside their granddads wearing Grand Army of the Republic badges, brought to many minds not distant days when mothers, sisters, daughters and sweethearts clung fondly to men in khaki and olive drab marching through streets of Portland for the last time before leaving for foreign service in the world war.

Police Platoon Leads.
Behind a platoon of bluecoats, headed by Police Captain Moore, came Colonel George A. White, adjutant-general of Oregon, grand marshal of the parade and his staff. Chief of staff for Colonel White was Captain Harry C. Brumbaugh.

Other staff members were: Sergeant William B. Pollett, state commander of the American Legion; Lieutenant Commander John A. Beckwith, senior officer of the naval reserve for this district; Captain G. D. Murray of the Canadian Veterans; Commanders A. Michelson and R. C. Markee of the Grand Army of the Republic; Lieutenant-Colonel James J. Crossley, Major James J. Crossley, Major James J. Crossley, senior grade, Harold C. Jones; Lieutenant Orlando Peabody; Captain Robert Sawyer; Sergeant J. W. Jones; State Wilbur Henderson and Sergeant Lloyd E. Cullins.

Organizer of the parade and other Memorial day observances for the Grand Army of the Republic was Colonel Henry J. Jones.

With the grand marshal and staff marched Mayor Baker. The Multnomah Guard band followed.

National Guard in Line.
Colonel Creed C. Hammond led the companies of the 5th Oregon Infantry, National Guard. The olive drab marchers wore much the same uniform as the line. Sons of Veterans, commanded by E. D. Timms, followed.

Heading the Grand Army of the Republic contingent was the famous life and drum corps which played as loudly and with as much of the martial throb as in any preceding years. The Grand Army men were led by Commander T. H. Stevens. The veterans formed a column, marching by scores were driven along the line of march in automobiles of which the first was a Buick of the Relief Corps also were in the automobiles.

American Legion veterans were detailed four to an automobile as escorts. Many of the automobiles were the families of men who had made the supreme sacrifice in France. Belgium, these machines bearing large gold stars on the windshields.

Hats Knocked Off.

Veterans of Foreign Wars, Over-the-Top post, formed the next contingent under Commander J. W. Jones. Top sergeant of the "hard-boiled" variety in the rear rank of the first squad of these marchers caused some confusion by shooting at onlookers on the line of march. "Take off at bat" and knocking a few hats from the heads of unconcerned or of spectators who had not noticed the flag passing at the head of the column. His lead, verbally, was followed by others in the formation.

Hill Military academy cadets under Colonel W. H. C. Bowen concluded the procession. Dressed in their greenish drab suits and snappy overcoats, the young men made an excellent impression, getting much applause.

Annapolis Lures Only One.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—Only one person has notified the office of President Kerr of his desire for appointment to the United States Naval academy at Annapolis, although there is an opportunity for several others to apply for appointment prior to June 2. 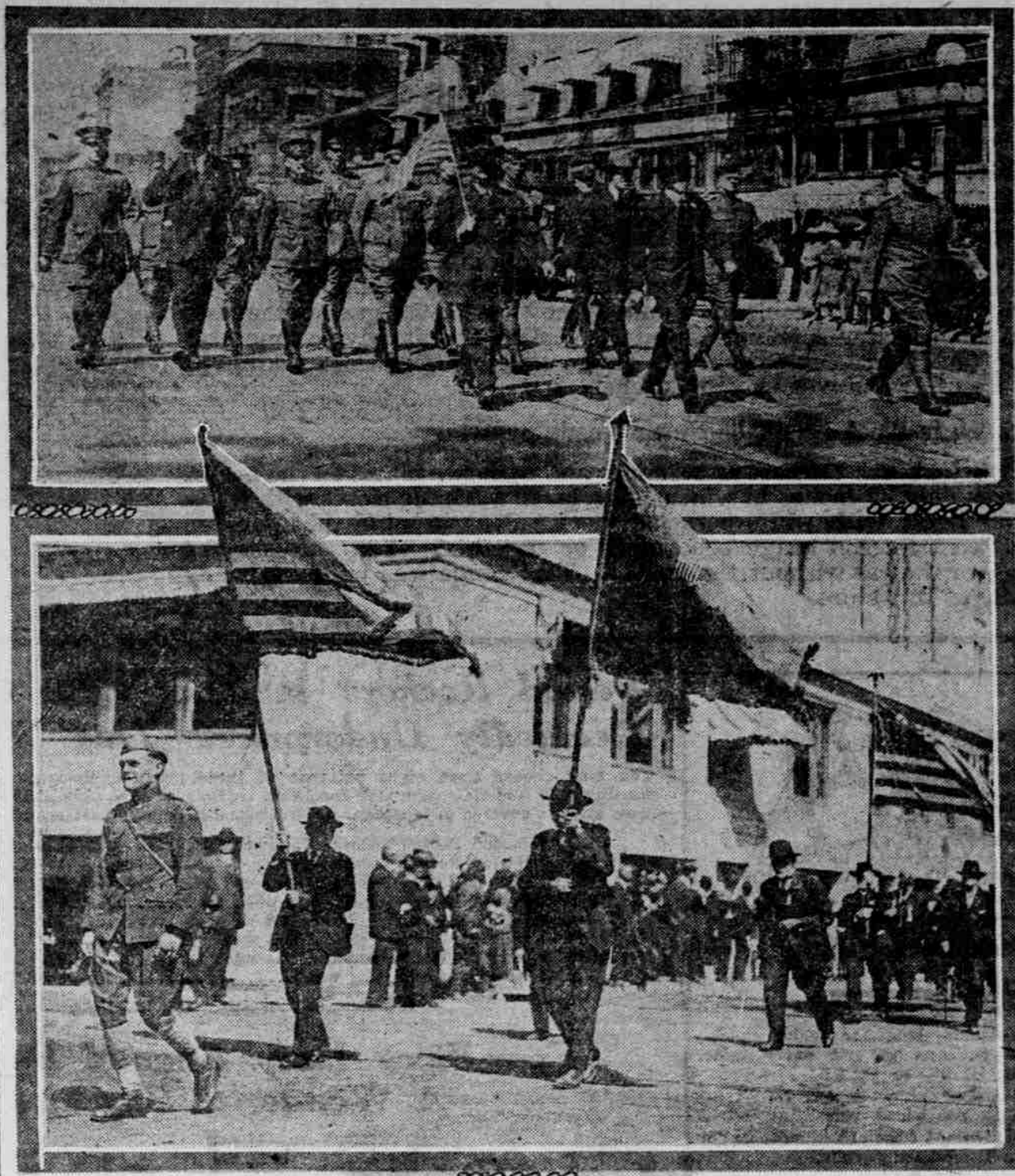

TRIBUTE PAID TO WOMEN

MEMORIAL SERVICES HELD IN CHAPMAN SQUARE.

Mothers, Wives, Sisters and Sweet-
hearts of Soldiers Who Fell
Accorded Honors.

As tender and impressive a tribute to the mothers, wives and sweethearts of war veterans as to the men who sleep on American and foreign soil was paid in memorial services in the shadow of the monument to the Second Oregon volunteers in Chapman square at noon yesterday under the auspices of the United Spanish War veterans and Veterans of Foreign wars.

"Let us not forget to honor those who suffered most—the mothers, wives, sisters and sweethearts who waited for their loved ones in vain," said Clarence R. Hotchkiss, past commander of Scout Young camp, after a tribute to the Grand Army of the Republic, Spanish War veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion.

"Woman's love of country was greater than the love of life, because she suffered upon the altar of patriotism the loss of that far dearer than life itself. Here was greater than the courage of the man in battle, because he could die but once, while she died a thousand deaths of anxiety in every day in picturing the struggle of her loved one. She made her fight alone in the silence of an empty home."

E. R. Lundberg, also past commander of the Spanish War camp, spoke of the spirit of America forced in every war and of the high ideals for which this country has always fought. A wreath of flowers was placed at the foot of the monument in the name of the auxiliary of the Spanish War veterans by Mrs. Cora Thompson, chaplain-general, with a brief speech. H. V. Reed, commander of Scout Young camp of the Spanish War veterans, was master of ceremonies.

LAWS TO BE ADVOCATED

MASTER OF STATE GRANGE OUTLINES VIEWS.

Between 300 and 400 Delegates
Expected to Attend Four-Day
Annual Meeting at Bend.

BEND, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—A programme for recommendation of legislation, largely Initiative, was sketched today by G. E. Spence, master of the State grange, who, with B. G. Leady of Tigard, is in Bend in preparation for the state convention of the organization, which will open here tomorrow morning. Mr. Leady expects that between 300 and 400 delegates will be in attendance during the four-day annual meeting.

Among legislative changes which he will advise are the upward revision of the auto license law, particularly in reference to larger, higher powered cars; the enactment of a state income tax law; a land reclamation law aiming at the eventual elimination of the abstracter; a hydro-electric district law to permit organization on the same general plan as the irrigation and drainage district; and an anti-discriminatory law to prevent price cutting by large manufacturers to the detriment of local producers. Requests for a slight change in the initiative and referendum laws, and for a law to do away with game wardens, throwing their work on county officers, are also being contemplated. Mr. Spence indicated that in connection with the program for various co-operative measures would occupy a large place on the programme.

MEMBERSHIP ROLL GROWS

Oregon Council to Send Three Dele-
gates to Coming Convention
of National Body.

With the election of officers for the ensuing year, the state council of the Knights of Columbus ended its session last night. Membership in the order in Oregon has increased 40 per cent in the past year, and this increase entitles Oregon to send three delegates to the national council instead of two, as heretofore. One of the three delegates will be selected to go to France as a guest of the French government.

Longenecker, past state deputy, with Carl Johnson, Bend, as alternate; J. H. Pearce, with Joseph Franzwa, Eugene, as alternate; Hugh McLain, Coos Bay, with Frank Davey, Salem, as alternate. The next state council will be held in the new \$200,000 clubhouse which the Portland Knights of Columbus are erecting at Park and Taylor streets.

The state council authorized the appointment of a state lecturer, to be appointed by Mr. Pearce, whose duty will be to look after the educational activities of the subordinate councils in Oregon. The council as usual levied an assessment on members of the order to assist in defraying the expenses of young men studying for the priesthood.
