BIDS ON 14 PORTABLE SCHOOLS ARE OPENED

Board to Make Decisions at Conference Thursday.

FOUR TEACHERS ELECTED

Director Thomas Makes Report on Trip East for Purchase of School Equipment.

Bids for the construction of 14 additional portable school buildings of one and two rooms each, and totaling 23 additional rooms for the city school system, were opened yesterday afternoon by the school board at its regular semi-monthly meeting at 4 o'clock.

No awards were made. The motion to tabulate the bids and consider them at a conference next Thursday was carried.

Bids for portable buildings in the following school districts were called: Two-room buildings, Arleta, Eastmoreland, Felling, Fernwood, Kerns, Lenox, Sabie, Shawyer, Stephens, St. George-room buildings, Beasmont, East Laurelhurst, Llewellyn, Woodlawn. Bids were submitted by eight concerns. A. Teller and R. J. Allen presented the low figure of \$12,880. Other bids ranged from \$46,968.72 to \$65,944.

Four new teachers were elected and the resignations of several others were accepted. Two received leave of absence for one year. The newly elected teachers are: Carl S. Zook, principal of the Atkinson school; Jacob Jordan, assistant in the physical department at Benson Polytechnic; Maurice E. Post, assistant in biology and athletics, Lincoln high; Nelson E. Likins, machine shop, Washington high; Miss Margaret Perciful, Arleta school, and Miss Edith Forbes, Arleta school, each received a year's leave of absence, the former because of ill health and the latter in order to take advanced work at the University of Washington.

Resignations Are Accepted.
Resignations of Miss Virginia Nottingham, Hawthorne school, and Miss Marion Schneider, Lincoln high, were accepted. A motion that the school board meet half the cost of increasing the salary of H. C. Seymour, state club leader, from \$2100 to \$2400, was adopted. Half of Mr. Seymour's salary is paid by the Board and the other half by the school district.

Claims aggregating \$492,744.61, presented by R. H. Thomas, school clerk, were allowed and a motion was adopted favoring the construction of a concrete sidewalk through the Creston school yard. The sidewalk was named to decide on the location of the walk.

It was reported that the board now holds title to all of blocks 8 and 9 in Riverside, abutting on Brainerd street, between Denver and Concord streets, and the board authorized the proper steps for the vacation of that portion of Brainerd street dividing the school property in order that the school yard will not be cut in two. This property will be known as the Beach school.

Mr. Thomas Makes Report.
George B. Thomas, who has just returned from the east, where he purchased machinery for the Benson school, made a brief report, and the board approved the employment of Captain W. E. Palmer, one of the chief clerks in the surplus division of the army at Washington, to represent the school board for one month. Captain Palmer will endeavor to purchase valuable surplus equipment for the school board under the Caldwell act of congress. A sum of \$500 for salary and a day's traveling expenses was appropriated by the board for Captain Palmer.

While in the east, Mr. Thomas, with Captain Palmer, visited depots of surplus army material at Columbus, O., Sharon, Pa., Pittsburgh, Baltimore, Washington, Buffalo, Cleveland, Toledo, Detroit and Chicago, and arranged to purchase lathes and other machinery for the Benson school. These purchases, together with additional machinery to be obtained by Captain Palmer, will be assembled at Chicago by the Transcontinental Forwarding company and shipped to Portland, thus saving considerable money in freight charges, Mr. Thomas stated.

It will be impossible for the school board to secure linotype machines or printing equipment from the government, Mr. Thomas reported.

BEND FIELD IS LOCATED

Landing Place Obtained for Planes in Forest Patrol Work.

SALEM, Or., June 17.—(Special).—F. A. Elliott, state forester, returned today from Bend, where he obtained an emergency landing field for use by aviators engaged in patrolling the forests of central Oregon during the approaching fire season. The field contains several hundred acres and is located near Crane prairie. Another emergency field will be located a short distance south of the Jefferson, according to Mr. Elliott.

Mr. Elliott says all plans have been completed for the seasonal patrol service, and that the planes will be in actual operation by June 25.

White Shriners at Centralia.

CENTRALIA, Wash., June 17.—(Special).—White Shriners from all parts of southwest Washington were in Centralia today to attend a ceremonial by the local White Shrine of this city. This afternoon a reception for the visitors was held in the Masonic hall, and at 5 o'clock a dinner was held at the Hotel Centralia, for Mrs. Emma Love, deputy supreme high priestess, and assisting officers from Tacoma. The ceremony was held this evening in the Oddfellows' hall. A class of 50 candidates was initiated.
