

HARDING CAMPAIGN TO BE OPENED SOON

Party Managers Not to Wait
on Nomination Notices.

WILL HAYS IS RESTING

Members of New Executive Committee, Including Seven Women, to Be Named Soon.

CHICAGO, June 13.—Campaign managers of Senator Warren G. Harding of Ohio, who was made the presidential nominee by the republican national convention Saturday night, said today no time would be lost in getting things under way. Harry M. Daugherty, director of Senator Harding's pre-convention campaign, requested the national committee to take "prompt, snappy and energetic action" in placing the merits of the republican issues before the voters of the country.

Party managers, it was said, would not wait until Senator Harding and Governor Coolidge of Massachusetts are officially notified of their nomination, but plan to start the campaign soon after the democratic convention is held.

Will H. Hays, re-elected chairman of the new national committee, was out of town today, resting after his strenuous days during the convention.

Women to Be on Committee.

The members of the new executive committee, of whom seven will be women, will be named without delay by chairman Hays. A vice-chairman of the executive committee will be a woman, will be selected at the time the committee is announced.

The resolution adopted in the final minutes of the convention forecasts a change in the representation of the republican party from several states at future national conventions. The resolution, offered by ex-representative Howland of Ohio, provides that the apportionment of delegates to conventions shall be in proportion to the republican votes cast in the states.

Testimony before the national committee ten days ago in its examination of claims of contesting delegations from several southern states, showed certain delegates represented only a small constituency as compared to delegates from other sections of the country.

Resolution Adopted Unanimously.

The resolution which was adopted unanimously notwithstanding the vigorous protests from delegates from Louisiana, Alabama and Texas, provides that in order to effect proper and necessary changes in the apportionment of delegates in proportion to the republican votes actually cast at general elections throughout the various states and in order to insulate a greater effort to erect and maintain substantial party organizations in all the states, the national committee, notwithstanding any rule heretofore adopted, is directed within 12 months to adopt a just and equitable basis of representation in future national conventions. The basis shall be set forth in the call for the next convention and be binding upon all other future conventions until otherwise ordered.

Women to Wait on Harding.

About the same time party managers begin their real activities, the senate committee investigating campaign funds will resume hearings, holding its first sessions in Chicago July 7. While the committee has been authorized to extend its investigations, Senator Kenyon, its chairman, said no plans had yet been made to inquire into campaign funds up to election day.

The republican presidential nominee will become the center of the campaign of the national women's party to bring about the ratification of the suffrage constitutional amendment, according to a statement issued by suffrage leaders. A large delegation of women from many states, it was announced, will wait upon Senator Harding and ask him to insist upon republican action to secure the 28th state ratification.

Campaign to Continue.

"Our campaign against republican obstruction to suffrage is not over," said the statement. "We will continue publicly and insistently to demand action from the republican party to complete suffrage ratification. Since our picketing began at the republican convention hall, additional pressure has been exerted by republican leaders to obtain a special session in Vermont."

Delegates and visitors attracted to Chicago by the national convention lost no time in getting away from town after the nomination was made. Today there were few delegates here and virtually no party leaders. Senator Harding left for Washington late Saturday night on the same train with Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, chairman of the convention, and Senator Smoot. Senator Johnson of California also departed.

Before departing for Washington, Senator Hiram W. Johnson sent the following telegram to Senator Harding:

"Congratulations to you, HI JOHNSON."

Senator Johnson was accompanied by Mrs. Johnson.

"We're going to the capital, pack up our bags and go back to California," he said while bidding farewell.

to a party of friends. "There is nothing that I care to say now relative to the political situation."

Senator Borah of Idaho declined to make a statement, but his friends said he would not bolt the party and intimated that he might take an active part in the campaign.

Senator Harding's headquarters were flooded with telegrams of congratulation. Senator Knox of Pennsylvania telegraphed: "I am delighted with your nomination and will do all I can to secure your election."

Frank Hitchcock, one of the Wood managers, extended "heartiest congratulations" and similar messages were received from Herbert S. Hadley, ex-governor of Missouri, and hundreds of other prominent men of the party.

Vice-President and Mrs. Marshall sent this telegram: "Accept our sincerest personal congratulations."

think that the president of the United States should have the same relation to the leaders of his party in the senate that the president of a corporation has to his board of directors.

They think the president should be a man who in large matters of policy adopts what is decided upon by the board of directors, and always works with the sense of responsibility to them as the final source of power. These republican leaders believe that the final source of responsibility should be, not an individual, but a group.

It is their theory of government and they believe that is what was meant by the founders of the constitution. They think that the president should not send legislation to congress to be passed, but that congress should send legislation to the president to be signed. You may agree with this theory or not, but it is at least an intelligent and tenable theory.

That is what is at the bottom of Harding's nomination. In terms of individuals, the senators who probably had most to do with it were Senators Smoot of Utah and New of Indiana. While these two men may be named as playing leading parts, it is also true that practically every one of the old guard senators took part in it or assented to it. Senator Wadsworth of New York was an especially important cog in carrying out the plan. It was his New York delegation that provided the large number of fluid delegates who could be turned out to support Harding in order to push Lowden ahead of Wood, and this put Wood out in the early part of the convention.

Practical Politics Seen.

The second element that contributed to Harding's nomination has little to do with theory or policy, but was an incident of practical politics. It was a perfectly legitimate thing and was managed with such technical skill as must command the admiration of anyone whose interests were not injured by its operation. The chief figure in this side of the story was a politician from Indiana, Joseph B. Keating. Keating, together with a number of other old guard politicians, had surveyed the delegates all over the country. He had found among them about 200 who were uncommitted and unpledged and had no marked personal affiliations.

Keating and his associates, just before the convention met, had drawn these delegates into a loosely compact group. Their agreement did not look to any one candidate and did not go farther than merely an understanding to act together under a common leadership when the convention should meet. It was this group of field delegates that made possible the manipulation of votes from place to place during the early ballots, which was so essential to the success of the senatorial group when the convention met and the senators took charge.

The third element in the nomination of Harding was a pure case of personality. It was an Ohio politician, Harry Daugherty. Daugherty was Harding's campaign manager. It was sheer brains and will on the part of Daugherty that pulled Harding through handicaps and misadventures which would have killed off any other candidate months ago, and which every observer believed had killed Harding off. It was Daugherty who, together with the senators originally persuaded Harding to get into the race in order to stop Wood's movement last December. It was Daugherty's personality that persuaded Harding to remain in the race on occasion after occasion when Harding had lost his taste for it and wanted to withdraw.

Daugherty Stiffens Senators.

It was Daugherty who came to Washington time upon time to stiffen the senators up after they had ceased to believe the plan could be carried out. Daugherty is an able and masterful person, with a natural gift for politics, and great determination and capacity for untiring work. Whether you like Daugherty or not, and whether you like the Harding nomination or not, take off your hat to a man who can put things through. These three elements combined to name Harding. But there was one

BRITISH MERCHANTS HERE

DEPARTMENT STORE METHODS
LIKED BY VISITORS.

Landscape in Southern Oregon Is Declared Similar to Welsh Countryside.

British merchants, accompanied by ten prominent eastern department store men, arrived in the city late last night from California, announced as they stepped from the train that after entering the Rogue river valley in Oregon they had felt as if they were passing through a Welsh countryside, so similar is the landscape and scenery. The visitors thought Portland an unusually busy city and were especially pleased with the illumination features prepared for the various conventions.

After leaving San Francisco the party changed its schedule so as to visit Yosemite National park for two days.

The merchants expressed confidence in business prospects of the Pacific coast. They also declared that American department store methods, especially the window displays, employee educational system and lighting effects, might well be adopted in England. The visitors reached New York six weeks ago and have stopped in Boston, Washington, D. C., Detroit, Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Toledo, Dayton, Chicago, St. Louis, Denver, Colorado Springs, Salt Lake City, Oakland, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Their next visit will be to Tacoma, where they will pass half a day, leaving there for Seattle, Vancouver, B. C., Winnipeg, Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal. They will sail from Montreal for England June 28.

Miss Dorothy Cook, daughter of F. W. Cook of Dudley, England, is the only woman of the group. She is acting as the party's secretary.

ALBANIANS PUSHED BACK

ITALIAN ALPINE TROOPS ROUT INSURRECTIONISTS.

Albanian Chieftain Shoots Prisoners in Reprisal for Arrests and Deportations.

ROME, June 12.—Italian Alpine troops have cleared the Avlona front of Albanian insurrectionists by violent counter-attacks, according to advices received today, which declare that the Italian troops were fired on from the rear by residents of Avlona. The Italians were arresting and deporting Mussulman Albanians. In reprisal, an Albanian chieftain is reported to have shot a number of Italian prisoners.

Dispatches received today state that on June 6 Albanian rebels commenced isolated attacks in the region of Kanina, Gornj, Dukati and Tepelini, to the south of Avlona. The Italians opposed desperate resistance, giving way only before the superior strength of the enemy. The garrisons of Tepelini and Dukati capitulated, but the other garrisons retreated.

News of the fall of Tepelini and Dukati to the Albanians caused a feeling of sadness here today, as 70 officers and 800 men of the garrisons were taken prisoners.

ROME, June 12.—Demonstrations and serious rioting are reported to have occurred in Trieste and vicinity last night as a protest against the sending of Italian troops to Albania. Rifle and revolver shots were exchanged and some bombs thrown. A number of casualties are reported.

Later messages from Trieste say the city is calm.

Dispatches received Friday from Janina, Albania, indicated trouble in that country. It was said an Italian general had been made prisoner by Albanians, and that Italian artillery had bombarded the village of Opatzi.

A Central News message received in London Friday reported that Italian troops withdrawn from the Montenegrin garrison of Santi Quaranta had entered Avlona, Albania.

Anti-Red Forces Successful.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 13.—(By the Associated Press.)—The first considerable offensive by the forces of General Wrangel, anti-Bolshevik leader on the Crimean front, is reported to have been successful. On June 6 large detachments of Wrangel's troops easily captured Berdiansk and Marioupol, ports on the Sea of Azov.
