

8000 MASONS HOLD ENJOYABLE OUTING

Forest Grove Scene of Long Day's Festivities.

FUNDS WANTED FOR HOME

Picnic Featured by Baseball and Other Athletic Events With Continuous Dancing.

About 8000 members of the Masonic order of the eastern portion of the state, including their wives and children, gathered yesterday at Forest Grove park to lend support to the campaign to secure funds for the erection of the Masonic home at Forest Grove.

Among those participating in the features of the event was the Al Kader patrol band of Portland, which met the early train and escorted visitors to the grounds.

In charge of the picnic and the programme was the general committee, representing the masters and past masters' and wardens' associations.

The main event of the afternoon was a ball game between Masons employed in banks of Portland and the Williamette valley baseball team.

Dancing went on throughout the afternoon and evening while athletic contests were held during the latter part of the afternoon.

(Continued From First Page.) war, but to those who died in other wars and to the women who remained at home and bore the hardships of wartime without complaint.

He paid high compliment to the men who fought in the Spanish war and in the world war and called upon the living of today to marshal their forces and aid in the cleansing of the nation of pestiferous means it might make good the hopes of the men who died.

Just before the conclusion of this meeting a woman seated in the balcony called upon those in charge of the meeting to ask why the commander-in-chief of the present day army had not been mentioned.

Crowd Cheers President. Mayor Baker, seated on the platform, called upon the audience to give three cheers for the president of the United States, and the building rocked as the assembly cheered President Wilson.

The battles on Flanders field and in the Argonne forests were brought to mind when a distinguished service cross was presented to Alvin Lester Bowman of Falls City by Lieutenant-Commander F. K. Elder, in charge of the naval recruiting office in Portland.

Flowers strewn on mounds. Bowman was cited for exceptional bravery displayed under heavy artillery bombardment and machine gun fire May 16, 1918, when he gave succor to the wounded and the dying and, unassisted, carried three men across the Meuse River.

Visitors Will Learn of Portland's Beauty and Industrial Possibilities of State.

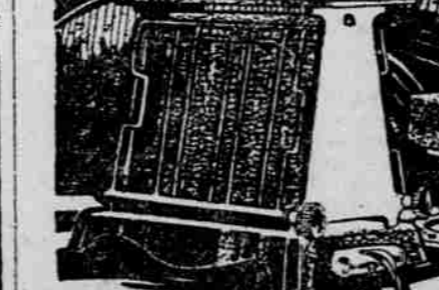
