

NO BARNSTORMING, DECLARES HARDING

"Front-Porch" Campaign at
Marion Preferred.

ROOT SENDS BEST WISHES

"Man Who Stays at Home Will Be
Elected," Says Senator Thomas,
and Candidate Agrees.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—Senator Harding, republican candidate for the presidency, indicated in a conference today with newspapermen his opposition to a "barn-storming" campaign. His preference on the other hand would be for somewhat of a "front porch" campaign from his home in Marion, O., with a limited number of set speeches on specific occasions. The republican nominee also made it clear that there would be no delay in opening the campaign, announcing that he would not await the official notification of his nomination. The notification, he said, would not take place before June 15. Friends of the senator declared he believed the office of chief executive was too high and too important to be won through a series of whirlwind campaign tours. Senator Harding also announced today that he would not resign his seat in the senate prior to the termination of his term on March 3.

Democrats See Senator.
Mr. Harding received but few visitors and he continued his efforts to clear away the vast amount of letters and telegrams congratulating him on his nomination.

Leslie M. Shaw, former secretary of the treasury, was one of his few callers. Other callers were Senators Chamberlain, Oregon, and Walsh, Montana, democrats. The work of preparing his speech or acceptance speech, he stated, and it is expected he will defer it until after the conference with Chairman Hays and other party leaders, now tentatively fixed for Monday.

"Great care must be taken in preparing this speech," Senator Harding said today. "It represents the candidate's interpretation of the platform."

Many Telegrams Received.
Senator Harding said he had received telegrams of congratulation from all prominent republicans except Senator La Follette of Wisconsin, who is in a hospital following an operation.

"I also had a very personal message from Colonel Bryan, who assured me that we had no common viewpoint politically," the senator said.

The following cablegram was received from Ellin Root, who is now in Europe: "Sincere congratulations and good wishes. The mantle of McKinley be upon you."

Senator Harding announced that he would not meet Chairman Hays of the republican national committee before next Monday.

While the senator was talking Senator Thomas, democrat of Colorado, arrived to congratulate him.

"If we have got to have a republican for president, you suit me," Senator Thomas said, adding that he had one bit of advice to give the man who stays at home will be elected.

"That fits in with my thought on that subject," said Senator Harding.

The nominee took occasion to deny reports that he had been born in a log cabin.

Among the telegrams received today by Senator Harding was one from the publishers of Ohio daily newspapers, who met recently at Columbus.

"Your fellow publishers are proud of the honor that has come to you," the telegram said.

Another telegram of congratulation came from Senator Underwood, Alabama, the democratic leader in the senate.

COOLIDGE GREETED OLD PALS
Day Spent With Fellow Alumni at
Amherst College.

AMHERST, Mass., June 15.—Governor Coolidge today set aside the affairs of the state and considerable of his campaign for the vice-presidency to take his place with fellow alumni of Amherst college. It was the 25th anniversary of his graduation and his classmates celebrated both the quarter century and the honor which had come to their school-fellow, "Cal."

The governor breakfasted at Springfield with Speaker Gillett of the national house of representatives, who had placed him in nomination for the presidency. The speaker congratulated Governor Coolidge on his nomination and said he had no doubt of the success of the party at the forthcoming elections, adding, "there is no vulnerable point in the ticket. I believe the country is republican, never more so than today after the present administration."

En route to Amherst by automobile, the governor called at his home in Northampton for Mrs. Coolidge, who accompanied him to the college. It was the first visit to his home city since his nomination.

Only one man on the street recognized him and his hand wave was returned by the executive who, when asked for the identity of the man, said "that's Ed Martin, janitor of our high school."

At his home, one half of a two-family house, a neighbor chatted with Governor Coolidge on the porch for a time. Tonight fellow-citizens of Northampton celebrated with a parade and banquet in his honor.

MR. MARSHALL HOPEFUL

DEMOCRATIC PARTY HELD FAR
FROM DISORGANIZED.

"Republicans Making Mistake of
Their Lives in Thinking Election
Is Foregone Conclusion."

SAN FRANCISCO, June 15.—Thomas Riley Marshall, vice-president of the United States, arrived here today to attend the democratic national convention as a delegate from his home state, Indiana.

One of Mr. Marshall's first statements to interviewers who greeted him was that he "wouldn't accept the nomination for president on a silver platter."

"I am an old man who has torn his hair for Bryan, slavery for Parker and Jones his hardest for Wilson, and I am about ready to retire from politics," the vice-president said.

"The republicans are making the mistake of their lives in thinking of

the November election as a foregone conclusion and of the democrats as a disorganized, defeated party. They are going to find us very much alive in November."

Asked his opinion of the republicans' selection of Warren C. Harding as standard-bearer, he said:

"The republicans are not so well pleased now as they were Saturday night. Personally I have high regard for Senator Harding. I would do anything for him except vote for him."

As a delegate Mr. Marshall said he would not work for a wet plank in the democratic platform. In connection with the prohibition amendment he said:

"Nothing is so detrimental to the country as the passage of laws and the ignoring of those same laws."

"President Wilson would not want a third term, I believe," he said. "He could have it, though, if he desired it."

Regarding the league of nations he was non-committal.

Questioned regarding the probable action of the convention on the Irish question, Mr. Marshall said:

"There is no Irish question so far as the convention is concerned. Perhaps 55 per cent of Americans are in sympathy with the cause of Ireland, but less than 1 per cent would be willing to bear arms to help her win freedom."

Mr. Marshall declared the lavish expenditure of money in connection with presidential campaigns. It was "disheartening," he said, adding that he regretted the republicans were not the only guilty ones.

"I am here to promote peace and good will among the democrats at the coming convention," he asserted.

The vice-president was accompanied by Mrs. Marshall and Mrs. Thomas Walsh. Tomorrow the party will leave for a two days' rest at Monterey, Cal.

CANOEIST ENDS LONG TRIP
Many Dangers Met With Between
Lewis and Astoria.

ASTORIA, Ore., June 15.—Amos Burg, who gives his residence as Portland, Ore., arrived here today in a 15-foot canoe, in which craft he declared he had traveled all the way from Lewistown, Idaho. Burg said he made the 500-mile journey down the Snake and Columbia rivers in three weeks and was accompanied by a far as Portland by Fred A. Hill of Spokane.

Several times the canoe was swamped between Wasco and Riparia, Burg said today, but they saved themselves by using a 100-yard line to which was attached a drag, the men swimming to shore each time by aid of the line.

AGED RESIDENT BEATEN
Glenn Duncan of Myrtle Creek Is
Lodged in Jail.

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 15.—(Special.)—Glenn Duncan, a young man of the Myrtle Creek section, was lodged in jail last night charged with assault with intent to kill. He will be given a hearing tomorrow.

The complaint alleges that Duncan went to the home of Lyle Brumbaugh, an aged resident of Myrtle Creek, and after striking him over the head with some blunt instrument beat him, cutting a gash in the scalp and inflicting serious injuries.

Trolley Wreck Narrowly Averted.
ALBANY, Ore., June 15.—(Special.)—The rear wheels of the first car of a southbound train on the Oregon Electric jumped the track in the southern edge of this city about 5:30 last evening, but the train was stopped promptly and the passengers hardly realized before the train stopped that anything unusual had occurred. No one was injured and only a slight jar was felt. It required 15 hours, however, to clear the track. The southbound train was delayed for that time and a northbound train detained slightly. An axle breaking was the cause of the wheels leaving the track.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—White House officials still professed today to have no information as to whether President Wilson had signed the waterpower bill. It was said at the White House yesterday that an announcement on the subject would be made today.

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Final Acts Are Rapid.
When Colonel Charles Thomas Jr., who conducted the prosecution, announced that the government waived rebuttal and opening argument, Attorney John Preston quickly followed with announcement for the defense that argument would be waived and the case submitted.

Reviewing the provisions of the selective service act particularly applicable to the Dempsey case, Judge Dooling said:

"The question is, in its basic aspect, whether or not Jack Dempsey sought to evade military service by fleeing the country."

There was no demonstration from the questionaire, and whether or not, if false statements were made, then were made willfully and knowingly. Other points are merely auxiliary to this principal issue."

Jury Charge Revelation.
Referring to Dempsey's statement in the questionnaire that his wife had not been employed, Judge Dooling said:

"Proof that Maxine Dempsey had been engaged in practicing prostitution is not to be regarded as proof that she was working. Prostitution is not to be classed as working."

There was no demonstration from the verdict was announced, but nearly every person in the courtroom on his feet, to congratulate Dempsey on his victory.

Attorney Gavin McNab, associated with Preston in the defense, announced that he would appear in court tomorrow morning and ask for the dismissal of the conspiracy indictment against Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager.

Maxine Announces Revenge.
Maxine Dempsey, the divorced wife of the pugilist, whose testimony was the principal reliance of the government, but who was prevented from testifying by material points under the rule of privileged communications, stated after the verdict that she would publish the letters which were ruled out of the case and in which she insists Dempsey made incriminating statements regarding his desire to escape military service.

"I am leaving tonight for Yakima, Wash., to make my home temporarily with my mother, Mrs. Ada Cates," said Maxine. "I have no plans for the future."

Jack Dempsey's parents, who have sat with their boy all through the long days of the trial, were quietly happy at the result.

Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, said that the acquittal was no surprise to him.

"There wasn't anything else to do," he said. "It was a clear case for Jack."

Dempsey Now to Train.
Dempsey and his parents are staying in Oakland for a few days. The pugilist will take a brief vacation and will then leave for the east with Kearns to begin his training for the Carpenter fight. His motion picture, "Dare-Devil Jack," which has just been completed at Los Angeles studios, has been released for the state. Thousands of dollars have been spent by the government and defense in preparing and trying the case. Witnesses were brought from West Virginia, Chicago, St. Paul, Salt Lake, Wells, Nev., and other cities, the activities in the case having extended from Philadelphia to San Francisco and from Yakima, Wash., to Tia Juana, Mexico.

According to unofficial statements reported at the federal building today the government has expended about \$80,000 on the case. The defense is said to have disbursed a sum slightly smaller.

Two Killed, 40 Injured
CALIFORNIA LIMITED IS
WRECKED ON SANTA FE.

Accident Caused by Breaking of
Side Rod on Second Engine,
Say Officials.

LA JUNTA, Colo., June 15.—At least two persons were killed today when the California Limited train eastbound on the Santa Fe railroad was wrecked at Reno, Colo., 12 miles south of here. At the Santa Fe hospital here it was announced that 40 injured had been given treatment.

Most of those hurt, it was said, would recover. Relief trains carrying doctors and nurses have been dispatched to the scene.

The train was being pulled by two engines. The accident, according to official information, was caused by the breaking on the second engine of a side rod, which dug into the track, overturning the engine, derailed cars and three Pullman coaches.

The dead, so far as known, are A. O. Swanson, Chicago, combination barber and baggage man, and Dr. W. F. Harper of Mount Vernon, N. Y. At Santa Fe offices a statement was given out that only two persons were killed and 13 injured.

Second Wife Aided by First.
ALBANY, Ore., June 15.—(Special.)—Ernest L. Young's first wife testified

in behalf of his second wife when the latter, Beale L. Young, obtained a divorce in the circuit court here yesterday. Both wives testified that the same woman, whom Young represented as his niece, figured in events which led to the respective separations.

Young, who is a traveling salesman, formerly lived in Portland but is now in California. Young's first wife, who is now head of a department in a large Portland store, testified that Young left her with four children and only 2 cents in the house. Judge Kelly gave Beale L. Young a divorce and awarded her \$50 a month for the support of herself and their one child.

DEMPESEY ACQUITTED ON DRAFT CHARGE

Jury Out but 10 Minutes
Finding Verdict.

FIGHTER NOW TO TRAIN

Ex-Wife Maxine Announces She
Will Publish Letters Barred
by Trial Ruling.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 15.—(Special.)—William Harrison "Jack" Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, was found not guilty on a selective draft evasion indictment by a jury in the United States district court here today.

"I'm the happiest boy in the world," said Jack Dempsey, a moment after the jury in Judge Maurice T. Dooling's court returned with the verdict that cleared him of the charge of seeking to evade military service by giving false answers in his draft questionnaire.

"It feels good to get out from under a charge like that," said the big fighter. "Now I can start square and not feel that people are thinking that I tried to get out of doing my duty."

ALBANY, Ore., June 15.—(Special.)—C. N. McArthur of Portland, representative in congress from the 3d Oregon district, O. M.
