

CORNERSTONE LAID OF MASONIC HOME

More Than 1000 People View
Impressive Ceremony.

LODGE OF SORROW HELD

Newly Elected Officers Will Be Installed This Evening and Jewels Presented.

More than 1000 people viewed the impressive ceremonies incident to the laying of the cornerstone of the Masonic and Eastern Star home near Forest Grove yesterday afternoon. Judge Earl C. Bronaugh, grand master, and Mrs. Albert S. McMurphy, worthy grand matron, were in charge of the ceremonies.

The cornerstone laying for the first unit of the home was the principal feature of the grand lodge of Masons and the grand chapter of the Eastern Star.

Unit Used for Administration. The first unit will meet the administrative requirements, such as offices, reception room, lobby, dining room and kitchen. On the second floor will be the main auditorium with a seating capacity of 240. On the first and second floors will be eight rooms for two each and two large rooms for four each, making total capacity of 24 persons for this unit.

Until the second unit is completed the auditorium will be used as a dormitory. Bids have already been received for the second unit and it is probable there will be no delay in letting the contract.

The morning session of the grand lodge was devoted mainly to the reading of the reports of the grand master, grand secretary and grand treasurer. These reports show a phenomenal growth of the organization during the past year, as well as a healthy financial condition in every fund.

Lodge of Sorrow Observed. The lodge of sorrow was observed by the grand chapter of Eastern Star and the remainder of the business session was devoted to routine affairs. Tonight the newly elected grand officers will be installed and retiring officers will be presented with jewels.

DISTINGUISHED CLASS GRANTED FOR MILITARY WORK.

War Department Places Oregon School Among 15 Leaders in Training Work.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, June 16.—(Special.)—Oregon Agricultural college is designated as distinguished college 1920. The secretary of war extends congratulations to you and all concerned upon high standard of efficiency attained by military department in your institution.—P. C. Harris, the Adjutant General.

This telegram was received by President J. K. Kerr from Washington, D. C., indicating that O. A. C. has been placed among the 15 institutions of the country obtaining the greatest efficiency in military work. The college is one of few institutions of the United States to be picked to organize as many as five units of the O. R. T. C. The confidence of the war department in the character of the work done here was also indicated through the equipment provided, which totaled more than \$1,000,000 in value.

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WOMEN MUST TELL AGE

AUTO DRIVER'S LICENSE NOT GIVEN OTHERWISE.

Secretary of State Says No Option Except to Strictly Enforce Provisions of Law.

SALEM, Or., June 16.—(Special.)—Legislators who had anything to do with framing the so-called operators' vehicle license law passed at the special session of the lawmakers last January are doomed for a "panning" at the hands of the women of Oregon as soon as these fair drivers learn that under the provisions of the act they are required to disclose to the secretary of state the place of their birth and other rather personal information not asked in any other statute now in force in this state.

At the time the Oregon election laws were compiled, there was considerable discussion among the legislators as to whether the women should be compelled to disclose their ages. The women objected strenuously, and finally the act was so framed that in registering and voting the fair electors simply declare that they are over the age of 21 years. Under the law requiring all drivers of motor vehicles in Oregon to obtain a license, the legislators, however, thought fit to disregard the long established courtesy.

"While my sympathy is with the women," says Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, "the law requiring women to give their ages is plain and I have no option other than enforcing the provisions of the act to the letter."

The secretary of state today received the first applications for operators' licenses. A. H. Lindbeck of Salem, being the first applicant. Stephen A. Stone, also of Salem, filed application No. 2.

Application blanks are now being sent to all motor-vehicle owners in Oregon for their convenience in applying for motor-vehicle operators' licenses, which the law, in effect, July 1, 1920, requires of every person who operates a motor vehicle in this state, except chauffeurs. This law also prohibits the driving of a motor vehicle under any circumstances by persons less than 16 years of age or by persons who are mentally incompetent or physically incapacitated, as the law defines.

PIONEERS ARE AT PICNIC

LINX COUNTY ASSOCIATION HAS ANNUAL FROLIC.

Speakers Discuss Days That Are Gone and Ball Game Provides Thrills for Old Settlers.

ALBANY, Or., June 16.—(Special.)—With a large attendance representative of almost all associations of Linx county, the annual pioneer picnic at Brownsville began this morning and will continue through Thursday and Friday. The picnic is being held in a beautiful grove on the bank of the Calapoosia river in the Brownsville city park, where the event has taken place annually for 35 years.

The first day's festivities were featured by the presence of many pioneer citizens and the picnic this year, as heretofore, is proving an enjoyable and profitable day for all. The speakers of the day are: Rev. M. S. Woodworth of Brownsville, W. R. Billeu of Albany, county judge, responded to the welcome and delivered the principal address of the day. Other talks were made by prominent pioneers.

The principal event this afternoon was a baseball game between Brownsville and Harrisburg, which was called the end of the 12th inning with the score 1 to 1.

The Albany chamber of commerce will stage a big automobile excursion to the picnic tomorrow. The speakers tomorrow will be Judge Stephen A. Stone of Portland and Senator C. M. Thomas of Medford. Robert G. Morrow, circuit judge of Portland, will speak Friday.

ALASKA TO BE DEVELOPED

Survey Recommends Better Understanding of Conditions.

WASHINGTON, June 16.—Co-ordination of federal control of Alaskan lands and resources and consolidation of the two American shipping lines serving Alaskan ports were among recommendations made today to Secretary Payne by a special committee of officials of the department of the interior appointed to report a plan for accelerating Alaskan development.

Mr. Payne approved the report and instructed the committee to put its programme into effect as soon as possible. Hearty co-operation from interested commercial organizations who have been invited to participate in conferences on the subject is expected, the secretary said.

CHICAGO NURSE LOSES

WOMAN WHO REFUSES TO WED GETS NO DAMAGE.

Jury Finds Picture That Causes Trouble Is That of Sultor and Fraud Is Not Shown.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 16.—(Special.)—Ilean Koch, the Chicago nurse who came to Oregon to take unto herself a husband, and who backed out when she met the bridegroom-to-be and sued him for \$1300, lost her case today by a decision of the Oregon court. After a short deliberation the jury returned a verdict in favor of the defendant.

The man she was to marry is Stanley Boginski of Willamette, and when she arrived here and met him changed her mind, alleging that he was not what he represented himself to be. She claimed he sent her a photograph of another man, and also asked her to marry him. She was unable to speak the English language.

Miss Koch sued for \$1000, which she alleged she lost by giving up her work in Chicago, and also asked for expenses back to her home.

All of this evidence was placed before the jury, which decided that the photograph was that of Boginski, who admitted that his landlady, Mrs. Ziehlinski, had written the letters at his dictation.

In one of the letters of plaintiff to defendant it was brought out that she secured his name and address from a patient and had written the first letter. Pictures were exchanged and Boginski told Miss Koch what a beautiful country this was and she expressed a desire to come to Oregon.

Astoria Police Chief Enjoined.

ASTORIA, Or., June 16.—(Special.)—That Chief of Police Carlson be restrained from interfering with the plaintiffs' business in conducting a soft drink establishment here was asked in a suit filed in the circuit court this afternoon by A. G. Bach. The action is based on the alleged illegality of the city ordinance regulating the operation of soft drink places. The court issued the temporary injunction order asked for.
