

BRITISH COLUMBIA
SENDS TWO ENTRIES

Victoria and Vancouver Will
Join in Festival.

MAYOR GALE WILL SPEAK

Floata Will Represent England,
Scotland, Canada, Wales, New
Zealand and Australia.

One of the foremost features of the Rose Festival, to be held Thursday and Friday of next week, is its international aspect in the participation of two British Columbia cities, Vancouver and Victoria. The 1920 festival will be the first in which entries have been received from points beyond the international boundary. In addition, and adding to the felicitous aspect of the event, this fall will witness the celebration of a century of uninterrupted peace between Canada and the United States, without a fortification or border patrol.

International Concert Scheduled.
Eric V. Hauser, president of the Rose Festival association, procured the co-operation of the two British Columbia cities in the floral parade of the first festival day, Thursday, and in testimony to the friendliness of the visit and the auspicious character of the relations so established, the committee has announced an international patriotic concert and reception, with the Canadian visitors as guests of honor. The concert will be held in the public auditorium on Friday afternoon, June 18, beginning at 2:30 o'clock, under the auspices of the Royal Rosarians. Mayor Baker will preside, extending the civic welcome.

The programme includes an address by Governor Olcott, "Greeting to Canada," with a response by His Worship, Mayor Gale of Vancouver, the speaker of the day. Mayor Gale has more than a provincial reputation as an orator and his address will be a most eloquent, with plentiful humor to enliven the points. A musical programme of international nature will add to the interest. The Royal Rosarian band of 26 pieces will be in attendance.

Among those specially invited to attend—though the first invitation is to the entire public—are John P. Grant, acting British consul general and county officials, officials of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, the Canadian Veterans' association, the Rose society and Rose Festival directors.

Prime Minister Sends Regrets.
Sir Robert Borden, Canadian prime minister, in a letter to Mr. Hauser, expresses regret that he will be unable to accept an invitation to attend, owing to the present session of parliament, but declares his warmest wishes for the success of the festival.

In the floral parade of Thursday afternoon, where the two Canadian cities will be represented by individual floats and private entries, the section of the British empire will be a striking feature. Arrangements are in charge of P. Chappell Brown. Led by pipers, the floral floats of Great Britain will follow. The first float will represent the empire, followed by individual entries for England, Scotland, Canada, Wales, Australia and New Zealand.
